With the support of the NWRESD, staff will provide a full academic learning experience for ALL students by delivering classroom curriculum on-line through the teacher management systems Google Classroom, and Canvas.

ALL students and staff will be provided with a personal Chromebook for their use at home. ALL families in need will be provided with wireless hotspots and internet payment and support, in order for EACH AND EVERY student to be able to access Vernonia's Comprehensive Distance Learning, when necessary.

Teachers will provide instruction that meets the minimum grade level requirements for a Learning Day as prescribed through ODE.

Limited On-site instruction will be utilized during CDL for students who meet state criteria and would benefit from on-site instruction.

Attendance will be taken, and grades will be provided as per ODE guidelines.

Meals will be provided for ALL students in need, every school day.

The VSD's Social-Emotional Learning Team will identify student and staff mental health support needs, and provide them remotely.

All ESSA, EDEA and ADA services will continue to be provided.

Professional development will be in place to support teachers, who will in turn support their families in their efforts to "teach" from home.

 - If a student(s) is not part of a stable cohort, then an individual student log must be maintained.
- Required components of individual daily student/cohort logs include:
 - Child's name
 - Drop off/pick up time
 - Parent/guardian name and emergency contact information
 - All staff (including itinerant staff, district staff, substitutes, and guest teachers) names and phone numbers who interact with a stable cohort or individual student
- Protocol to record/keep daily logs to be used for contact tracing for a minimum of four weeks to assist the LPHA as needed.
- Process to ensure that all itinerant and all district staff (maintenance, administrative, delivery, nutrition, and any other staff) who move between buildings keep a log or calendar with a running four-week history of their time in each school building and who they were in contact with at each site.
- Process to ensure that the school reports to and consults with the LPHA regarding cleaning and possible classroom or program closure if anyone who has entered school is diagnosed with COVID-19.

- All staff wear PPE when working with students and other staff members
- All staff and students to maintain 6' social distancing at all times it is possible
- Updated Communicable Disease Management Plan was developed in coordination with the NWRESD and ColCo District/County Nurses
- Vernonia High School's designated person to address physical distancing requirements is Principal Nate Underwood
- Michael Paul, Columbia County Public Health Director;
 Sherrie Ford, Columia-Health; Heidi Brown, VSD Nurse; Staff members from SHAW School Based Health Center
- VSD Staff will be trained on sections 1-3 of the RSSL guidance during in-service weeks prior to school starting, and prior to entering Distance Learning.
- CCPH Director Michael Paul will be notified of any confirmed COVID-19 cases among students or staff within 24 hours of initial report. The CCPH Director will notify the VSD w/in 24 hours if they are aware of any VSD student or staff positive cases. This communication includes any information regarding clusters of any illness, and providing contact log information to CCPH.
- Maintenance Supervisor, Mark Brown will oversee the Disinfection Plan following RSSL guidance. Systematic disinfection will occur daily, or more often, as needed
- Sanitization of common and cohort specific surfaces will occur between each separate cohort's use, as well as between multiple student uses within the same cohort.
- Student and Staff screening protocols. Students and staff are
 directed to stay home if they, or anyone in their home, has
 symptoms of temperature higher than 100.4F, trouble
 breathing, persistent pressure in the chest or other severe
 symptoms. Staff will visually screen each student upon
 arrival to the classroom for symptoms.
- Isolation protocol: Staff exhibiting symptoms will be sent home. Students exhibiting symptoms will be placed in isolation in the health room, until parents can take them home. Students in isolation will remain a minimum of 6 feet apart from others and wearing appropriate PPE. They will be monitored by staff who will also wear appropriate PPE.
- Staff, students and families will be notified via letters home, phone calls, website and use of the District "All Call" system if there are potential, or actual cases that could impact the school community. The District's response to the case will also be addressed in the communication.
- A Daily written Contact Log for each student and cohort will be maintained to ensure ease of contact tracing. The Log includes required components from ODE guidance. Logs will be maintained for a minimum of 4 weeks prior to disposal.
- If a case is diagnosed the District will contact CCPH to ensure cleaning regimens are effective, and to determine if classroom or school closure is warranted.

