

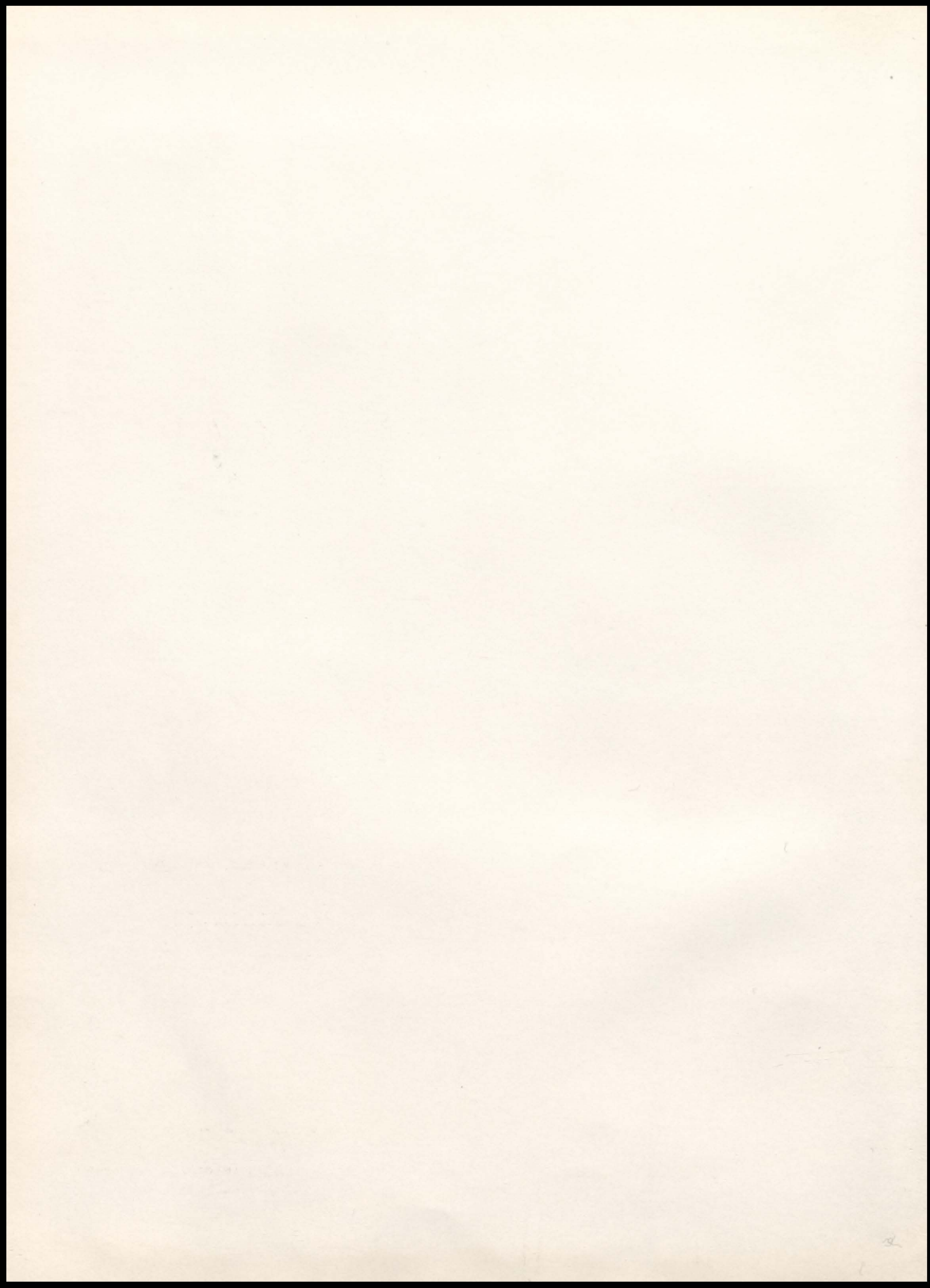

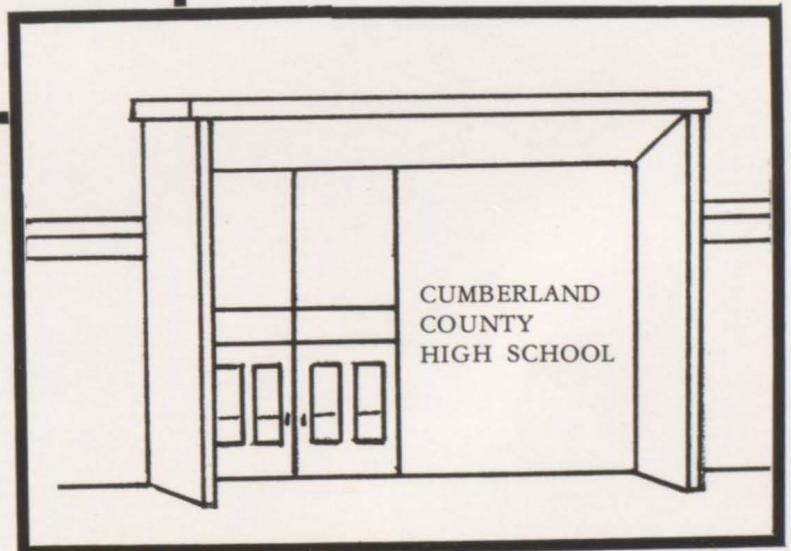
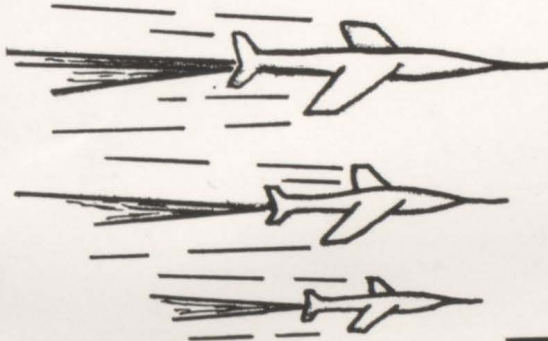

To this leader of youth and man of truth we respectfully and earnestly dedicate our 1968 PLATEAU.

