#### Airgas Gives PHS Welding Program \$10K in Equipment

On April 27th, Airgas USA, a welding supply company from Flagstaff, delivered \$10,000 worth of free welding equipment and supplies to Page High School's welding program. The equipment included brand new welding hoods, various welding tools - such as pliers and channel locks - welding gloves and PPE for the students, as well as argon and CO2 gas. Pretty much everything a welding student needs to succeed in his or her class.

"This is going to have a huge impact for my welding students, and on our program," said Sam Rangel, Page High School Welding instructor. "I feel absolutely blessed and honored to be selected. We've been in need of new tools for some time. They get used

hard and they get old and worn out. This will replenish our tools so that every student during a class period will have their own tools, rather than having to share between students."

Rangel said he plans to keep a set of the new welding hoods aside for his students attending competitions so they'll have a nice-looking uniform.

The award is a direct testament to Rangel's dedication and the positive direction he's taking the high school's welding program.

"I want to remind our community that our welding program is here to help," said Rangel. "In our country right now, we're experiencing a skills gap. There are more skilled-labors jobs than there are skilled workers to fill the jobs. Graduating skilled welders will lessen that skills gap."

Rangel takes great pride in teaching the next generation of America's welders. "Having skilled welders keeps America competitive on the world stage, being a strong industrial nation, being a world country and having to rely less on foreign help."

Rangel teaches a little more than 100 students in his welding classes. He teaches first-time welders who don't know anything about the craft, all the way to advanced students. The ultimate goal of the high school welding program is to have any student who wants to, graduate from high school with a welding certification that can get them an entry-level position in the welding industry.

The welding supplies that were given to PHS's welding

program came from the 2022 Airgas High School Welding Education Initiative, an annual program Airgas sponsors as a way to help successful high school welding programs meet their needs.

Page High School was one out of 30 schools across the country who won this year's Airgas High School Welding Education Initiative. Airgas has been a supplier and supporter of Page High School's welding program for decades and the two organizations have a long history of cooperation. Eden Lainoff, Airgas Branch Manager in Flagstaff, nominated Page High School's welding program for the \$10,000 award.

"Sam [Rangell] and I talked on the phone and I asked him what his program needed," said Lainoff. "We went through a list of high-priority to low-priority items they needed, and submitted their application."

Airgas was more than happy to award the PHS welding program with \$10,000 worth of equipment, said Don Dexter, Airgas District Manager. He sees it as a win-win for both the high school and his own company.

"We like to partner with schools, because the way we see it, this continues our industry," said Dexter. "The students today learning to weld will be our customer tomorrow. The people in the skilled trades, like welding, are very important to the success of our business, as well as the success of

### Sue Tucker Sets Up Her Graduating Artists for Success

Students in Page High School's advanced art class are finishing out the school year with a raft of positive experiences that have given them a taste of success and further fueled their passion for art, and the importance of the work they do as artists.

The month began with the City of Page inviting 14 art students from Page High School to join the city's Fine Arts Festival, and throughout the month, PHS art teacher, Sue Tucker, brought in visiting artists who gave demonstrations, and dispensed practical, valuable advice for students wanting to make the leap to professional artist.

In the years that Sue Tucker has been an art teacher at Page High School, she has strived to build an art program that encourages her art students to take chances and be brave with their creativity. So when she learned about the invitation to have her students join the Fine Arts Festival, she was thrilled.

Participating in the city's Fine Arts Festival was overwhelmingly positive, said Sue Tucker. For the majority of the students, it was their first steps into the professional art world. For the budding artists, displaying their work alongside the work of professional, respected artists was a real boost to their confidence, and their abilities as artists.

The Fine Arts Festival began Friday night with a Meetthe-Artists dinner at the Grand Canyon Brewery and Distillery. There artists displayed their best works, ate dinner and mingled with their fellow artists and the interested public in the center portion of the restaurant, which was roped off from the rest of the dining area. The dinner also served as a fundraiser for Page High School's arts programs, and raised \$600.

On Saturday and Sunday, the festival moved to the city park.

"I have so many talented kids, and they got to see that first-hand during the festival," Tucker said, "Hearing that your work is great from your art teacher is one thing, but having a stranger pay a hundred dollars for something you created is on an entirely different level. Some of them walked away with hundreds of dollars in their pockets, which was a very big surprise for them, and really validated them as artists."

Participating in the Fine Arts Festival was a great growing experience for the students, allowing them to experience the business side of their craft.

"Many of them had never done this before, or shown their work before and they had to learn how to do it," said Tucker. "It was all so new to them that most of them didn't know what prices to charge for their art."

