

Making a Difference



You will be receiving one of these letters every week throughout your child's year of fourth grade. Each letter is a glimpse into what he or she has to focus on during the week in reading and language arts. Use the different sections of this letter to stimulate conversations with your child about what he or she is learning.

Big Idea: What can we do to make a difference?

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Ask your child how this week's reading selection helps him or her answer this question.

This week's reading selection: Ava and Pip

Summary: Ava and Bea, a popular girl at school, start helping Ava's sister, Pip, be less shy. Bea tells Pip all she has to do the first week is smile at a different person every day. Pip receives positive feedback when she smiles, so she agrees to the next step—saying something positive about herself whenever she sees her reflection in a mirror.

DISCUSS with your child how making a difference can begin at home.