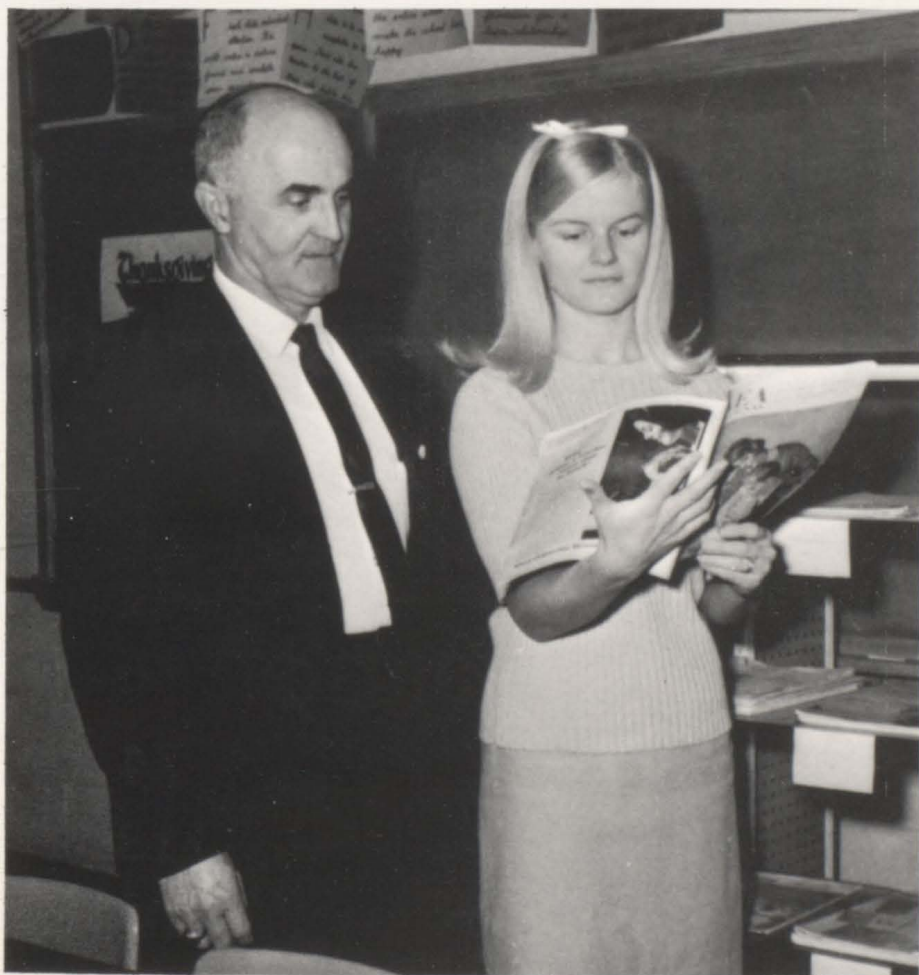


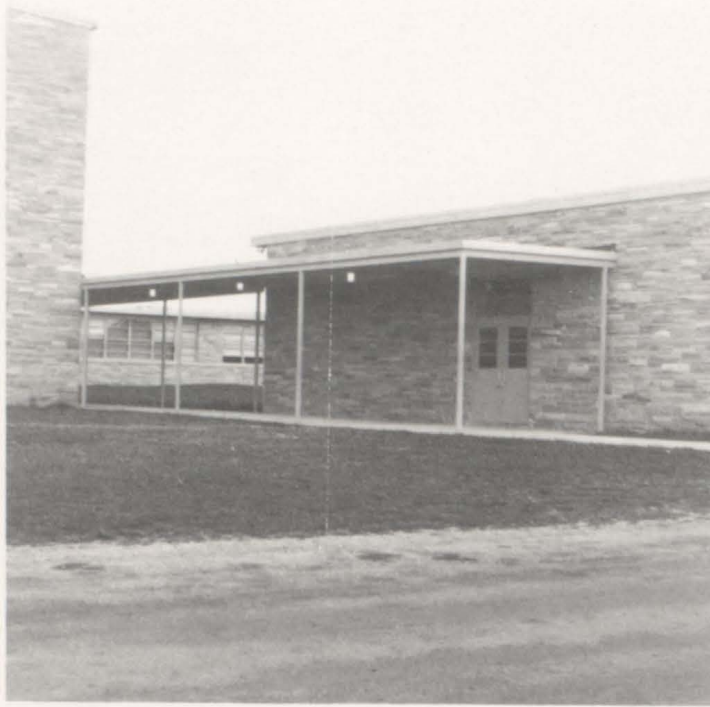

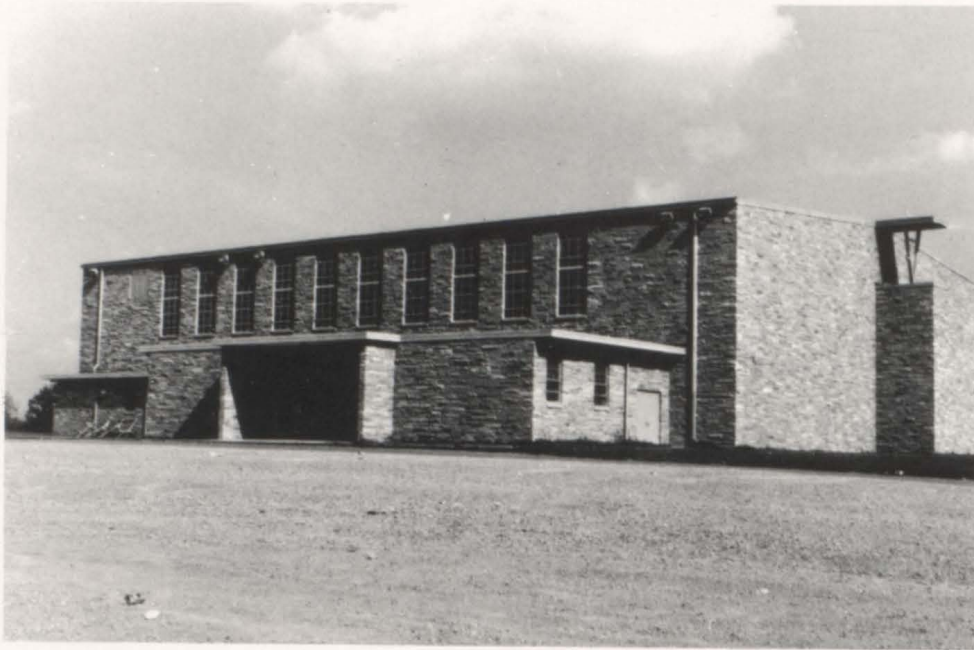

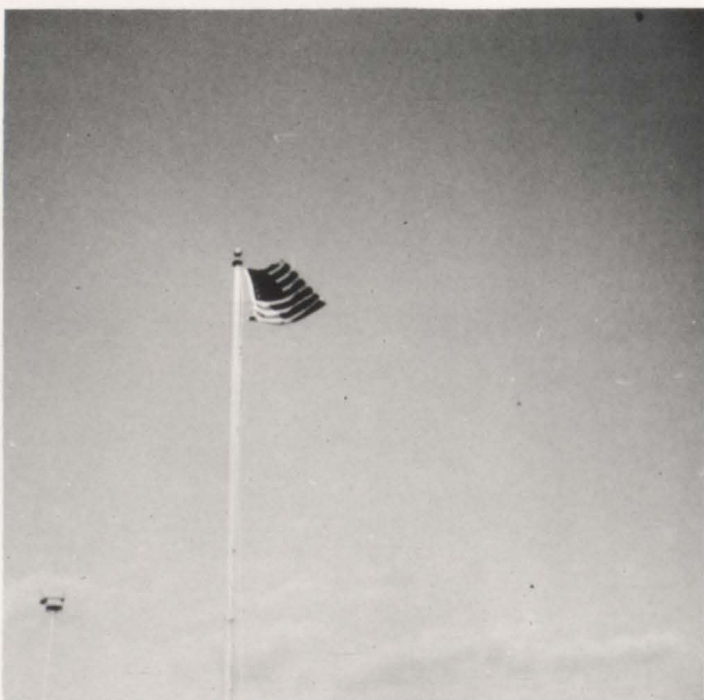

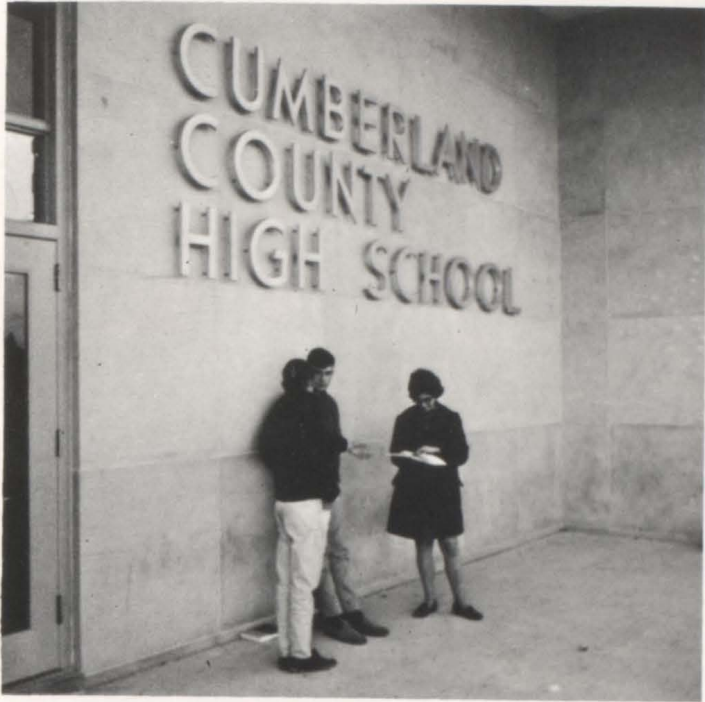

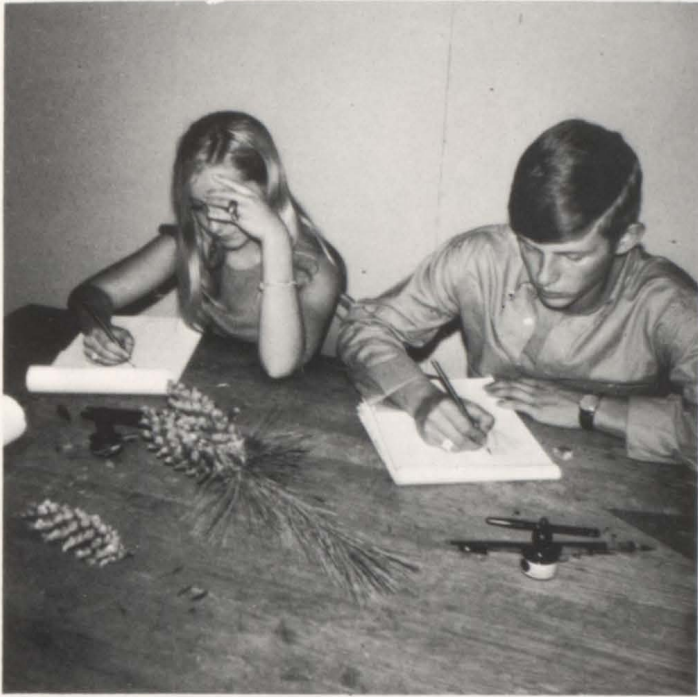