## CTE's Auto Tech Program Acquires State-of-the-Art Training Aid



The Automotive Technology program recently acquired a stateof-the-art training aid. This trainer features a late-model recycled vehicle. The training vehicle has a full operating engine, A/C, electrical system, and all the computer systems.

The training car will aid in developing real-world system skills and knowledge by performing actual service manual diagnostic procedures on the following systems: Engine Performance, Electrical/Electronics, Suspension/Steering, Brakes, Heating/Air Conditioning, and Transmissions.

It is equipped with a Fault / Simulator Panel with multiple faulting options.

"It's something I've wanted for the CTE program for a long time," said Chuck Sharp, CTE Director.

The automotive training aid has no roof and no doors, making it more easily accessible to students, some of who are seeing the systems for the first time, Because the car is open, it also allows the instructor and 25 students to easily gather around while during demonstrations.

"The instructor can throw a fault into the car's system, and the students will have to diagnose the problem," said Sharp. "It's going to greatly increase our hands-on instruction for our students."

price for their art.

"I told them to think about how many hours they had put into their work, the materials used to make it, and not to under-sell themselves," said Tucker. "I saw that some of the students had priced their art too low, and suggested they raise the prices, and they got it. Some students sold three or four of their pieces and walked home with \$800. After years perfecting their art, and wondering if it's any good, it's an amazing feeling knowing your art is worth something."

For the young artists at the Fine Arts Festival, it was a chance to watch the public interact with their work. It was an opportunity to see what affect their art had on them, and what reactions or connections their art produced.

A piece created by high school artist Sheridan Fowler had a big and immediate impact on a festivalgoer, Darren Coldwell, Page's City Manager.

It's a painting of three sunflowers, titled "Sunflower Heaven."

When Coldwell saw the painting, it had an immediate, visceral impact. Opening night of the Fine Arts Festival happened to coincide with the three-year anniversary that Coldwell had been cancer-free. The sunflower is the symbol for sarcoma awareness, the type of cancer Coldwell beat three years earlier.

"Each different type of cancer has a flower that symbolizes it," Coldwell explained. "I had a form of sarcoma in my lower spine, and the sunflower is the symbol for that type of cancer. We had been looking for a couple years of a painting of sunflowers. When we saw this one, we thought it would be a nice inspiration."

Coldwell purchased the painting for \$275, and had it professionally matted and framied. It now hangs in his bedroom where he can see it every day.

"That's the perfect example of the power of art," said Tucker. "You can never tell who it will touch."

Sheridan's piece, "Sunflower Heaven", acrylic on canvas, started off as an experimental project. Sheridan began by painting clouds in the sky. Painting clouds was new to her and something she wanted to try. "I liked how the clouds turned out," she said. "After that, I did something I'm good at, which is painting flowers. My favorite flowers are sunflowers."

Fowler is the daughter on well-known Navajo artist, Frank Fowler, Jr.

Fowler, a senior, plans to continue creating art as a hob by after she graduates.

Another one of the high school students in the Fine Arts

Festival was Jayden Secody, a senior. He sketches, makes drawings, sculpts clay and makes wearable art. At the festival, Secody showcased wearable art. Secody's style of wearable art was sculptures created from cardboard made to look like armor. Most of the "armor" Secody creates is inspired from video games and movies.

For Secody, creating sculptures out of clay or cardboard felt like the logical next step in his creative career. The idea hit him out of the blue, he says.

"One day I was like, wait, I can turn what I've drawn into a 3D sculpture to see what I had seen in my imagination become more physical," Secody said. "

Secody was one of the few students who has displayed work at previous art festivals.

"Sometimes I sell art, sometimes I don't," he said. "I like to walk around and see what the new meta is, see what other artists are doing and what they're working with."

Secody plans to pursue a career in the arts and sees his art progressing into gaming design, working with the digital arts. "I want to be more multi-media, and work with everything," he said.

Another big piece of Tucker's approach to developing the next generation of successful artists is introducing her students to successful artists, particularly ones who come from backgrounds similar to their own.

Tucker invited Mekhi Merritt, a former PHS student, into her classroom for several days as an Artist-in-Residence.

"I think a number of my students were inspired to see someone with an identical background as them, go on to become a successful artist," Tucker said.

Merritt does tattoo art, sketches, watercolor, murals and whatever else inspires him. During his time in Tucker's class, Merritt gave demonstrations on shading, tone and how to transfer a finished design to a different surface. When Merritt wasn't giving demonstrations, he remained in the classroom and worked on his art, and was available to answer questions from the art students throughout the day.
