Students enjoy learning new instrument

Three afternoons a week a group of first through third grade students at Holly Springs Primary School look forward to getting out their ukuleles.

"Everything," they shouted in unison when asked what they like best about the class.

A couple of years ago the school received a grant through the Save the Music Foundation to buy musical instruments. Thirty ukuleles were included in the purchase.

Principal Sherna Jones invited retiree Barbara Anderson to teach the class, as it would complement the good work already being done by Primary School music teacher Deandra Jones.

"We wanted to add the after-school arts component," Sherna Jones said. "We certainly want our students to be more well-rounded. This introduces them to an art form they would not otherwise experience.

"The day is so filled with academics. This gives the students the opportunity to express themselves a different way. It's so important that we use the arts to support academics."

Anderson, a music educator for 41 years before her retirement in 2016, accepted the principal's invitation to teach the ukulele class.

"Every school needs to implement the arts – music, drama, drawing, choir, theater," Anderson said. "An arts program brings out the creativity in students."

She said many studies have been done and results proven on the impact and power of music on children's intellectual, social and personal development. An education rich in music can improve children's cognitive functions and their academic performances.

Research has proven that learning music helps to develop the left side of the brain, which is responsible for language development (words and sentence structure), speech, comprehension, arithmetic, number skills, reasoning, scientific skills, spoken language and right-hand control.

"Music also helps to increase students' confidence," Anderson said.

From 3:30 to 5 p.m. every Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, the ukulele students at Holly Springs Primary School are eager to learn new cords and more songs as Anderson walks around the room helping them as a group and individually.

"We just got started in January," she said, "and they are really enjoying it."

Sherna Jones said it's wonderful that the elementary children are getting to experience the instruction of such an accomplished music educator as Anderson.

"She's in her element," the principal said. "One of the students just last week told me, 'Mrs. Anderson is the best ukulele teacher in the world!'"

<u>ESSER Fund</u> Renovation projects start in June

New swing sets will be added at the Holly Springs Primary School playground (top photo). "The "White House" behind the high school building (bottom photo) will be completely remodeled to include two isolation classrooms, plus an outdoor classroom added in back. Much-needed improvements to Holly Springs School District campuses are just around the corner.

The projects, part of the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund, include restroom renovations, new heating ventilation and air conditioning units, auditorium renovations, an outdoor classroom, new playground equipment and more.

The ESSER projects will start in June with completion set for the spring of 2024. "We have a lot of great projects focused on our students – creating a safer and healthier environment and improving the learning process," said Dr. Irene Turnage, superintendent of education.

Restrooms will be renovated at the primary, junior high and high schools, plus the central office. Improvements will include new mirrors, stall partitions, lighting fixtures, new flooring, freshly-painted walls, and hands-free sinks, dispensers and water closets. Antiquated rooftop and ground HVAC units at the primary school and its activity building will be replaced. The high school building and the high school auditorium will also receive upgraded HVAC units.

The high school auditorium itself will get a major facelift. The work will include the removal of asbestos, installing new tile on the first floor and the balcony area, new audience seating, new lighting fixtures, new wall paint and new acoustical wall and ceiling panels. "We will be able to space people out more and just create a much nicer, upgraded auditorium not only for our students and faculty but for our community," Turnage said. "We're excited about seeing a newly-renovated auditorium, including the balcony which has not been used in a very long time."

Old and broken window panes at the junior high and high school band hall will be replaced.

The "White House," located behind the high school building and adjacent to the junior high, will be transformed. The space will include two isolation classrooms, new conference room, and upgraded kitchen and restrooms. The renovation also calls for a new raised wood patio at the back of the building.

An outdoor classroom will be added just behind the "White House." The additional teaching and learning area for teachers and students will include 25 outdoor student desk/chair combination stations which will face the raised wood patio.

"This will provide a valuable learning space outside in the fresh air," Turnage said. "It will be a wonderful addition for our students and teachers."

New playground equipment at the intermediate school will include a large play structure with large translucent shades, plus two swing sets. There will be an observation bench for staff, with a translucent shade for comfort. The equipment will be located just inside the existing black fence adjacent to the gymnasium.

Playground equipment will also be added at the primary school. New swing sets for up to eight students will be constructed at the City of Holly Springs Park, on the north side of the primary school.

New audio/visual door access control devices will be installed at the front/main entrance to all schools. This project will provide a better sense of safety for students and employees. "We will be able to better monitor who is coming in and out of our school buildings," Turnage said. "The safety of students is our top priority."

Also part of the ESSER Fund, four new school buses are already in operation, and learning assistance will be provided in the way of extra summer school sessions and tutors. The ESSER Fund was established as part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security CARES Act.

"It has been our goal through this process to use the money very wisely," Turnage said, "and these projects will be extremely beneficial for our students and staff."

Other Holly Springs School District projects scheduled, not a part of the ESSER Fund, include repairs to the campus roads that connect the junior high school, high school gymnasium and Career and Technical Center. This work also includes the installation of new drains which will collect rainwater and carry it offsite.

A roof replacement project at the CTC includes replacement of the roof area over the welding shop, health and sciences classrooms and automotive shop.

Holly Springs School District banners will be installed on select utility poles at each campus and at the district office.

District continues to support students with learning loss

The Holly Springs School District will continue its efforts to support students who experienced learning loss by offering three different types of extended year programs this year.