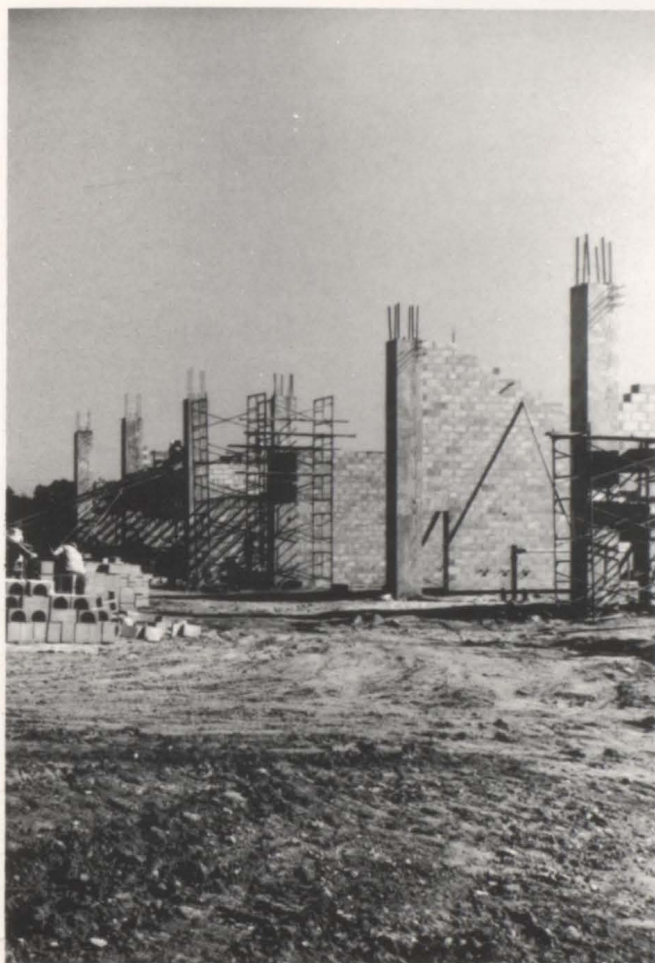

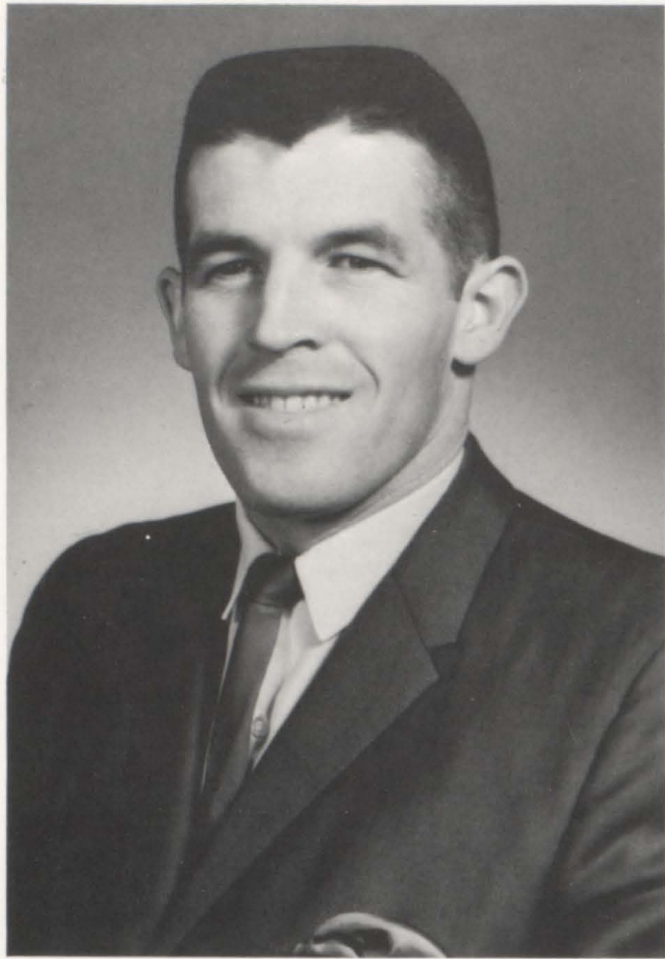

Our source of knowledge is the library. We could not do without the many fiction, non-fiction and reference books which are found there. The library also provides students a quiet place in which to study.

