Ken Satkunam: Warren's Own IT Big Shot

Who would have known in the 1980s that Johnson Avenue in Warren would raise up a nationally known IT guru? Well, if you've never had the opportunity to have a conversation for yourself with Ken Satkunam, it's time you knew what a great guy the community of Warren raised!!

It was the 1980s, as a 5th grader, when Ken first felt the "itch" to experiment with technology. Ken recalls when his mom, Faye (Erickson) Satkunam (WHS, Class of 1964, daughter of Everett and Dorothy Erickson), purchased him his very first computer: a Commodore Vic 20. He fondly remembers that computer and how it gave him his first love of technology! He immediately thought it was the most amazing thing ever! He'd hook it up to their TV and play early video games in full color. He wrote his first computer program, using basic computer language, as that eager 5th grade student, using that first Commodore from his mom. It happened on New Year's Eve that year and he and his best buddy, Mark Jordheim were sitting around, playing games. They decided to write a program to cause a splash of colors when the ball dropped in Times Square to ring in the New Year! They created a program that counted down the seconds from 10 – 1! When the ball hit the bottom, their program created a splash of colors across his TV screen! With excitement and passion, Ken was determined to find his future in technology.

Ken Satkunam was born in Cleveland, Ohio and grew up as an only child to his mother and father, who was a physician's assistant. His dad's job took them from Ohio to

Michigan and then Lander, Wyoming. When the marriage dissolved, Faye and young Ken returned to her roots in Warren, MN where they lived throughout his educational career. Faye and Ken made their home right on Johnson Avenue. Ken, admittedly "loved it." Being the center of his mother's attention was special. He recalls his mother working hard to provide for them. Ken thoroughly enjoyed his childhood in Warren. He retold about his experiences walking to the Warren Fair, riding his bike around town ~ especially to the Holiday Pool, the old Warren Theater and playing basketball on the courts in the community. His house on Johnson Avenue saw many memories with his treasured friends: Scott Polley, Charles BlackLance and next door neighbor, Mark Jordheim.

One of his fondest childhood memories was attending the original showing of "Star Wars" at the Warren Movie Theater with his mom; they were instantly huge Star Wars fans. It was always a dream of hers to go to Los Angeles to the Star Wars Park. Last year, they were excited to make the long-awaited trip; unfortunately the pandemic outbreak occurred. To his devastation, he and his mom never got the chance to fulfill the trip. Sadly, she passed away before it could be rescheduled. It was at his mother's funeral where Ken reconnected with one of his favorite teachers, Mrs. Mary Beth Edman. She was someone Ken looked up to; he remembers her being an "awesome" teacher and was appreciative to have the opportunity to reconnect with her.

While in elementary school, Ken spoke of his mother purchasing him blank notebooks he used to write

down pages of computer codes and keep track of them. Ken found joy in reading, especially the books where you could create your own ending. Coincidentally, this brought him to his first computer challenge! One of his elementary teachers introduced him to the new video game, "The Oregon Trail." The concept of choosing your own ending to the game intrigued him and this served as a springboard for him to delve further into code-writing. Ken was on his way! He loved it and his passion for developing graphics and visuals began. Interestingly enough, his first project as an adult would lead him right back to a school system. He worked with the Oak Grove Lutheran School and now North Dakota Governor, Doug Burgum to integrate laptop computers into the lives of the children ~ just as was done for him as an elementary student. Ken was feeling as though things were moving into full circle.

For Ken, high school was all about academics and sports. He excelled academically, ending his high school career as co-valedictorian. He had natural ability in both basketball and track, with track being his preferred sport. Throughout high school, Ken especially enjoyed his advanced math classes: calculus and trigonometry. Mr. Rick Schmiedeberg was one of his favorite teachers along with Mr. Fred Yoos, his English teacher. Ken played basketball from third grade through high school. His basketball team suffered a devastating loss during the Region 8 championship round, depriving his Pony team of a second straight trip to the state tournament. However, that same year, his track season made up for the crushing loss in basketball. Ken broke the Long Jump and High Jump records and made it to state in both events. He ended up scratching all 3 prelim jumps in the long jump and scratched 2 of 3 in the triple so his state results were a personal disappointment. Like all small town teens, Ken recalls fondly memorable times with his friends. Driving "the loop" is something every kid from the '70's through the '90's did to pass the time! The Warren Bowling Alley or Warren Theater was a sure spot to find the guys on weekend nights. Later, once they had drivers' licenses, they would cruise to Forks to enjoy hockey games or movies.