1b. HIGH-RISK POPULATIONS

OHA/ODE Requirements

Serve students in high-risk population(s) whether learning is happening through On-Site, Hybrid (partially On-Site and partially Comprehensive Distance Learning models), or Comprehensive Distance Learning models.

Medically Fragile, Complex and Nursing-Dependent Student Requirements

- All districts must account for students who have health conditions that require additional nursing services. Oregon law (ORS 336.201) defines three levels of severity related to required nursing services:
 - Medically Complex: Are students who may have an unstable health condition and who may require daily professional nursing services.
 - Medically Fragile: Are students who may have a lifethreatening health condition and who may require immediate professional nursing services.
 - Nursing-Dependent: Are students who have an unstable or life-threatening health condition and who require daily, direct, and continuous professional nursing services.
- Staff and school administrators, in partnership with school nurses, or other school health providers, should work with interdisciplinary teams to address individual student needs. The school registered nurse (RN) is responsible for nursing care provided to individual students as outlined in ODE guidance and state law:
 - Communicate with parents and health care providers to determine return to school status and current needs of the student.
 - Coordinate and update other health services the student may be receiving in addition to nursing services. This may include speech language pathology, occupational therapy, physical therapy, as well as behavioral and mental health services.
 - Modify Health Management Plans, Care Plans, IEPs, or 504 or other student-level medical plans, as indicated, to address current health care considerations.
 - The RN practicing in the school setting should be supported to remain up to date on current guidelines and access professional support such as evidence-based resources from the Oregon School Nurses Association.
 - Service provision should consider health and safety as well as legal standards.
 - Appropriate medical-grade personal protective equipment (PPE) should be made available to <u>nurses and other health</u> providers.
 - Work with an interdisciplinary team to meet requirements of ADA and FAPE.
 - High-risk individuals may meet criteria for exclusion during a local health crisis.
 - Refer to updated state and national guidance and resources such as:
 - U.S. Department of Education Supplemental Fact Sheet: Addressing the Risk of COVID-19 in Preschool, Elementary and Secondary Schools While Serving Children with Disabilities from March 21, 2020.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

- All students will be given the opportunity to self-identify as high risk or living with a high risk household member, and will be served in a Hybrid model of instruction (both On-Site and partial Comprehensive Distance Learning) throughout the implementation of this guidance.
- The District will provide nursing services for students as required by ORS 336.201
- As individual student health care needs arise, the school nurse and building administrator will work with the interdisciplinary team, including parents, to address the individual student's academic, health and safety needs in accordance with RSSL guidance
- All students identified as vulnerable, either by a physician, or parent/guardian notification, will have the option to be enrolled in online instruction with weekly check-ins and necessary staff support
- Students with disabilities will continue to receive specially designed instruction as per IEP

Students with language services will continue to receive English Language Development.

1c. PHYSICAL DISTANCING

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Establish a minimum of 35 square feet per person when determining room capacity. Calculate only with usable classroom space, understanding that desks and room set-up will require use of all space in the calculation. This also applies for professional development and staff gatherings.
- Support physical distancing in all daily activities and instruction, maintaining six feet between individuals to the maximum extent possible.
- Minimize time standing in lines and take steps to ensure that six feet of distance between students is maintained, including marking spacing on floor, one-way traffic flow in constrained spaces, etc.
- Schedule modifications to limit the number of students in the building (e.g., rotating groups by days or location, staggered schedules to avoid hallway crowding and gathering).
- Plan for students who will need additional support in learning how to maintain physical distancing requirements. Provide instruction; don't employ punitive discipline.
- Staff should maintain physical distancing during all staff meetings and conferences, or consider remote web-based meetings.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

As high school share the same building with middle school, students will be split into two (2.0) groups: Group A (High School) and Group B (Middle School)

- A GROUP (HS) WILL ATTEND MONDAY/TUESDAY
- B GROUP (MS) WILL ATTEND THURSDAY/FRIDAY

High School - Classrooms

- Develop class rosters to have no more than 15 students with one teacher, possibly one instructional assistant (maximum of 17 people per 900 ft2 classroom).
- Hallways will be marked with one-way directions and markers to keep

physically distant.