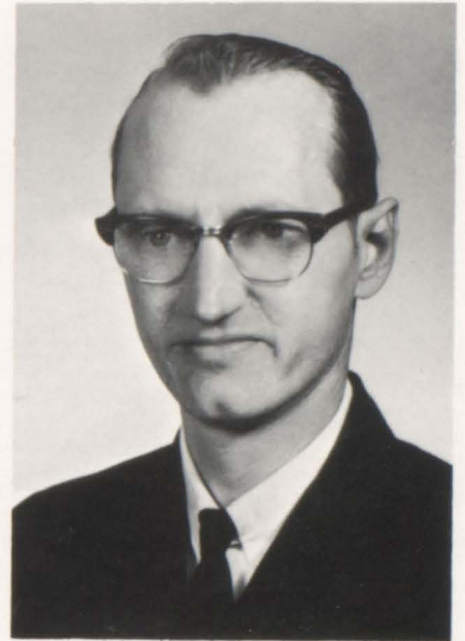

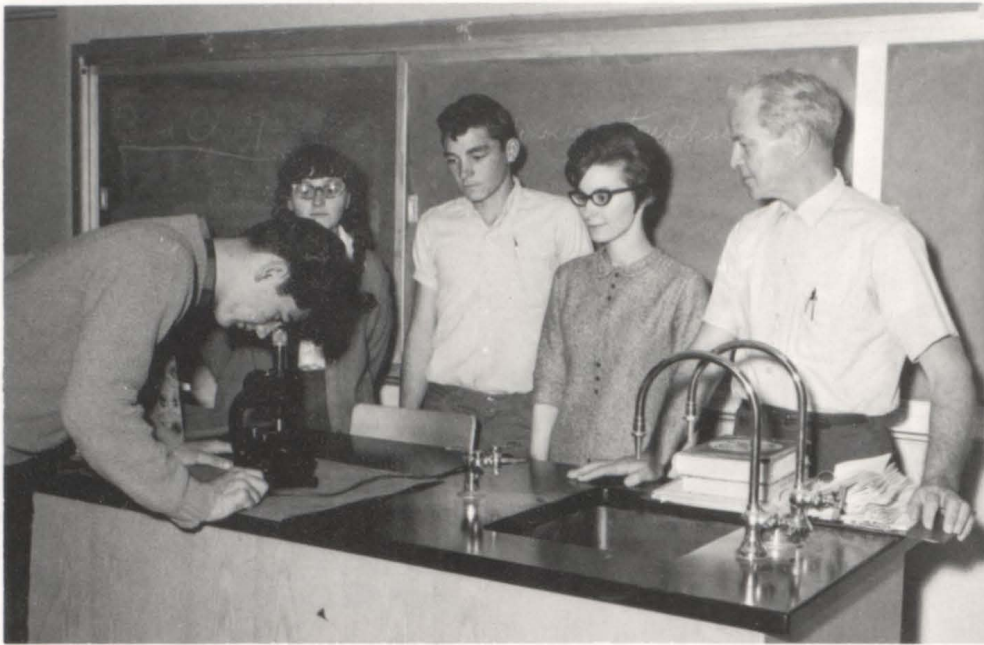

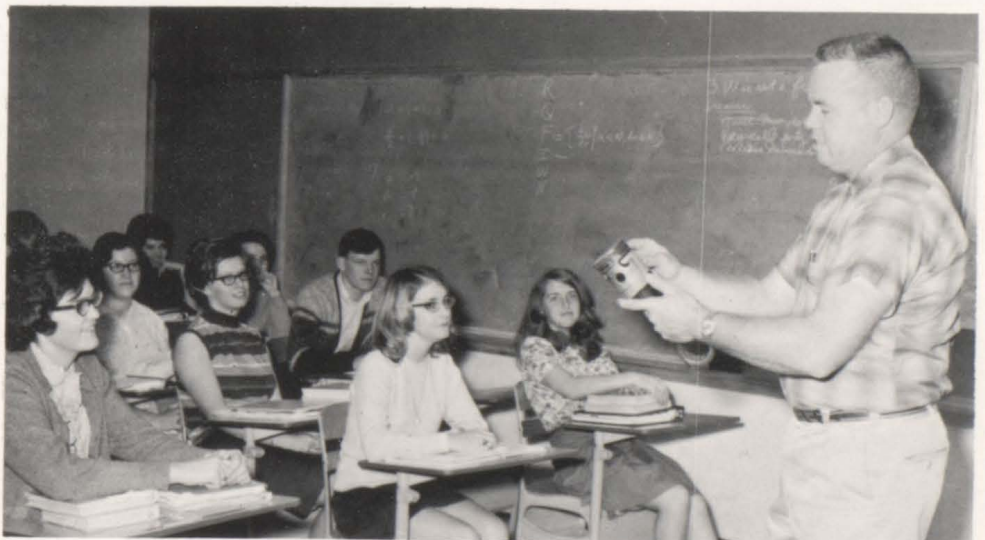

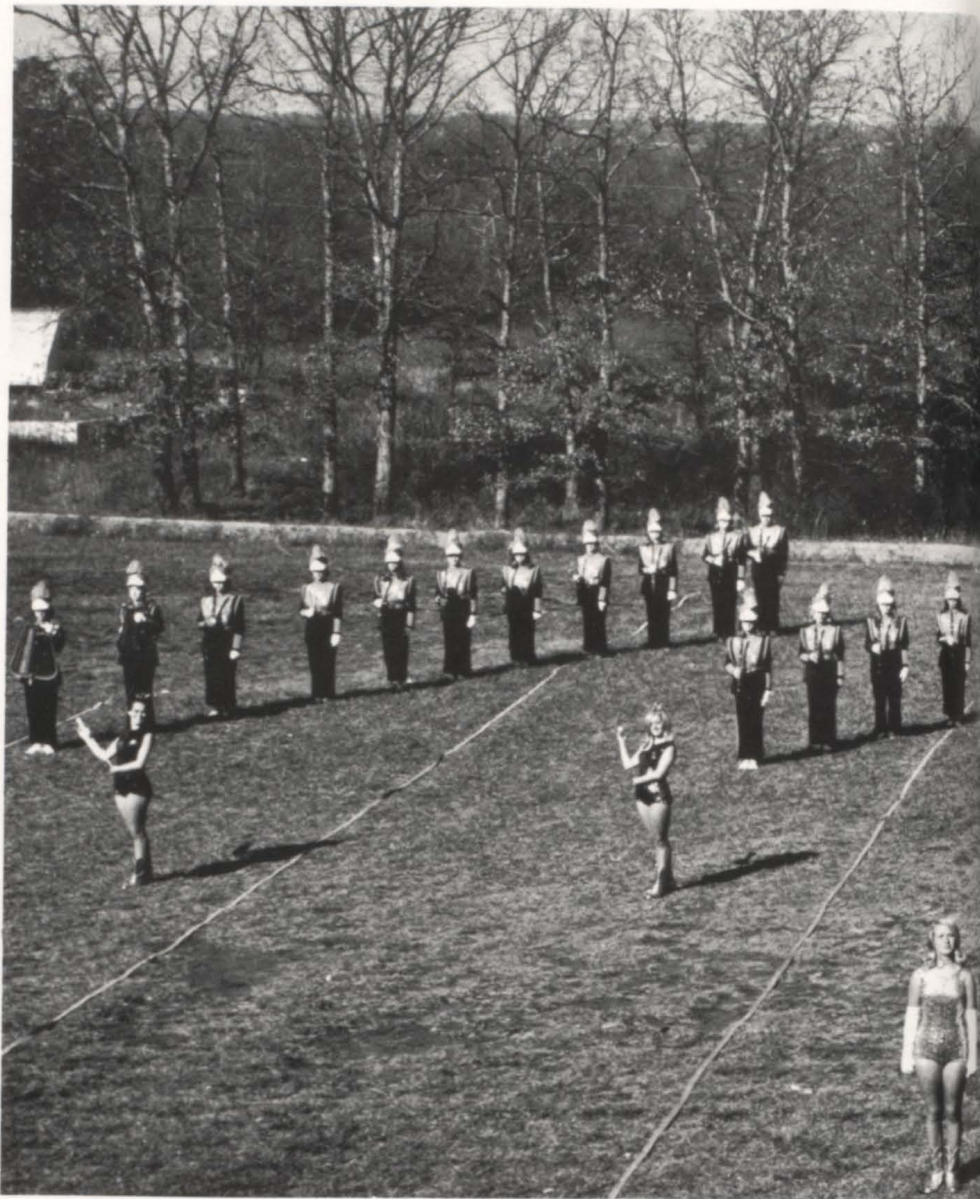