The deadline for submitting the nomination is May 1, 2022.

The Story of Ken Satkunam *(continued from page 1)*



Ken remembers with fondness the close-knit living of a small Minnesota town.

Following his graduation, Ken attended MSUM (Minnesota State University, Moorhead). He continued his academic success, graduating Cum Laude and earning a degree in CIS (Computer Information Systems), with a minor in Business Management. Sports continued to influence him; competing on the Dragon Track Team as a long jumper and sprinter. Throughout college Ken remained focused on IT and the industry. He completed an internship at Great Plains Software, which was later acquired by Microsoft of Fargo. It was at Great Plains, where he first met Doug Burgum and was introduced to technology improvements at the Oak Grove School.

Following college, Ken took employment with Lutheran Health System (LHS) where he began to learn his trade. LHS soon merged with another company from Phoenix, named Samaritan Health Systems. This merger later became Banner Health System, a large non-profit health system which now employs over 35,000 workers. Amid this large health care environment, Ken gained valuable IT enterprising experience. It enabled him to feel comfortable entering any health organization with ease.

It was at this time, he began his private company, “NorthStar Technology Group” so the name would make it appear there were several employees, when in reality, Ken was working independently from home! While working with LHS, Ken had the opportunity to interface with multiple software vendors; he began building a cache of resources to facilitate growth in his personal private enterprise simultaneously. He gained knowledge and experience in enterprise-grade software for the health care and long-term care facilities such as nursing homes and hospitals. Quickly, Ken realized this was a rapidly growing market and he felt his skills and technology group could make a difference. One by one, he reached out to his health care contacts and pitched NorthStar Technology Group as a new service provider able to fill all their cybersecurity needs. Those connections provided him a valuable “foot in the door” with larger companies in need of cybersecurity.

These conversations led to Ken’s “big break.” He tells this story often, it is the backbone of his career. He is quite proud of these moments in his career. He began to have cybersecurity conversations with a large physical therapy company with more than 300 locations across the United States and 1,500 employees. At this time, his “company” consisted of himself, one other part time guy and an office gal ~ but Ken was extremely determined. He reached out to their point of contact who posed one question: Can you support all of our locations? Now, not wanting to sound unimpressive, Ken quickly began making promises. “Of course, of course I can do this!” These were promises he wasn’t sure he could ever fulfill, but he was now headlong into his entrepreneurialism!! (Ken describes this as one of the “dirty little secrets” of owning your own business: make the promises, then figure out how to deliver later!) Here he was, a 3-person company, making promises to cover over 300 sites! Wow! At this point, he’s sitting in his home “office” and trying to brainstorm how he could possibly manage this.

Then, an idea hit him! On his desk was a stack of IT magazines. He suddenly recalled reading an article in one of the trade journals about an organization that created a database of IT contractors throughout the U.S. Hmmm, could he possibly find that golden nugget of information to help springboard him and his company? With much animation, Ken describes his frenetic thumbing through those magazines in search of ONE small business card-sized article he had a fleeting memory of, somewhere in the stack. But again, his endless determination paid off in dividends. Finally, he located what he’d been looking for! Amid the articles in one trade journal, he located the small article, buried deep in the stack of magazines. He describes the find as “the music of his dreams exploding like fireworks in his head!” This website provided a means of searching by zip code all the IT