- Planning, preparation and implementation of 6 feet distancing practices will be completed for all staff, students, and areas of the school including but not limited to: classrooms, hallways, recess, breaks, offices, restrooms, bus drop-off/pick-up, and inside/outside waiting areas.
- Hallways and floors will be marked with 6' spacing to ensure distancing. Class movement will be scheduled so there is no waiting on other classes to minimize standing in lines.

As individual student health care needs arise, the school nurse and building administrator will work with the interdisciplinary team, including parents, to address the individual student's academic, health and safety needs in accordance with RSSL guidance

1d. COHORTING

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Where feasible, establish stable cohorts: groups should be no larger than can be accommodated by the space available to provide 35 square feet per person, including staff.
 - The smaller the cohort, the less risk of spreading disease. As cohort groups increase in size, the risk of spreading disease increases.
- Students cannot be part of any single cohort, or part of multiple cohorts that exceed a total of 100 people within the educational week. Schools should plan to limit cohort sizes to allow for efficient contact-tracing and minimal risk for exposure.
- ⊠ Each school must have a system for daily logs to ensure contract tracing among the cohort (see section 1a of the *Ready Schools*, *Safe Learners* guidance).
- Minimize interaction between students in different stable cohorts (e.g., access to restrooms, activities, common areas). Provide access to All Gender/Gender Neutral restrooms.
- Cleaning and disinfecting surfaces (e.g., desks, door handles, etc.) must be maintained between multiple student uses, even in the same cohort.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Transportation Cohort

- This is a stable group of students each day.
- Updated contact-tracing logs are required for each run of a route.

In-building cohorts

• Students will be assigned a grade-level cohort (9/10 or 11/12) for each day

(two cohorts total).

- Sample student schedule:
- o AM: Math, Science, Health/SEL
- o PM: Humanities, electives

Speech and Language Cohort, IEP Cohort

- This stable group is maintained as much as possible.
- o Note: in the event the stable cohort is changed, the

SLP/Case Manager will need to update the contact-tracing log.

1f. ENTRY AND SCREENING

	Requirements

- Direct students and staff to stay home if they, or anyone in their homes or community living spaces, have COVID-19 symptoms, or if anyone in their home or community living spaces has COVID-19. COVID-19 symptoms are as follows:
 - Primary symptoms of concern: cough, fever (temperature greater than 100.4°F) or chills, shortness of breath, or difficulty breathing.
 - Note that muscle pain, headache, sore throat, new loss of taste or smell, diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, nasal congestion, and runny nose are also symptoms often associated with COVID-19. More information about COVID-19 symptoms is available from CDC.
 - In addition to COVID-19 symptoms, students should be excluded from school for signs of other infectious diseases, per existing school policy and protocols. See pages 9-12 of OHA/ODE Communicable Disease Guidance.
 - Emergency signs that require immediate medical attention:
 - Trouble breathing
 - o Persistent pain or pressure in the chest
 - New confusion or inability to awaken
 - Bluish lips or face (lighter skin); greyish lips or face (darker skin)
 - Other severe symptoms
- Screen all students and staff for symptoms on entry to bus/school every day. This can be done visually and/or with confirmation from a parent/caregiver/guardian. Staff members can self-screen and attest to their own health.
 - Anyone displaying or reporting the primary symptoms of concern must be isolated (see section 1i of the *Ready Schools*, *Safe Learners* guidance) and sent home as soon as possible.
 See table "*Planning for COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools*."
 - Additional guidance for nurses and health staff.
- Follow LPHA advice on restricting from school any student or staff known to have been exposed (e.g., by a household member) to COVID-19. See table "Planning for COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools."

Hybrid/Onsite Plan Arrival and Entry

- Each student will enter the school building through a screening station at the front doors of the school.
- **Students** will go directly to their first cohort through their assigned entry door
 - Any exposed/diagnosed students will be excluded from attendance for 10 days.
- Staff will be present at each entry point to visually screen students for symptoms.
- Breakfast and lunch are provided for students to take home at the end of each day. Students must wash hands before entering their first class

Screening Students Upon Entry

- Staff will be assigned to each entry door to visually screen.
- When the **screening** indicates that a student may be symptomatic, the student is directed to the Isolation Room.
- Handwashing stations or hand-sanitizers will be placed by each entrance prior to student entrance to classes, or students will utilize classroom stations to wash hands.
- There are transportation specific screening protocols that must be followed. See section 2i for more information.