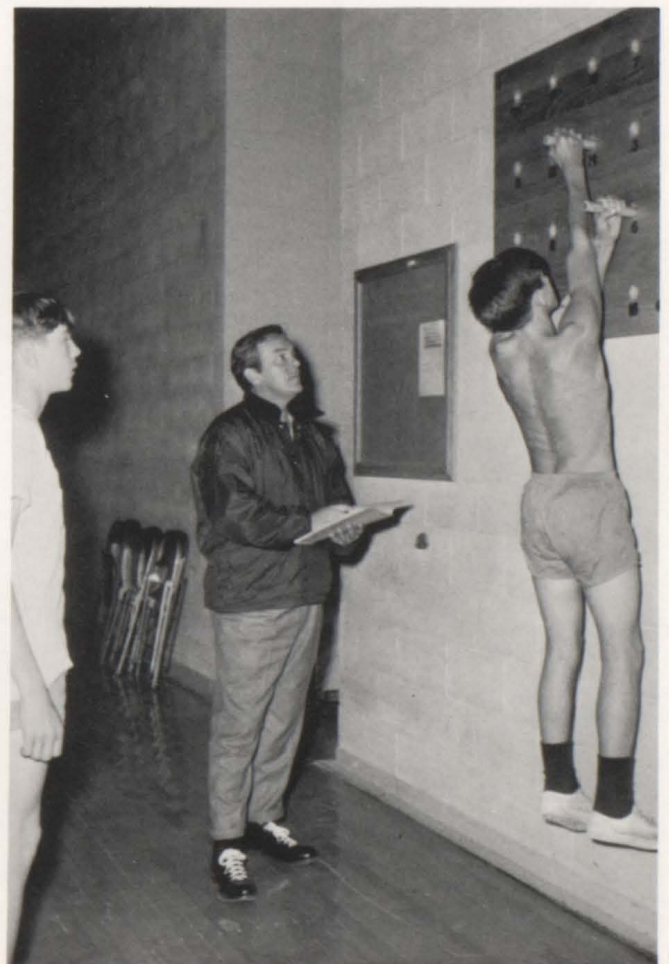

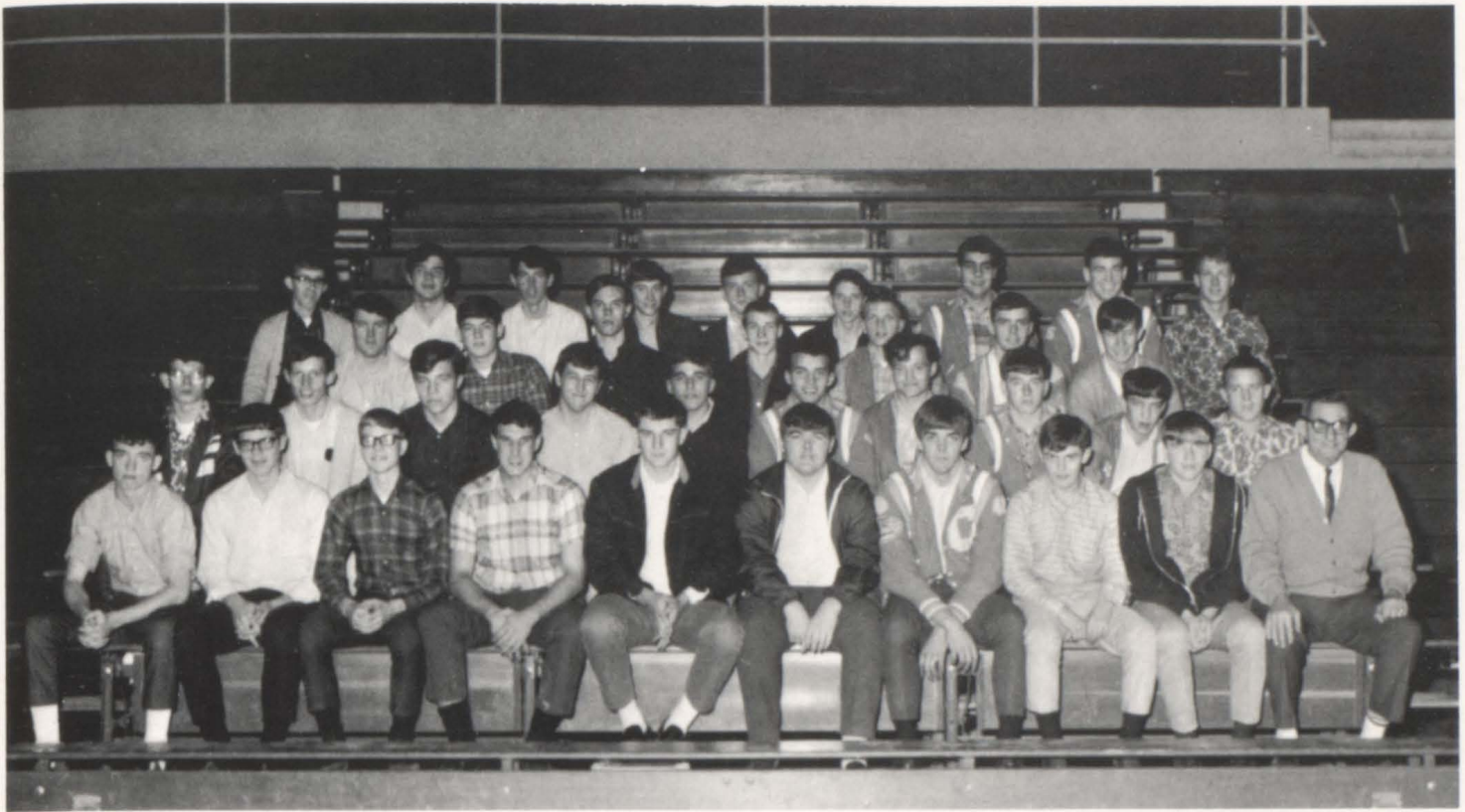

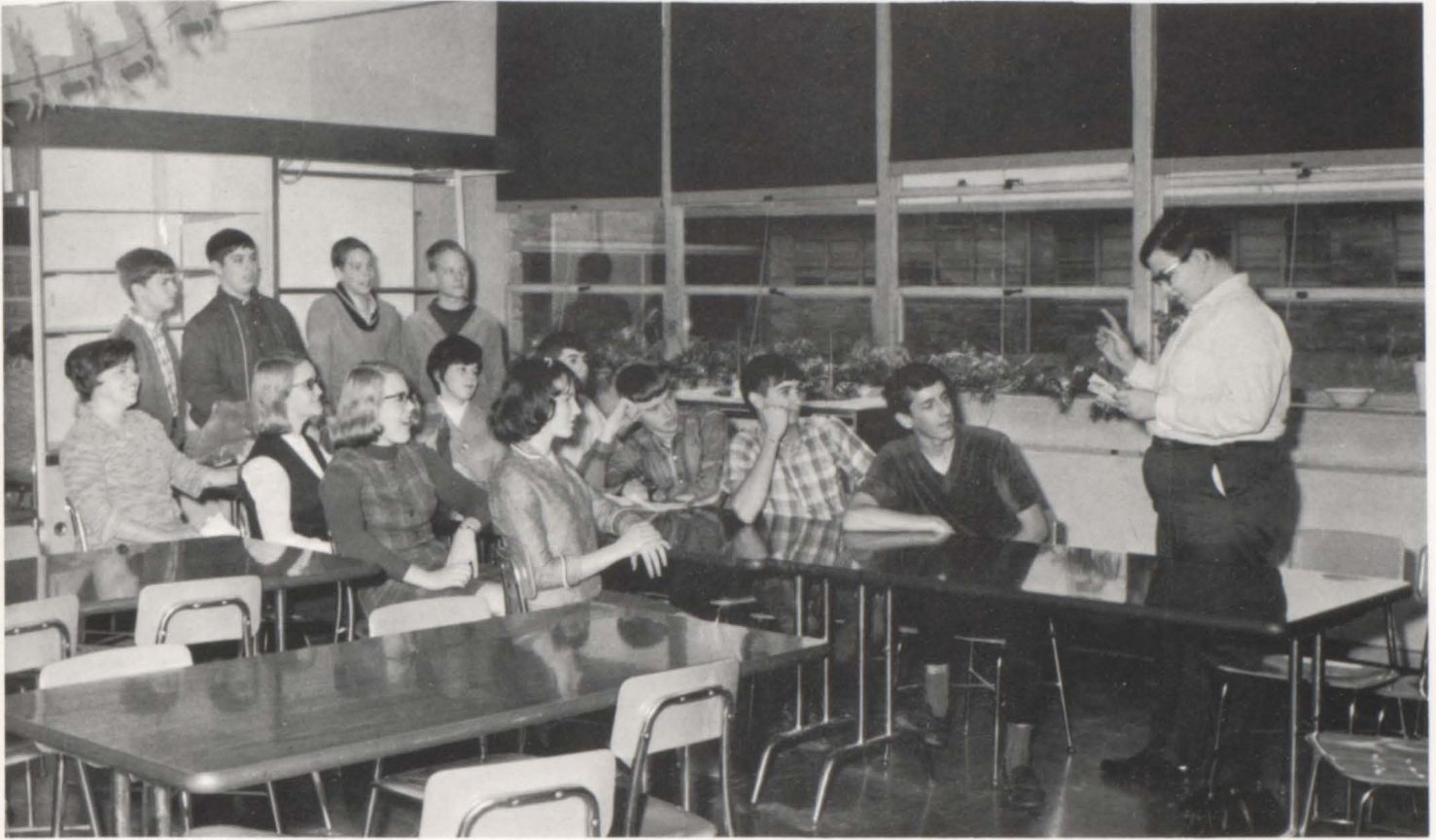
NATIONAL FORENSIC LEAGUE

