

Student Portfolio


The Student Portfolio report is designed to address the ability to export selected student(s) demographic information and provide a printable student report for a given benchmark assessment, useful for parent conferences.

How to access: Click on the A+ icon and then Student Portfolio under the Lagging Leading Indicators.




The following selector tree appears...





Select the student(s) that you would like a report for:

- ✓ Begin clicking on the + sign by a school to expand the tree
 - If you click on the radio button next to a teachers name, all classes and students will be selected.
- ✓ Click on a teacher to expand the tree to view all of their classes
 - If you click on the radio button next to a class name, all students in that class will be selected.
- ✓ Click on a class to expand the tree to view all of the students in that class
- ✓ Click on one or more students to select them for viewing or printing
- ✓ Select which tests to show by clicking on the + sign next to "Parent Item Analysis" and click on the test(s) that you want.
- ✓ Select the format (PDF, XLS or ODT) and click Export

- > XLS & ODT printable spreadsheet of the selected students(s) and their demographic information. ODT is the OpenDocument file format from Open Office.
- > PDF outputs the following report, by student, for the test(s) and student(s) chosen.

How to Read:

Questions to Ask:

- What skills gave my students the most difficulty?
- What are the individual student strengths and weaknesses that I can use for data conferences, parent conferences, IEP meetings or RTI?

When to Use:

- Parent Item Analysis (PDF output format)
 - During the year after a benchmark test or common assessment is given. Use to during a parent/teacher conference or to send this home with students to inform parents of how their child is performing and what skills need practice.
 - RTI monitor progress
- Student Information (PDF, ODT, XLS output format)
 - Print or Save Class lists have, at a glance, a student listing available for attendance, classroom use for participation grades
 - ❖ Hide columns and print by student ID to keep posted information confidential ability to save and print only the information that you need
