# This week's reading selection: The Road to Democracy

**Summary:** This informational article explains democracy's Greek origins, its influence on other world governments through the centuries, and its prominence today. It also describes the representative democracy of the United States.

**Essential Questions:** What are some ways that people make decisions as a group? What ways are the easiest? What ways are the most fair?

**DISCUSS** with your child why a government in which all citizens have a voice might be the most just and fair.