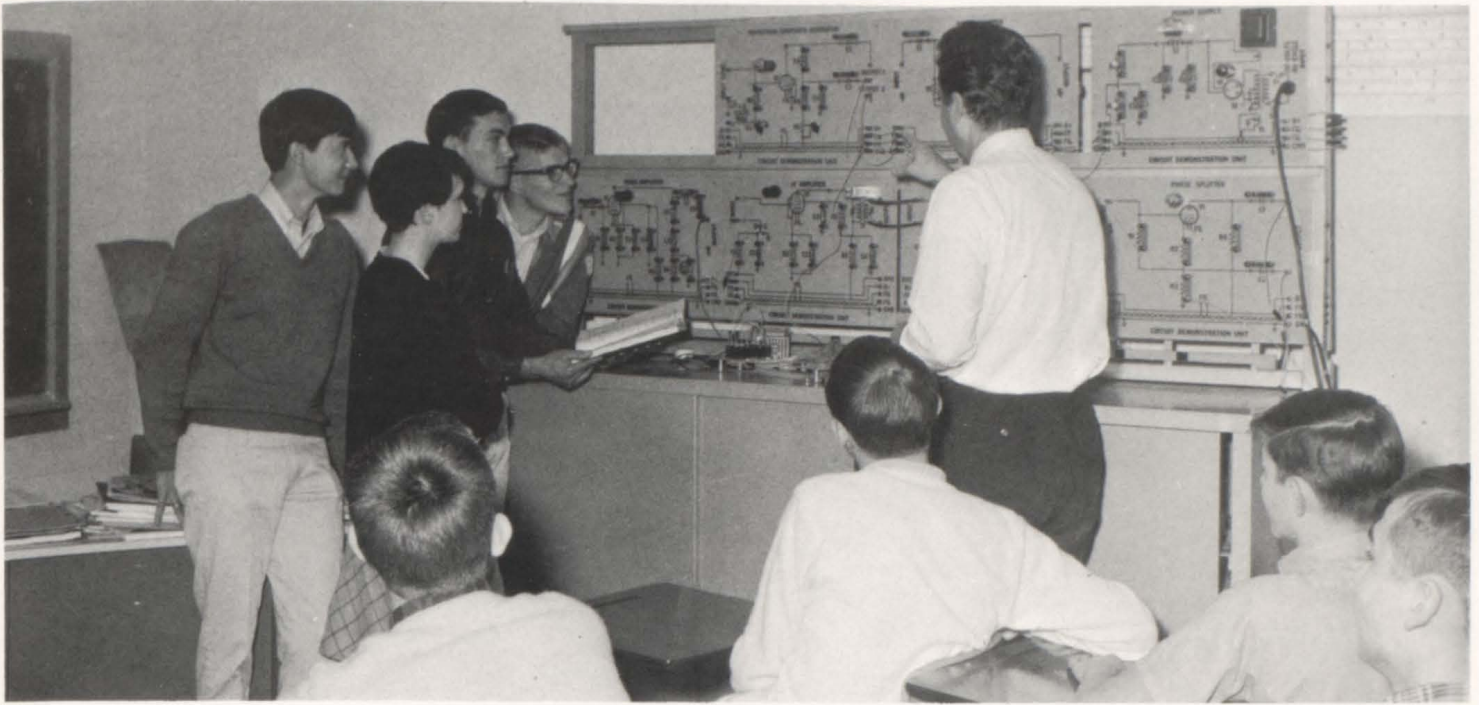

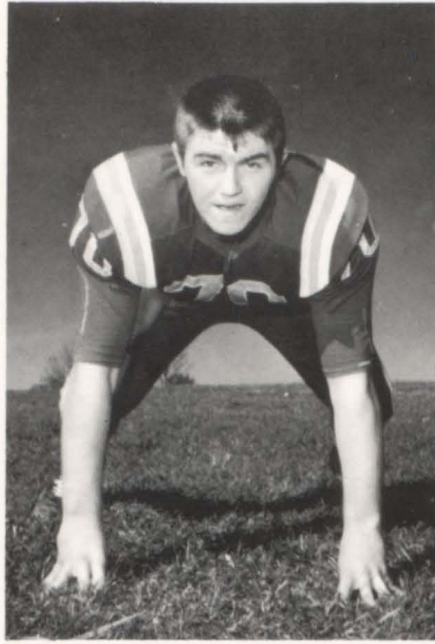

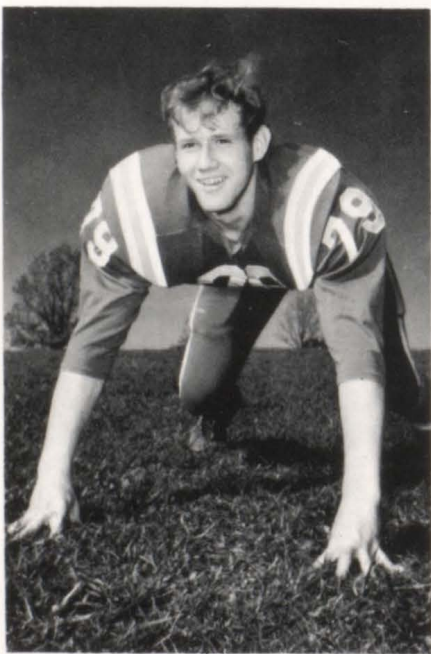

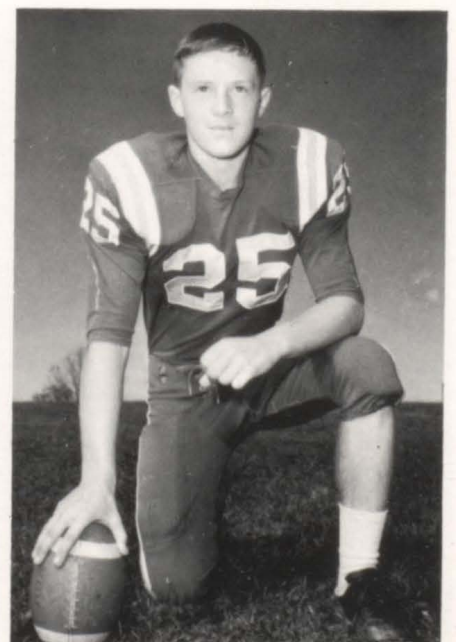

