Budgeted Income for 2012-2013 \$420,000

I remember summer break. It was

just last week, wasn't it? We got most of the things done that we planned to do over the break. Those things that we didn't get done will have to wait or be worked into the regular school schedule because we are back in operation. The students God has sent our way and the families they come from are why we do the things we do during the summer break to get ready for another school year.

Staff and volunteers have completed a number of projects throughout the summer, especially on three Saturday morning workdays. Some of these projects will be obvious to everyone, while other projects will be largely unknown except to the staff and volunteers who actually did them. I saw a lot of them. God saw them all. This is just one more way that God provides through the generosity of His people to support His ministry.

While Nebraska Christian Schools continues to rely on gift income in order to operate, our budget for the 2012-2013 school year does not rely on gift income quite as much as the budget for the 2011-2012 school year

did. We chose to do this because we did not receive as much gift income last year as we had budgeted for. We accomplished this by making some increases in tuition and fees, giving out limited and minimal pay increases to staff, tying student financial aid more closely to what has actually been given for that purpose, and eliminating one staff position.

It is board policy to hold "tuition costs to a minimum by utilizing other means of fund raising." In time, we hope to be able to increase the amount of gift income available to Nebraska Christian Schools. Toward that end, several changes have been made in the structure and staffing of our development office and by the Nebraska Christian Schools Foundation.

Jody Heuermann, who has served for several years as our director of development and as the executive director of the foundation, was asked by the foundation board to drop her position in our development office and to focus exclusively on her role as executive director of the foundation. They believe and we concur that Jody will be more effective if we free her up from the many different things she has been

What kind of savings accounts do you have? Financial planners always recommend that individuals

Because our focus is not solely on the current year's annual budget, we are able to invest the resources entrusted to us and help them grow. As we watch the resources grow, we also watch our ability to aid the school in its times of greatest need.

Development Office by Stephani (Deichmann '03) Francl



I didn't want the job - at least not right now. I sat in the meeting with three of the leaders of Nebraska Chris-

tian looking me in the eye, telling me that I should be the next Development Director. My head was spinning. I didn't know whether to laugh or cry.

It's such a huge job, I thought, not that huge jobs had ever scared me off before. I'm so young, I thought, though I'm not as young as I used to be and one of my favorite verses is 1 Timothy 4:12: "Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young..." My husband will want me to stay home with my baby, I thought, until I called him and he said, "Of course you're perfect for the job! We'll figure out how to make it work with our daughter."

It was settled. And here I am.

So let me introduce myself. My name is Stephani (Deichmann) Francl. I attended Nebraska Christian Schools for grades Kindergarten through 12. After graduation in 2003, I attended Hillsdale College

in Hillsdale, Michigan, where I graduated with a degree in Political Science. While in college, I married my high school sweetheart, Chase Francl, who also graduated from NC (class of 2002) and attended and graduated from Hillsdale. I worked for two years as the Research Assistant to the President of Hillsdale College before earning my Master's Degree in American Government from Georgetown University. Chase and I spent two years in the Washington, DC area and last year decided to move back home to Nebraska to raise our family.

And that is what brought me to that moment with those three NC leaders this spring.

And simply put, that's why I've agreed to come on board. Nebraska Christian is a miracle of a school that's somehow survived against all odds for over 50 years. When it was founded, many critics said, "How will a Christian school survive without denominational support?" "How will a private school survive in a farming community?" "How will a dormitory system work in small town Nebraska?"

The answer: The Hand of God.

Now, I have the opportunity to help the school continue to exist, not only for my children, but perhaps for yours too. Maybe your child or grandchild will be one of my child's best friends. Maybe someday my child will meet her spouse at NC, like her daddy and I met here.

I am excited to be joining the staff

of Nebraska Christian, to do what God is asking me to do right now and to see what He will do in this unique little institution. In my position as Development Director, I have been asked to focus on three major goals:

To reconnect with our alumni. Are you an alum of NC who's lost touch? Do you have some life experience that might be helpful for our current students? Advice about your college experience or your work experience that you could share? Do you have something about your NC experience that you'd like to share with me as Development Director?