contractors in a given region! He immediately penned a proposal to the CFO stating that his company has access to support every single location. His point-of-contact for the major company called him, requesting a meeting with him in Vegas to present his IT proposal! Ken was ecstatic and could hardly believe his good fortune. So... without further adieu, he booked a quick trip to Vegas to meet with the guy, proposal in hand. He was nervously apprehensive. But, bad news struck. His contact phoned him hours prior to the much anticipated meeting and told him the CFO was not going to make the trip. Ken was crestfallen, but quickly agreed to a phone conversation. The lengthy conversation grilled Ken left and right on everything related to his proposal, IT cybersecurity and he was fielding questions from all angles. He remained confident and sure in his skills. Ken ended up signing a marginal contract with that company. However, in the next three years, he ended up tripling that contract, generating \$4-5 million over the span of the agreement. He was on his way! He jokes that it all started from a small magazine article he stumbled upon. It was, literally, the flip of a magazine page!

Now, he quickly realized he’d need to deliver. It would be a stretch for him and his small, but grand company. All went well with those initial meetings, opening more doors to him and his growing enterprise.

Once he secured that original contract, his company quickly acquired other contracts from PT (physical therapy) companies. To think, none of it would have happened if not for the flip of that one magazine! His next acquisitions were Prairie St. John’s Hospital, along with all hospitals in North Dakota unaffiliated with Sanford. More stretch opportunities began to present themselves and Ken was finding the company was doing well with each of them. One of his first stretch acquisitions was Endura Care, which was a big step forward!

Soon after that initial contract was signed, Ken knew he had to come up with a brick and mortar “office,” so he quickly got to work in Fargo locating the perfect spot. Needing space and meeting rooms, Ken located a condo by the Golf Bubble, his offer was accepted and all the lights were turning green on his enterprise. He knew it had to be a sign! He began to work on his mega-customer and planned for a regional manager’s meeting; including 17 managers ~ but Ken STILL had no desks assembled in his office! He put on the façade of a large company, when in reality, Ken was working from a card table and folding chairs in his empty office space. He jokingly reminisces about making promises with big customers but all the while he didn’t even have a single desk in his office. His office crew was literally painting the walls while he was having the virtual meetings ~ with a grand office view pasted into his background. It all seemed so surreal, but Ken was actually advancing NorthStar Technology Group and launching his enterprise.

Life’s not all work with Ken, however. His view of life is like a roller coaster~you end up in places you never thought you would. He is happily married to his best

friend, Jill and the couple is busy raising their blended “Brady Bunch” family. Ken admittedly relies on her loving support through all his endeavors. He describes her as having a kind heart, gentle and loving. She enjoys fitness, dining out and family-focused activities. Ken’s two sons Noah and Dylan along with Jill’s daughters, Ashlin and Kyra form a tight family unit. Ashlin, the eldest of the four, is their artsy, flower child. She is kind, gentle, and loves the arts and theater improv. She currently works as a host at “Rose Wild,” in Block 9 in Fargo. Then there is Noah, 18 and a senior, graduating a semester early at South Fargo Davies High School. At 6’4”, he loves anything related to technology. He’s a “math guy.” As a day trader, Noah’s passion lies in buying and reselling but has great interest in cars and engines. Dylan, the third child, loves football and video games. Like Jill, Dylan is extremely kind-hearted. Kyra is 10 and is the youngest. She’s starting to blossom with many friendships and pre-teen activities. She loves art, rocks, spiders and geology. She enjoys watching movies and reading books.

Ken will openly express his ambition and drive for success, without hesitation, for his family. The family resides in Fargo, but enjoy going to their lake home, hanging out, playing football and making memories together. They have recently purchased a home in Arizona and have begun remodeling for the next phase in their lives; retreating to the tranquil mountains. Until then... you can find this WAO alumni CEO in his office, working in the enormous world of cybersecurity at NorthStar Technology Group ~ securing our hospitals, businesses and elderly facilities ~ minus the red cape, of course!