Logging for Contact Tracing

• Staff assigned to each entry door will need to maintain contact tracing logs with information about each student who entered and other students with whom they came in contact during entry.

Screening Staff:

- Staff are required to report when they may have been exposed to COVID-19.
- Staff are required to report when they have symptoms related to COVID-19.
- Staff members are not responsible for screening other staff members

1i. ISOLATION AND QUARANTINE

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Protocols for exclusion and isolation for sick students and staff whether identified at the time of bus pick-up, arrival to school, or at any time during the school day.
- Protocols for screening students, as well as exclusion and isolation protocols for sick students and staff identified at the time of arrival or during the school day.
 - Work with school nurses, health care providers, or other staff
 with expertise to determine necessary modifications to areas
 where staff/students will be isolated. If two students present
 COVID-19 symptoms at the same time, they must be isolated
 at once. If separate rooms are not available, ensure that six
 feet distance is maintained. Do not assume they have the
 same illness.
 - Consider required physical arrangements to reduce risk of disease transmission.
 - Plan for the needs of generally well students who need medication or routine treatment, as well as students who may show signs of illness.
 - Additional guidance for nurses and health staff.
- Students and staff who report or develop symptoms must be isolated in a designated isolation area in the school, with adequate space and staff supervision and symptom monitoring by a school nurse, other school-based health care provider or school staff until they are able to go home. Anyone providing supervision and symptom monitoring must wear appropriate face covering or face shields.
 - School nurse and health staff in close contact with symptomatic individuals (less than 6 feet) should wear a medical-grade face mask. Other Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) may be needed depending on symptoms and care provided. Consult a nurse or health care professional regarding appropriate use of PPE. Any PPE used during care of a symptomatic individual should be properly removed and disposed of prior to exiting the care space.
 - After removing PPE, hands should be immediately cleaned with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, hands can be cleaned with an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains 60-95% alcohol.
 - If able to do so safely, a symptomatic individual should wear a face covering.
 - To reduce fear, anxiety, or shame related to isolation, provide a clear explanation of procedures, including use of PPE and handwashing.
- Establish procedures for safely transporting anyone who is sick to their home or to a health care facility.
- Staff and students who are ill must stay home from school and
 must be sent home if they become ill at school, particularly if they
 have COVID-19 symptoms. Refer to table in "Planning for COVID19 Scenarios in Schools."

- A designated primary isolation area will be used for students and staff who are symptomatic.
- Symptomatic students will remain at school until a designated adult can pick them up.
- Staff will be assigned to supervise students who are symptomatic, and will need to maintain at least six feet of distance and wear facial coverings.
- Secondary isolation areas may be identified as needed.
- Logs must be maintained for every student who enters the health room, regardless of whether they are treated or sent home. Logs will include:
- o Name of student
- o Reported symptoms/reason for health room visit o Action taken
 - Staff and students who are ill will be sent home.
 - If exhibiting COVID symptoms they will be recommended for testing from their regular physician. If testing positive or exhibiting primary symptoms they should remain home for 10 days.
 - A Communicable Disease response policy is in place, and was developed by our school nurse in conjunction with the CCPH
 - Any students isolated, or sent home for COVID symptoms will be recorded and monitored for review by CCPH.

2. Facilities and School Operations

Some activities and areas will have a higher risk for spread (e.g., band, choir, science labs, locker rooms). When engaging in these activities within the school setting, schools will need to consider additional physical distancing or conduct the activities outside (where feasible). Additionally, schools should consider sharing explicit risk statements for instructional and extra-curricular activities requiring additional considerations (see section 5f of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance).

2a. ENROLLMENT

(Note: Section 2a does not apply to private schools.)

