A Walk Around Campus

A GOOD FRIEND OF MINE, also a Head of School, once remarked that if you truly want to understand the life of your campus, you have to step out of the office and walk in the shoes of your students. Over the years, I've found that to be absolutely true.

For me, any walk begins at morning drop-off at the Lower School. Few things are more inspiring than the smiles of children as they clamber out of cars, eager to learn something new. Hand in hand with our sixth-grade AM-bassadors, I'm reminded of how contagious their excitement can be. Even at such a young age, their sense of responsibility is remarkable — putting away belongings, greeting teachers and classmates warmly, and preparing for the day with genuine anticipation.

By mid-morning, my steps carry me to the Upper School. Between classes, students gather beneath the oaks near the Bell Tower, pausing to offer a cheerful “hello” or ask about my weekend. Their conversations, as timeless as they are familiar, revolve around upcoming tests, homework assignments, or the next big game. These small exchanges reveal the shared rhythms of school life — moments that shape friendships and memories for years to come.

A stop inside Gilmer Gym shows what students can accomplish when they work together as a team. While Physical Education classes race across the court, the banners hanging on the walls recall seasons of perseverance, teamwork, and determination. These lessons are just as central to learning as anything taught in the classroom. At Fuqua School, the pursuit of excellence — whether academic, artistic, or athletic — goes hand in hand in preparing our students for life.

In the afternoon, walking past the Skeeter Fore Athletic Complex toward the future site of our new Upper School, I often hear the sounds of our band drifting in the air. The crash of cymbals, the steady beat of bass drums, and the soaring notes of wind instruments create music that feels well beyond our students' years. Again and again, they share their gifts with the wider community — whether performing at festivals, honoring veterans at our downtown program, or moving us at dinner concerts that leave audiences amazed.



As the day winds down and the final bell rings, school buses climb the hill, students gather for pick-up, and teachers wrap up another full day of teaching. Coaches head to the fields, teams move from study hall to practice, and the cycle of learning, growth, and community begins anew. Each day, all of us — students, faculty, staff, and families — work together to cultivate character and opportunity through a rigorous education and a nurturing community that prepares our students for lives of purpose.

If you ever have the chance, I invite you to take this walk with me. I am confident you'll leave as inspired as I am by the remarkable work happening here at Fuqua School — and by the bright future being built on this hill.

7th and 8th grades enjoyed a color war to conclude the school year.

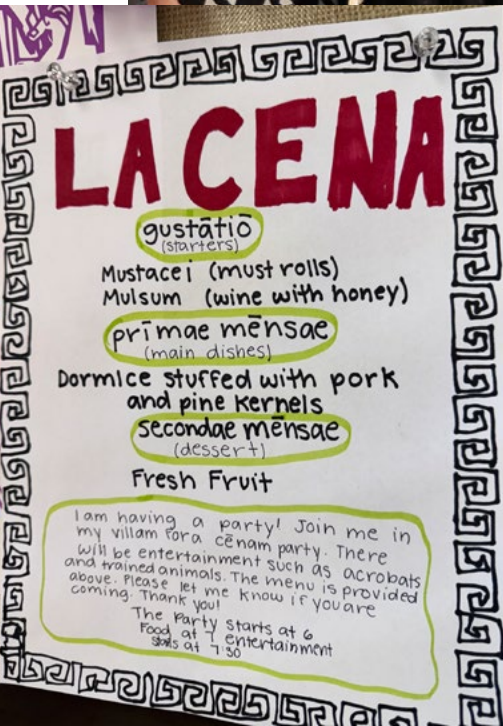

explored pottery, the Trevi Fountain, the Pantheon, and the world of gladiators. It was a wonderful opportunity to bring history to life!

FUQUA SCHOOL is thrilled to announce that its Concert Band earned 1st Place in Class 1A at the prestigious WorldStrides music competition held in Boston, Massachusetts. Under the direction of Band Director Mr. Tyler Gage and Assistant Director Sam Andrews, the band also received a Silver rating overall, a remarkable achievement that reflects the talent, dedication, and discipline of the student musicians.

The group embarked on the multi-day trip with a full itinerary that combined performance preparation, cultural enrichment, and team-building experiences. After arriving in Boston, the band took part in a custom master class at the Boston Youth Symphony Orchestra Youth Center for Music, led by Mr. Mark Olson of Harvard University. This incredible opportunity allowed students to sharpen their skills and receive expert feedback ahead of their performance.

Throughout the trip, the band explored some of Boston's most iconic landmarks and cultural attractions. They enjoyed a guided tour of the Freedom Trail and



lunch at Quincy Market before attending an unforgettable performance by the Blue Man Group at the Charles Playhouse. The following day included a fun and informative Boston Duck Tour and an interactive lunch at Fire and Ice. On their final day, the students visited Salem, where they experienced a ghost tour and explored the historic town before heading to Melrose High School for the competition.