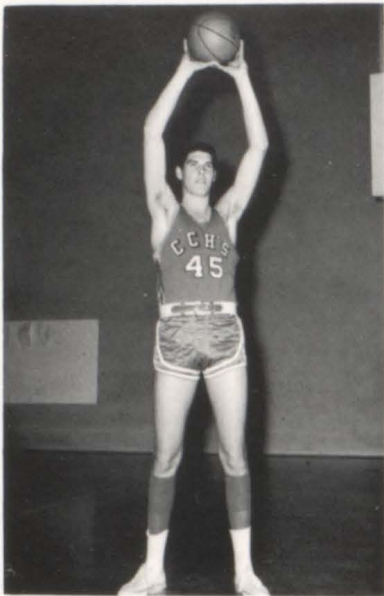

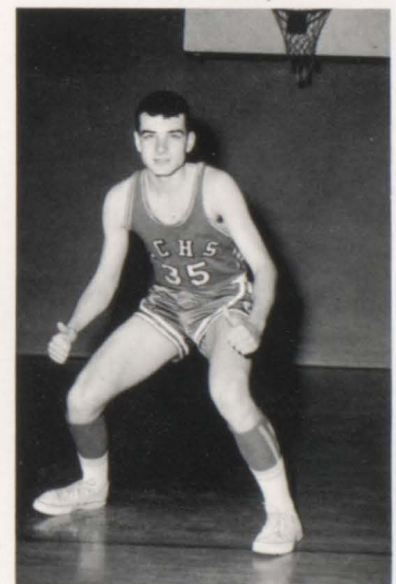

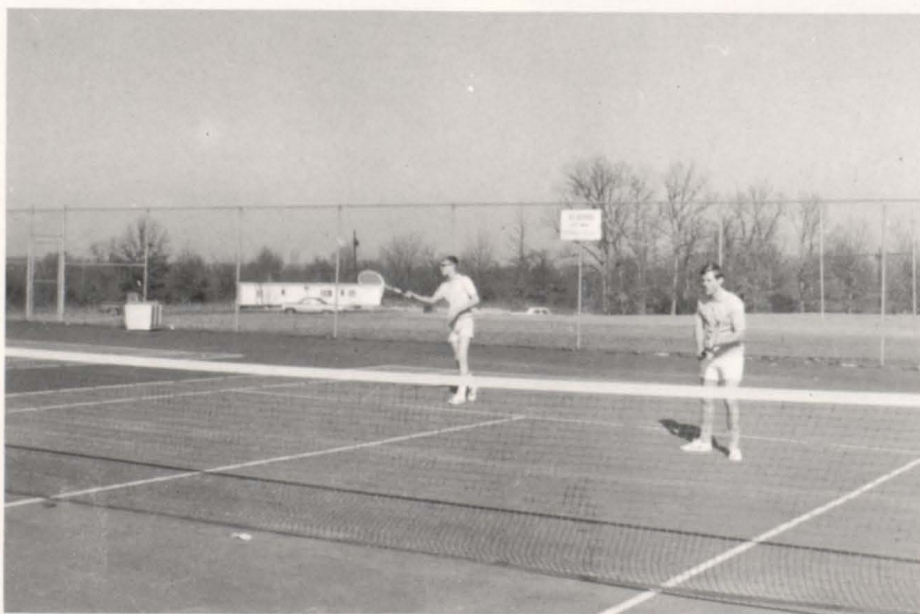