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Enroll all students (including foreign exchange students) following the standard Oregon Department of Education guidelines.
- ☐ The temporary suspension of the 10-day drop rule does not change the rules for the initial enrollment date for students:
 - The ADM enrollment date for a student is the first day of the student's actual attendance.
 - A student with fewer than 10 days of absence at the beginning of the school year may be counted in membership prior to the first day of attendance, but not prior to the first calendar day of the school year.
 - If a student does not attend during the first 10 session days of school, the student's ADM enrollment date must reflect the student's actual first day of attendance.
 - Students who were anticipated to be enrolled, but who do not attend at any time must not be enrolled and submitted in ADM
- If a student has stopped attending for 10 or more days, districts must continue to try to engage the student. At a minimum, districts must attempt to contact these students and their families weekly to either encourage attendance or receive confirmation that the student has transferred or has withdrawn from school. This includes students who were scheduled to start the school year, but who have not yet attended.
- When enrolling a student from another school, schools must request documentation from the prior school within 10 days of enrollment per OAR 581-021-0255 to make all parties aware of the transfer. Documentation obtained directly from the family does not relieve the school of this responsibility. After receiving documentation from another school that a student has enrolled, drop that student from your roll.
- Design attendance policies to account for students who do not attend in-person due to student or family health and safety concerns.
- When a student has a pre-excused absence or COVID-19 absence, the school district should reach out to offer support at least weekly until the student has resumed their education.
- When a student is absent beyond 10 days and meets the criteria for continued enrollment due to the temporary suspension of the

- Students and families will be given the option to enroll in fully online distance learning or hybrid learning.
- Students enrolled in hybrid learning will participate in inperson learning two days each week and online instruction three days each week.
- Students identified as at-risk or in need of additional, focused support will have the option of participating in limited in-person lessons with supplemental learning available online.
- Hybrid learning and distance learning opportunities will utilize parallel planning, allowing symptomatic students to continue learning during a medical absence

2b. ATTENDANCE

(Note: Section 2b does not apply to private schools.)

OHA/ODE Requirements

- ☑ Grades K-5 (self-contained): Attendance must be taken at least once per day for all students enrolled in school, regardless of the instructional model (On-Site, Hybrid, Comprehensive Distance Learning, online schools).
- ☑ Grades 6-12 (individual subject): Attendance must be taken at least once for each scheduled class that day for all students enrolled in school, regardless of the instructional model (On-Site, Hybrid, Comprehensive Distance Learning, online schools).
- Alternative Programs: Some students are reported in ADM as enrolled in a non-standard program (such as tutorial time), with hours of instruction rather than days present and days absent. Attendance must be taken at least once for each scheduled interaction with each student, so that local systems can track the student's attendance and engagement. Reported hours of instruction continue to be those hours in which the student was present.
- Online schools that previously followed a two check-in per week attendance process must follow the Comprehensive Distance Learning requirements for checking and reporting attendance.
- Provide families with clear and concise descriptions of student attendance and participation expectations as well as family involvement expectations that take into consideration the home environment, caregiver's work schedule, and mental/physical health

2c. TECHNOLOGY

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Update procedures for district-owned or school-owned devices to match cleaning requirements (see section 2d of the *Ready Schools*, *Safe Learners* guidance).
- Procedures for return, inventory, updating, and redistributing district-owned devices must meet physical distancing requirements.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

- All students will be assigned a district-owned device (Chromebook) for use in the school building, eliminating the need for cleaning between use by different students.
- Students will have the option to take the device home for athome use.
- Deployment of district-provided hotspots will continue to ensure adequate internet access for all families.
- Additional devices will be accessible for in-building use for students with broken devices or devices left at home.
- Shared school devices will be cleaned and sanitized between each use. Handout and return of devices will meet all physical distancing requirements.

2d. SCHOOL SPECIFIC FUNCTIONS/FACILITY FEATURES

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Handwashing: All people on campus should be advised and encouraged to wash their hands frequently.
- Equipment: Develop and use sanitizing protocols for all equipment used by more than one individual or purchase equipment for individual use.
- Events: Cancel, modify, or postpone field trips, assemblies, athletic events, practices, special performances, school-wide parent

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Hand Washing: All students will have access to hand washing and sanitizer throughout the day. Frequent opportunities for hand washing will be provided throughout the school day. Hand washing will be supplemented with the use of hand sanitizer.