The district will offer a district-sponsored, extended-year program in grades 1-12 for students who met most promotion goals but may need additional support with standards or missed requirements. The district-sponsored, extended-year program will take place from June 5, 2023, until June 30, 2023.

The district will also continue its 17-year partnership with the University of Mississippi through the Mississippi Teacher Corps (MTC) Summer School Program.

The 2023 MTC Summer Program will allow students to obtain credit recovery for one subject out of eight targeted courses in grades 6-12. The program will take place from June 12, 2023, until July 18, 2023.

For students in grades 7-12 who need support for more than one subject, the district will offer courses through the district's alternative program, Ombudsman, at a cost to parents. The Ombudsman program will take place during the same time as the 2023 MTC Summer Program.

Classes for all programs will begin at 8 a.m. and end at 12 noon each day. Breakfast and lunch will be served daily.

Holly Springs School District is rated Successful by MDE



There are many great things going on in the Holly Springs School District! As we publish our inaugural edition of our first district newsletter, The Hawk, I wanted to take this time to share some of those great things with our community, partners and friends.

The Holly Springs School District maintained its Successful rating again for the 2022-2023 school year based on the Mississippi Department of Education's Accountability System for Schools. The district received a C-rating, which is considered Successful under the present state accountability model. The district is humbled that despite some of the most challenging times faced in education in recent years, the district has received a Successful rating each year for the last twelve years with the exception of the 2018 school year. Although there were a lot of positives in the data, the district and school leaders understand there is still a lot of good work to do.

In addition to the district receiving a Successful rating, some of the positives include:

- Holly Springs High School moving from a D-rating to a C-rating, raising it to a Successful status.
- the District's graduation rate increasing to 93 percent from 90 percent.
- the District increasing in Acceleration, which is the percentage of students participating in college courses and obtaining national certifications while in high school. The percentage of students taking college courses and obtaining national certifications increased from 66 percent to 79 percent.
- the District resuming partnerships and practices impacted by the pandemic and developing services that will be critical to our students and staff getting back on track for long-term success.

The district has also had many highlights in the areas of athletics, partnerships, and parent and community involvement. As always, parent and community support has been strong.

We would like to thank our community, parents, staff and students for all the work they have done this year. As we say in the district, "Teamwork Makes the Dream Work", and the staff in the Holly Springs School District continues to be so grateful for all who support the district.

We are looking forward to having an even better year in 2023-2024, and we encourage all students, staff, parents and community members to continue the outstanding teamwork.

Together, we can make sure every child learns and grows.

Track and field medalists at State Meet

Two Holly Springs High School sophomores combined to win five medals at the Mississippi High School Activities Association Class 3A State Track and Field Meet May 10 in Pearl. Tiara Leverson (far left) placed second in the 400 meter dash (1:00.37), third in the 200 meter dash (26.01) and third in the high jump (5-02). Tray Kinkle (middle) took the top prize, the gold medal, in the 200 meter dash (22.14) and finished second in the 400 meter dash (50.13). The Holly Springs High School boys 4x800 relay team, three juniors and one sophomore, also medaled as Jim Garcia-Espino, Jatavis Walker, Jason Jeffries and Jermaine Henderson (right photo) ran their way to a third-place finish (9:19.54) at the State Meet. Track coaches at Holly High are Maxine Tucker and Brandi Woodson (girls) and Clifford Brown (boys). Both the Hawks and Lady Hawks have won back-to-back District 2-3A track and field championships, plus several Holly High athletes advanced to the regional, north and state meets. The boys team finished as both regional and north runner-up and then fifth in the state out of 28 schools competing. The girls team placed third in the regional, fourth in the north and seventh in the state.

Smith motivates students

DaQuan Smith delivered a simple but inspiring message to students at his alma mater Friday morning, April 21.

"Don't sell yourself short; set goals," said Smith, a 2018 graduate of Holly Springs High School and the Hawks' all-time leading scorer in basketball. "Get your grades up. Do things the right way. Strive to be an all-around better person."

Smith led Holly High to four state tournaments, including a Class 3A runner-up finish his senior season. He was a member of the Dandy Dozen, the top 12 players in the state as selected by The Clarion-Ledger newspaper. He averaged 26 points a game as a senior.

Smith signed with Murray State University out of high school and then transferred to Radford University. He was named to the Big South All-Conference Team this past season. He will receive his bachelor's degree in May but has one year of college basketball eligibility left. He currently plans to return to Radford for one more season while working on a master's degree. His goal is to play in the NBA.

But Dr. Irene Turnage, superintendent of education for the Holly Springs School District, said even though Smith is a very accomplished athlete, above all else he's an outstanding, well-rounded young man.

"He is always respectful, always genuine, and those characteristics will take you far in life," Turnage said. "He also knows the importance of academics. He was a distinguished Honor Student at Holly Springs High School. He handled his business, academics and basketball, and did both of them well. He is the model example that you can be successful in both. He continues to represent Holly Springs well. He's a young man of high character."

Smith, never one to reap accolades on himself, again emphasized to the high school students the importance of setting goals.

"Write down your goals – academically, athletically, in life," he said. "Mine are on my mirror so I see them every morning. Believe it or not, it helps. Be the best person you can be, in all areas."

Smith was accompanied by his mother, Tiffiny Martin.

She urged the high school students to "take her son's words to heart."
