ANSWERS TO FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q: How do I enroll my child?

A: You will need the following information to enroll your child: 1. Valid birth certificate. 2. Copy of your child's Social Security card. 3. Immunization record #3231. 4. E.E.D.(Ear, eye and dental) record #3300. 5. Proof of residence.

Q: What are the school hours?

A: Cook Pre-K, Cook Primary School and Cook Elementary hours are 8:00 a.m. to 2:40 p.m. Cook Middle School hours are 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Cook High School Hours are 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m..

Q: How can I monitor my child's progress?

A: Stay in close contact with your child's teacher. If you have Internet access, you may monitor your child's grades using the PowerSchool website. If you have an email address, you may register for PowerSchool to send you a daily/weekly update. Contact your child's school for identification information.

Q: How do I know which bus my child will ride?

A: A representative from the Transportation Department will be available during Open House. During the school year, you may contact the Transportation Department at 549-6556.

Q: When will report cards be sent home?

A: All Cook County Schools are on an nine week grading period. Progress reports will be sent during the grading period.

Q: Is my child's school accredited?

A: The Cook County School System received District Accreditation in March 2018. This is the Third District Accreditation received by Cook County Schools. All schools are fully accredited.

Cook County Schools take pride in the educational opportunities we are able to provide for our children. Our teachers and staff members work very hard to meet the needs of all students to ensure academic success. We have evidence that students are learning and making good progress, and we consider this to be an important indicator of success. An important part of our success is parent participation and support in developing activities to improve student achievement. We hope that as a parent/guardian, you will become involved in our school improvement initiatives as we continue to monitor student achievement and set high expectations. If you are interested in participating in developing our school improvement initiatives so we can continue to excel, contact your child's school.

ACT & SAT TEST DATES

The SAT is a globally recognized college admission test that lets you show colleges what you know and how well you can apply that knowledge. It tests your knowledge of reading, writing and math —subjects that are taught every day in high school classrooms. Most students take the SAT during their junior or senior year of high school, and almost all colleges and universities use the SAT to make admission decisions. Taking the SAT is the first step in finding the right college for you — the place where you can further develop your skills and pursue your passions. But SAT scores are just one of many factors that colleges consider when making their admission decisions. High school grades are also very important. In fact, the combination of high school grades and SAT scores is the best predictor of your academic success in college.

The ACT is an achievement test, measuring what a student has learned in school. The ACT has up to 5 components: English, Mathematics, Reading, Science, and an optional Writing Test. The SAT has only 3 components: Critical Reading, Mathematics, and a required Writing Test. The ACT National Test Dates in the U.S., U.S. Territories, and Canada.

STATE ASSESSMENTS

ACCESS for ELLs 2.0

ACCESS for ELLs is administered, annually, to all English learners in Georgia. ACCESS for ELLs is a standards-based, criterion referenced English language proficiency test designed to measure English learners' social and academic proficiency in English. It assesses social and instructional English as well as the language associated with language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies within the school context across the four language domains. ACCESS for ELLs meets the federal requirements that mandates states to evaluate EL students in grades K through 12 on their progress in learning to speak English.

Georgia Alternative Assessment 2.0 (GAA 2.0)

The Georgia Alternate Assessment (GAA) 2.0 is comprised of standardized performance tasks and is intended to provide tiered participation within the assessment for students working at various levels of complexity. The GAA 2.0 is designed to measure the degree to which students with significant cognitive disabilities have mastered alternate achievement standards in the core content areas of English language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies. The GAA 2.0 is administered to all eligible students in the following areas:

- Grades 3-8, and high school will be assessed in English language arts and mathematics.
- Grades 5, 8, and high school will be assessed in science.
- Grades 8 and high school will be assessed in social studies.

Georgia Milestones Assessment System

Georgia Milestones measures how well students have learned the knowledge and skills outlined in the state-adopted content standards in English language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies.

Georgia Milestones is a single assessment system that consists of end-of-grade measures in English language arts and mathematics in grades 3-8, end-of-grade measures in science in grades 5 and 8, end-of-grade measure in social studies in grade 8, and end-of-course measures for the high school courses of American Literature and Composition, Algebra I/Coordinate Algebra, Biology, and U.S. History.

Georgia Milestones is administered primarily on the computer and includes the following features:

- Technology-enhanced items in all grades and courses.
- Open-ended (constructed response) items in English language arts in all grades and courses,
- A writing component (in response to passages read by students) at every grade level and course within the English language arts assessment,
- A reported Lexile score based on the English language arts assessment in all grades and courses, and
- Estimated norm-referenced performance ranges for all grades and courses.