• Equipment: Equipment includes materials such as school supplies (scissors, glue sticks), PE and recess equipment, Science Lab supplies.

- meetings and other large gatherings to meet requirements for physical distancing.
- Transitions/Hallways: Limit transitions to the extent possible. Create hallway procedures to promote physical distancing and minimize gatherings.
- Personal Property: Establish policies for personal property being brought to school (e.g., refillable water bottles, school supplies, headphones/earbuds, cell phones, books, instruments, etc.). If personal items are brought to school, they must be labeled prior to entering school and use should be limited to the item owner.

o Sharing of supplies will be restricted whenever possible.

o All shared equipment will be cleaned between users.

- Safety Drills: Safety drills at the start of the school year will be scheduled for both cohorts of students to participate:
- o September evacuation drill
- o Lockdown drill
- o Earthquake drill

Remaining drills will alternate monthly between cohorts.

Staff and students will follow distance requirements during exit of the building.

Re-entry to the building will be through an assigned entry point to reduce incidental contact.

Events

Off-site field trips and events requiring visitors or volunteers have been canceled.

In-school events will be modified to follow cohorting and socialdistancing guidance.

Athletic events and practice-pending ODE guidance, will adhere to all social distancing guidelines

• Transitions/Hallways:

Hallways will include one-way traffic markings to reduce contact. Transitions by grade-level cohort groups will be staggered to reduce contact.

Student cohorts will remain in the classroom with adult transitions when possible.

Cohort classrooms will be assigned by building area/level to allow access to a single bathroom, drinking fountain and hand washing station throughout the school day.

• Classroom line up:

Visual makers will be used around doorways and inside classrooms to support physical distancing during transitions.

• Personal Property:

Students will not use lockers to store personal property. All personal property brought to school will be carried by the student throughout the school day in their backpack/bag.

Personal property must be labeled with a student name and will only be used by the student.

• Restrooms:

Restrooms assigned based on cohort rooms.

Visual reminders will be used in all restrooms to encourage hygienic practices including:

- Handwashing techniques
- Covering coughs/sneezes
- Social distancing
- Facial coverings
- Covid-19 symptoms

2e. ARRIVAL AND DISMISSAL

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Physical distancing, stable cohorts, square footage, and cleaning requirements must be maintained during arrival and dismissal procedures.
- Create schedule(s) and communicate staggered arrival and/or dismissal times.
- Assign students or cohorts to an entrance; assign staff member(s) to conduct visual screenings (see section 1f of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance).

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Arrival and Entry

- Each student will be assigned an entrance point (i.e., a specific door) to the school building.
- Upon entry, students will go directly to their first content cohort
- Staff will be present at each entry point to visually screen students for symptoms and track cohort data.
- Students identified as potentially symptomatic will be directed

- Ensure accurate sign-in/sign-out protocols to help facilitate contact tracing by the LPHA. Sign-in procedures are not a replacement for entrance and screening requirements. Students entering school after arrival times must be screened for the primary symptoms of concern.
 - Eliminate shared pen and paper sign-in/sign-out sheets.
 - Ensure hand sanitizer is available if signing children in or out on an electronic device.
- Ensure alcohol-based hand sanitizer (with 60-95% alcohol) dispensers are easily accessible near all entry doors and other high-traffic areas. Establish and clearly communicate procedures for keeping caregiver drop-off/pick-up as brief as possible.