After their performance, the group returned to the hotel to relax by the pool

before gathering for dinner, the awards ceremony, and a celebratory dance. The Concert Band was recognized with 1st Place in Class 1A and a Silver rating overall, an exciting conclusion to an unforgettable trip.

Community Service Spotlight

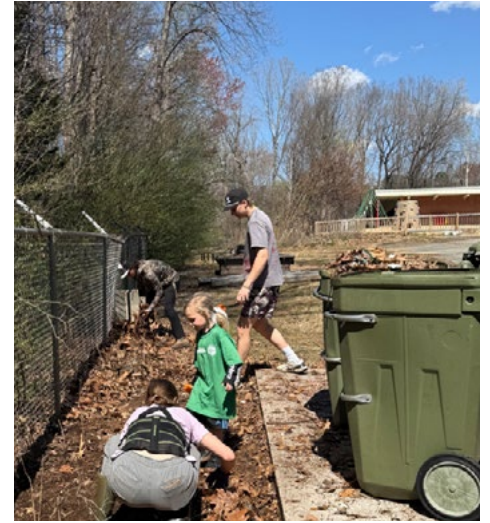

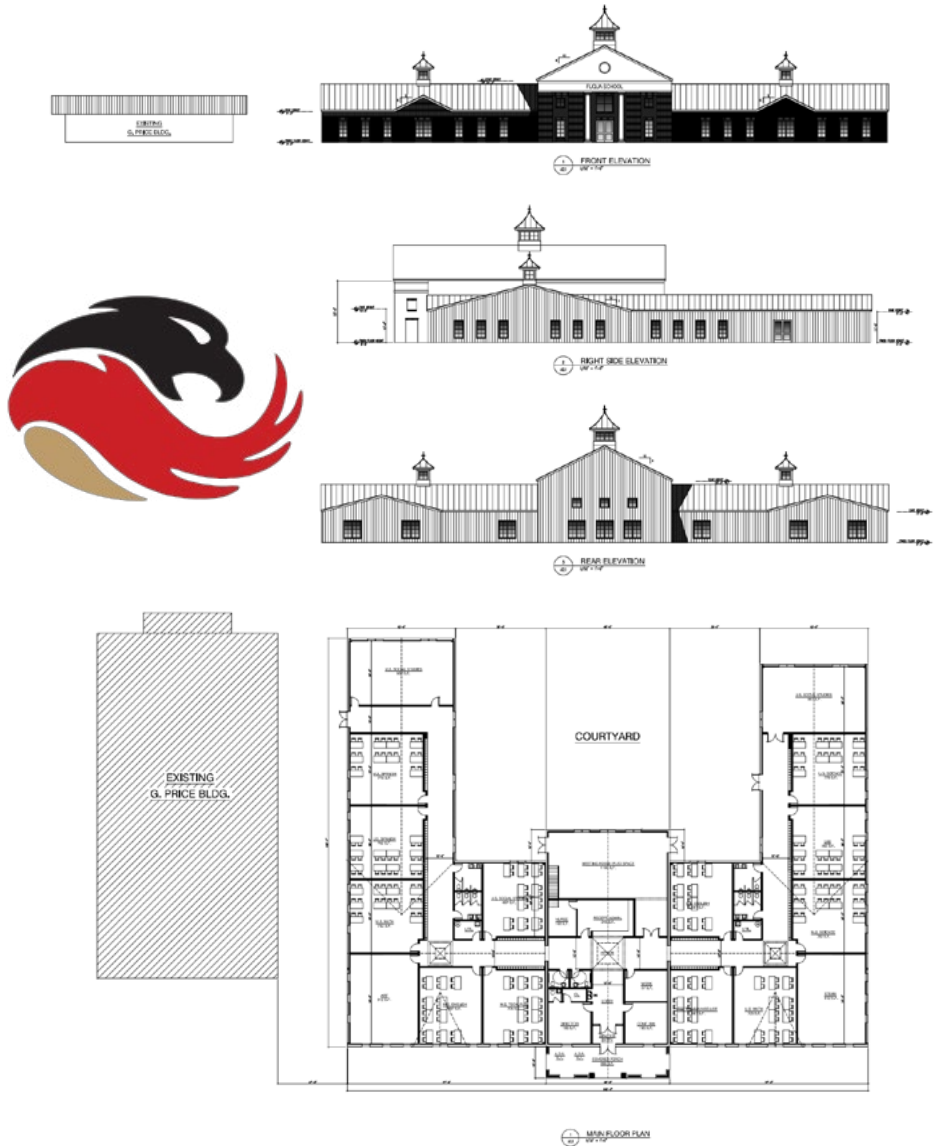

Fuqua School Commencement Speaker

DAPHNE MASON has been a part of the fabric of Fuqua School for decades. On May 23, this retired former Fuqua faculty member gave the Commencement address to the Class of 2025. A native of Farmville, she attended Farmville High School and then Westhampton College (now University of Richmond), where she earned her B.A. in English and History. She later received her M.A. in English from Longwood College (now University). In addition, she was also awarded a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities to study Shakespeare at the University of Maryland. After a brief teaching stint in Roanoke at Breckinridge Junior High in 1961–62, Mrs. Mason returned to Farmville and married Robert “Bob” Mason and assumed her position as an English teacher at Prince Edward Academy.