GKIDS 2.0

GKIDS 2.0 is a progression-based formative assessment, integrated into classroom work, that is aligned to the Georgia Standards of Excellence (GSE). GKIDS 2.0 is organized around big ideas and learning progressions. GKIDS 2.0 provides teachers with one source of real-time information to adjust instruction, by identifying what a student already knows, what the student needs next, and by allowing the teacher to monitor growth.

National School Lunch/School Breakfast Programs

By participating in the Seamless Summer Option (SSO) and eliminating the need for meal applications, Cook County School Nutrition will reduce administrative and printing costs. Families also benefit from the elimination of completing and submitting meal applications.

Children need healthy meals to learn. Cook County School Nutrition offers healthy meals every school day at no charge to your child(ren). Our food service receives support from the U.S. Department of Agriculture through the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs.

All schools will participate in Seamless Summer Option (SSO) and provide meals at no charge to children.

SCHOOL NUTRITION PROGRAM

Cook County School Nutrition Program serves over 3,500 meals daily. We provide nutritious meals to create healthy students that are ready to learn. Students who receive a nutritious breakfast and lunch perform better academically. Research has shown that eating a well-balanced breakfast improves a student's test performance, reduces tardiness and absenteeism, increases attention, and improves behavior and emotional adjustment.

As a federally funded program, the USDA requires all meals prepared and served to be of high nutritional value with reduced fat, sodium, and sugar. With that in the forefront, our goal is to serve students with foods they like as well as maintaining specific nutritional standards for every meal served. Therefore, we offer choices that make it easier for them to select something they like. Students will see new items added on the menu.

All schools will operate under Seamless Summer Option (SSO). This means all students can eat breakfast and lunch at "no cost." We are asking parents, administrators, and teachers to encourage children to make a healthy choice and dine with Cook County School Nutrition. As we embark upon this 2021-22 school term, our purpose is to continue building a school nutrition program with every child in mind while maintaining integrity and operating according to federal and state regulations.

Building the Cook County School Nutrition Program on Integrity and Excellence will be the core of our foundation. Through education, parents and children will receive the basics of nutrition, which is a key component of meeting the challenges of the nation's health issues. There are numerous nutritional education resources available on our website for teachers, parents, and children at the Cook County Schools website, select School Nutrition from the top tab.

As school nutrition continues to evolve, the challenges are numerous, but we are constantly adapting to change. We are determined to be one of the best school nutrition programs in the state of Georgia. It takes hard work to be successful, and we are ready to reach our goal.

THE COOK COUNTY EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION

The Cook County Educational Foundation was established in 1991 with a mission of assisting deserving students who are pursuing education beyond high school. At the 2021 Honor's Day at Cook High School, scholarships awarded through the Educational Foundation and other local donors totaled \$164,525 to the graduating class. These represent scholarships given from local businesses, banks, individuals, civic groups, as well as the foundation itself. These locally generated scholarships began in earnest in 1985 with the Irving and Natalie Dinnerman Scholarship and the Ned Bryant Memorial Scholarship(Farmers and Merchants Bank). Since that humble beginning, local scholarship giving has grown and flourished. Cook County is blessed to have this foundation that is dedicated to "paying it forward" to the next generation through the awarding of scholarships each year.

The foundation accepts donations (which are tax deductible) from individuals, businesses, and organizations. 

SCHOOL WEAPONS WARNING O.C.G.A. § 16-11-127.1

Carrying weapons within school safety zones, at school functions, or on school property

- (a) As used in this Code section, the term:
- (1) "School safety zone" means in or on any real property owned by or leased to any public or private elementary school, secondary school, or school board and used for elementary or secondary education and in or on the campus of any public or private technical school, vocational school, college, university, or institution of postsecondary education.
- (2) "Weapon" means and includes any pistol, revolver, or any weapon designed or intended to propel a missile of any kind, or any dirk, bowie knife, switchblade knife, ballistic knife, any other knife having a blade of two or more inches, straight-edge razor, razor blade, spring stick, knuckles, whether made from metal, thermoplastic, wood, or other similar material, blackjack, any bat, club, or other bludgeon-type weapon, or any flailing instrument consisting of two or more rigid parts connected in such a manner as to allow them to swing freely, which may be known as a nun chahka, nun chuck, nunchaku, shuriken, or fighting chain, or any disc, of whatever configuration, having at least two points or pointed blades which is designed to be thrown or propelled and which may be known as a throwing star or oriental dart, or any weapon of like kind, and any stun gun or taser as defined in subsection (a) of Code Section 16-11-106. This paragraph excludes any of these instruments used for classroom work authorized by the teacher.
- (b) (1) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (c) of this Code section, it shall be unlawful for any person to carry to or to possess or have under such person's control while within a school safety zone or at a school building, school function, or school property or on a bus or other transportation furnished by the school any weapon or explosive compound, other than fireworks, the possession of which is regulated by Chapter 10 of Title 25.
- (2) Any license holder who violates this subsection shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Any person who is not a license holder who violates this subsection shall be guilty of a felony and, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than \$10,000.00, by imprisonment for not less than two nor more than ten years, or both.
- (3) Any person convicted of a violation of this subsection involving a dangerous weapon or machine gun, as such terms are defined in Code Section 16-11-121, shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$10,000.00 or by imprisonment for a period of not less than five nor more than ten years, or both.
- (4) A child who violates this subsection may be subject to the provisions of Code Section 15-11-63.