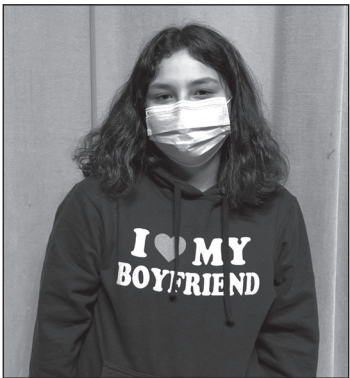

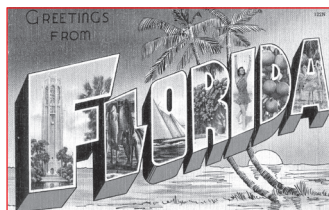

Chat with the Chairman

Greetings from the Warren / Alvarado / Oslo Education Foundation!

Winter has returned to NW Minnesota after a hot, dry summer.

The summer of 2021 was an exciting time for the Foundation. It was wonderful to see many alumni and friends back “home” for the Marshall County Fair, class reunions, and our 16th annual golf scramble. The scramble was held on one of the hottest days of the summer. As golfers came into the clubhouse for lunch, the words that echoed were “it’s so hot out there, but we are having lots of fun!” We tried to keep everyone hydrated with carts delivering water throughout the day. We were most fortunate that no one suffered heat stroke that day! This is one of our major fund raising events for the year. Over \$27,000 was raised this year! Wow! In addition we held the drawing for our raffle at the same time. Only 125 tickets were sold at \$100 each. The \$500 winners were Mary Beth Edman and Kailee Dvorak (-) Kaitlin Peterson - \$1,000 and Jim & Belinda Folz (-) \$3,000. The raffle netted us \$6,800. All of the money from these events goes back to our staff and students.

We have funded many things for the district over the years. In October, we funded \$22,282.41 and during the summer we funded \$5,453.06 for staff needs requests. The major part of the summer request was for kindergarten. The three teachers each requested a kitchen set that included 4 units: cupboard, stove, sink, and refrigerator. The students are given the opportunity for daily dramatic play. I subbed in Kindergarten 3 days this fall, It was so interesting to watch the students interact during this playtime. They are most creative.

15 dozen WAO Education Foundation pencils were handed out by board members and volunteers during the annual Marshall County Fair Parade this year.

Our volunteers are amazing workers and helpers. We couldn’t begin to do big events without their help. Many of the volunteers have helped almost every year since the Foundation started doing the golf scramble. An added addition to the golf scramble this year was when Deanna (Carlson) Zink and her husband, Wayne, asked last winter if they could be at the hole where brats are grilled. Deanna is the CEO of the UND Alumni Association & Foundation and a 1982 WHS Grad. We provided the buns and brats, but they brought MANY other snacks and treats for the golfers. Thank you to all our faithful volunteers!

We were honored and proud to work with Charlie Roux on the Jazz Band Reunion Concert that was held during the Marshall County Fair weekend. It was a great fundraiser for the WAO Band Program.

We have eleven new full-time staff this year and one part-time staff member. Each full-time staff member received \$200 from the Foundation to purchase items for their classroom/programs. Part time instructors received \$100.00. Each instructor also received a \$50.00 gift certificate from the WAO Wearhouse to purchase “Pony” items.

Again this year we are providing a monthly Scholastic book for each student in pre-kindergarten through 6th grade. This funding will come from the CJ Anderson Endowment in the amount of \$6,696.

American Education Week was the week of November 15th. Each school employee received a \$10.00 gift card from one of the convenience stores in Warren as a thank you for their support and dedication to the district. It has not been an easy road for employees during the Covid-19 pandemic.

February 19th will find many snowbirds and visitors gathering in Arizona and Florida for the Warren Area Gatherings. You’ll find the details in this issue on other pages. Both were canceled last year because of Covid-19.

If you are in need of a holiday gift or if you haven’t had the opportunity to purchase one of our Foundation Cookbooks at a local business, at the elementary office or by mail, know that we still have a good supply. The price is now \$10 and if we mail it to you, the cost would be \$15 with shipping.

Thank you to many of you that have contacted us with the change of address or the passing of an alumnus. We truly appreciate your assistance in keeping our database as current as possible.
