# Course Title

English 2A (CP)

# **Description of Target Group**

This is the first semester of a two-semester course intended to meet the district's graduation requirement. It is designed for all students who have passed English 1A and 1B-CP with an A or B, have the freshman teacher's recommendation, and plan to continue education at a college or university.

## Purpose

This course will continue to provide students with activities, which will develop effective communication through reading, writing, speaking, and listening. Students will review parts of speech, punctuation, capitalization, usage, and have extensive practice with simple, compound, complex, and compound-complex sentences. Critical reading, writing, speaking, and listening skills will focus on using analytical and evaluative thinking and reinforce the grammar and literature study. Both group and individual projects will be assigned which entail a written research report and an oral presentation. In addition, students will explore career and college information.

Students will continue practice with simple, compound, complex, and compound-complex sentences; a variety of these sentences will be expected in their essays. Critical reading, writing, speaking, and listening skills will focus on using analytical and evaluative thinking and reinforce the grammar and literature study. Both group and individual projects will be assigned which entail a written research report and an oral presentation.