A devoted scholar of British literature, she taught nearly 2000 students at P.E.A. and then Fuqua during her 42-year tenure on the faculty. Mrs. Mason cultivated a love of literature and writing in her students and many recall her significant impact on their education and development. Students remember her extensive knowledge, her keen wit, and her ever-present sense of humor. Mrs. Mason held her students to high standards, gave them excellent instruction, and imparted her love of literature. Former students probably also recall the Shakespearean lines she had them commit to memory when they were students such as “Tomorrow, tomorrow, and tomorrow” and “The valiant never taste of death but once.”

Mrs. Mason and her husband raised their two sons in Farmville — Taylor “Monty” Montgomery and Robert “Chris” Mason, both graduates of the Class of 1985 and Class of 1989 respectively. Two of their grandchildren, Holt and Rachel, also graduated from Fuqua’s Class of 2023. So many students cherish their memories of time spent with Mrs. Mason. In addition to teaching, she also sponsored many

organizations such as the SCA, Pep Club, and school newspaper, and also served as the Senior Class Sponsor and Sr. Play Director. Mrs. Mason has also been an active member of the Farmville community through her participation in the Commonwealth Chorale and the Waterworks Players, as well as keeping up with her grandchildren’s many activities and events.

When Mrs. Mason retired in 2005, the school installed a bench in her honor on the lawn in front of her classroom with a plaque that reads “Parting is such sweet sorrow.” These words from Shakespeare reflect both the fond feelings students and alumni have for this special lady and the place that the Fuqua/PEA graduates have in Mrs. Mason’s heart. We are all the better for her having spent her career with us and are so fortunate that she continues to be an active member of the Fuqua family to this day.

Facilities Accomplishments

THIS YEAR WAS MARKED by major progress in Facilities, with projects that strengthened our infrastructure, improved athletic spaces, and enhanced the overall student and community experience. Through the hard work of our dedicated crews and the support of key partners, we made significant upgrades across campus.

HVAC Improvements

WE REPLACED the large **Lower School Commons HVAC unit** in the gym area with **four new mini-split systems**. These systems have been working well, delivering improved comfort and greater energy efficiency for students and staff.

Athletic Renovations

- **Varsity & JV Locker Rooms** — Colin Stokes '98 and his crew completed a full renovation of the former band practice room, transforming it into a **state-of-the-art locker room** for our Varsity and JV Football and Baseball teams.
- **Visitor Locker Room Shed** — The same crew also built a **new visitor locker room facility** located behind the concession stand at the football field.
- **Roof Upgrades** — Colin Stokes' crew will also be installing a **new, updated roof** on the recently renovated locker room/band room facility.

Community & Campus Enhancements

- **Ruritan Shelter Renovation** — The crew of Colin Stokes '98, working alongside the crew of Michael Easter '96, completed a **full renovation of the Ruritan Shelter**, including a new roof and new gravel both around the shelter and along the entrance road.
- **Demolition Projects** — Easter Design completed the safe and efficient **demolition of the old Middle School Building G, the pool and pool building, and the old locker room building**, preparing the way for future development.

- **Campus Sign Relocation** — Our existing entrance sign at Longwood Avenue and Barber Street will be **relocated to the Lower School Commons entrance off Caitlin Street**. This project, generously completed at no cost by **Michael Easter '96 and Holman Masonry**, will better align campus signage with current traffic flow.

Electrical Infrastructure

A MAJOR UTILITIES UPGRADE was completed this year with the transformation of our **overhead power service to an underground service**.

This underground system is now the **main supply for the new school building**, and also provides service to the Gee Price Building, softball field, and the new football locker room/band building. This project greatly improves both safety and reliability for our campus electrical systems.

Looking Ahead

WITH THESE UPGRADES, we have not only addressed immediate facility needs but also laid a strong foundation for the future. The collaboration between our Facilities team, contractors, and community partners continues to move our campus forward with both pride and purpose.

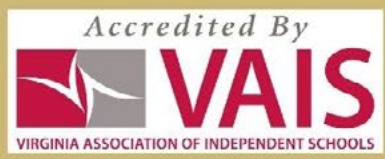