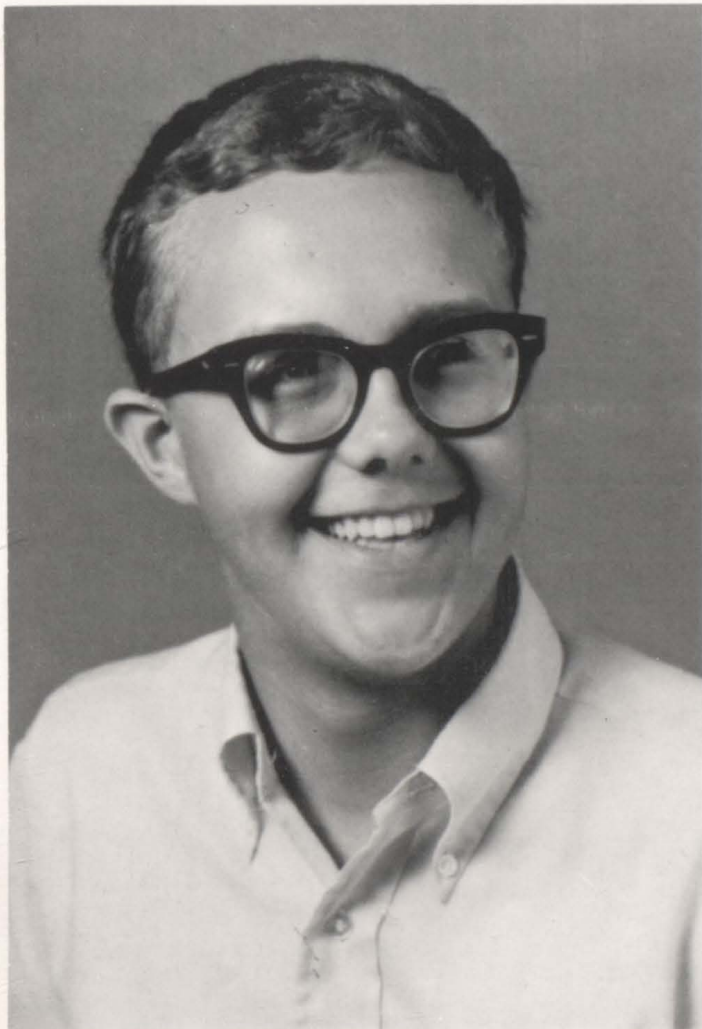
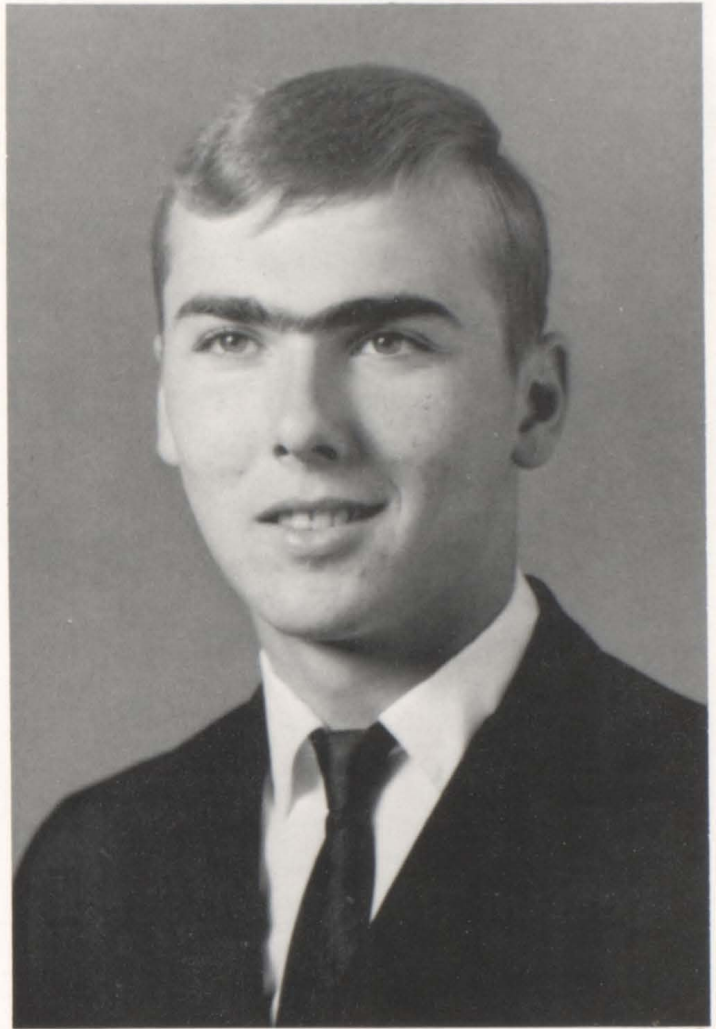
RECOGNITION OF THE TOP TWENTY

James Lester Barnwell

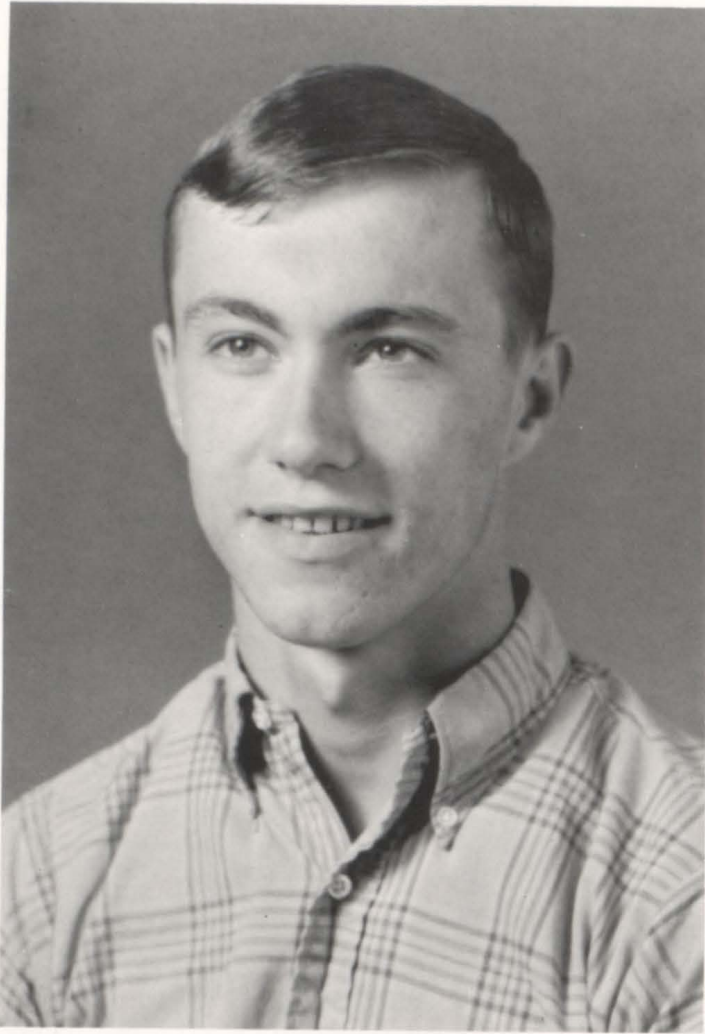