Sign-In / Sign-Out Procedures

- Students entering or leaving the building at times other than arrival or dismissal will use the main building entrance.
- Arrivals will be greeted at the door by a staff member to reduce office traffic.
- All sign-in/sign-out tracking will be handled by office staff to reduce sharing of pen/paper

2f. CLASSROOMS/REPURPOSED LEARNING SPACES

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Seating: Rearrange student desks and other seat spaces so that staff and students' physical bodies are six feet apart to the maximum extent possible while also maintaining 35 square feet per person; assign seating so students are in the same seat at all times.
- Materials: Avoid sharing of community supplies when possible (e.g., scissors, pencils, etc.). Clean these items frequently. Provide hand sanitizer and tissues for use by students and staff.
- Handwashing: Remind students (with signage and regular verbal reminders from staff) of the utmost importance of hand hygiene and respiratory etiquette. Respiratory etiquette means covering coughs and sneezes with an elbow or a tissue. Tissues should be disposed of in a garbage can, then hands washed or sanitized immediately.
 - Wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Seating:

- Classroom desks and tables will be arranged with students being seated a minimum of six feet apart.
- Students will use a single assigned seat at all times.

Materials:

- Each classroom will limit sharing of community supplies when possible (e.g., scissors, pencils, etc.). If needed to share, these items will be cleaned between each use.
- Hand sanitizer and tissue will be available for use by students and staff.

Hand Washing:

- All students will wash their hands upon building entry.
 Additional hand washing opportunities will be provided throughout the school day.
- Signage at each sink/hand washing station will remind students and staff of effective handwashing practices.

Furniture:

 All upholstered furniture and soft seating will be removed from the school building.

Classroom Procedures:

- All classes will use an assigned cubby or storage spaces for individual student belongings.
- Will forego use of shared hall passes

Seating:

 Each class and hallway will have visual aids (e.g., painter's tape, stickers, etc.) to illustrate traffic flow, appropriate spacing.

Environment:

- When possible, windows will be open in the classroom before students arrive and after students leave.
- Each classroom will hold classes outside when possible and encourage students to spread out.

2g. PLAYGROUNDS, FIELDS, RECESS, BREAKS, AND RESTROOMS

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Keep school playgrounds closed to the general public until park playground equipment and benches reopen in the community (see Oregon Health Authority's <u>Specific Guidance for Outdoor</u> <u>Recreation Organizations</u>).
- After using the restroom students must wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds. Soap must be made available to students and staff.

- Students will access outside/designated areas during planned break times, utilizing social distancing.
- Break activities will be designed to support cohorting and physical distancing.

- Busses will be cleaned and wiped down between each route daily.
- If a student displays symptoms, provide a face shield or face covering and keep the student at least 6 feet away from others. Continue transporting the student.
- If arriving at school, notify staff to begin isolation measures.
- If transporting for dismissal and the student displays an onset of symptoms, notify the school.
- School team will consult with families of students who will need additional support on the bus. (This may include an additional staff member riding the bus with students).

2j. CLEANING, DISINFECTION, AND VENTILATION

OHA/ODE Requirements

- □ Clean, sanitize, and disinfect frequently touched surfaces (e.g. door handles, sink handles, drinking fountains, transport vehicles) and shared objects (e.g., toys, games, art supplies) between uses multiple times per day. Maintain clean and disinfected (CDC guidance) environments, including classrooms, cafeteria settings and restrooms.
- Clean and disinfect playground equipment at least daily or between use as much as possible in accordance with CDC guidance.
- Apply disinfectants safely and correctly following labeling direction as specified by the manufacturer. Keep these products away from students.
- ☑ To reduce the risk of asthma, choose disinfectant products on the EPA List N with asthma-safer ingredients (e.g. hydrogen peroxide, citric acid, or lactic acid) and avoid products that mix these with asthma-causing ingredients like peroxyacetic acid, sodium hypochlorite (bleach), or quaternary ammonium compounds.
- Schools with HVAC systems should evaluate the system to minimize indoor air recirculation (thus maximizing fresh outdoor air) to the extent possible. Schools that do not have mechanical ventilation systems should, to the extent possible, increase natural ventilation by opening windows and doors before students arrive and after students leave, and while students are present.
- Consider running ventilation systems continuously and changing the filters more frequently. Do <u>not</u> use fans if they pose a safety or health risk, such as increasing exposure to pollen/allergies or exacerbating asthma symptoms. Consider using window fans or box fans positioned in open windows to blow fresh outdoor air into the classroom via one window, and indoor air out of the classroom via another window. Fans should not be used in rooms with closed windows and doors, as this does not allow for fresh air to circulate.