During the 2021-2022 school year, Cook County Health Department will once again participate in a statewide initiative to have more students vaccinated against the flu by partnering with the Cook County Board of Education to administer the flu vaccine at local schools.

In the fall, public health nurses will administer the flu shot during school flu clinics.

"Our staff is excited to return to Cook County schools to offer flu vaccinations," states Rebecca Allgood, RN, county nurse manager. "These flu clinics allow us to provide vaccinations to people who may not have the time or ability to come to the health department."

Some insurance companies will be billed; however, anyone without insurance will not be charged for the vaccine. Parents need to make sure they complete and sign the flu consent form and return it to the school with all other important papers at the beginning of the year. A completed parental consent form must be returned beforehand for a student to receive their vaccine. Vaccines cannot be administered without that consent.

Finally, the Cook County Health Department wants to remind all parents and students that vaccination remains one of our best tools for stopping the spread of COVID-19, along with basic prevention measures when necessary- wearing a mask, distancing from others, avoiding large gatherings, and washing your hands frequently. COVID-19 vaccinations are available through the health department.

FERPA AND ITS PROTECTION

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) is a federal law that protects the privacy interests of students. It affords parents the right to access and amend their children's education records, and gives them some control over the disclosure of the information in these records. FERPA generally prevents an education agency or institution from sharing student records or personally identifiable information in these records without the written consent of the parent. A "parent" is defined as a natural or adoptive parent, legal guardian or an individual acting as a parent in the absence of the parent or guardian. When students reach the age of 18, or attend a post secondary institution at any age, they are considered "eligible students", and all the rights afforded by FERPA transfer from the parent to the students. (34 CFR Section 99.3).

Although student files are protected under the law, FERPA does allow the disclosure of student data without parental consent under certain, specified conditions. For example, schools may reveal information from student records to school officials with a legitimate educational interest in the information.

COOK COUNTY SCHOOLS CHECK IN/OUT PROCEDURE FOR PRE-K THRU 5TH GRADE

Parents must check students out through the office. Students should not be checked out early except for emergencies, hardships or appointments. Students who routinely check out early will be referred to an administrator.

PowerSchool also has a mobile app. You will need to have your account setup before accessing. The code required to identify Cook County is BMHH.

If you do have internet access at home or work, you can view this information on your child's progress at any time. If you do not have internet access, you can contact your child's counselor to receive a report through the mail. Please keep your passwords confidential so only you can access the information.

Cook Continues Google and Clever Partnerships

Cook County School System has joined Google to assist in educating your children. G Suites is a host of applications to schools for the purpose of educating students and helping teachers organize their digital classrooms, all at no cost to school systems. These applications range from word processing to cloud storage.

What does this mean for your child? Everything students need will be available on any electronic device. G Suite is compatible with computers, Chromebooks, tablets and cell phones.

Students will have access to their school work at any time! All students in the Cook County School System will have a Google account once a parent signs the consent in the student handbook or online registration website. Please look for this information to ensure your child has access to age appropriate apps assigned and monitored by their teachers. G Suites core services comply with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).

Many resources, both free and paid, are associated with a single sign-on portal called CLEVER. This allows students to login at https://www.clever.com/in/hornets and be automatically logged in to these applications. This allows for the student and parent to only remember the Google login for the student's career in the Cook County Schools.



Any device capable of recording, viewing or transmitting information Cell phones and all electronic devices and accessories must be turned off, out of sight from 7:00am-3:00pm. Students may access their phones only after exiting the building after dismissal.

Emergency phone calls can always be made in the main office (229) 549-5999; so, cell phones are not needed during school hours. If parents must contact their child, they should call the school office. The school office staff is excellent at relaying emergency messages from parents to students.

We understand that many of the electronic devices are very important to our students; however, they are a huge distraction to the educational process and in some cases can be a safety issue. Texting and videoing has become a major distraction and cannot be tolerated at school.

A student is considered "USING" a cell phone if the phone rings, vibrates, or the student is looking at and/or touching the electronic device. Text messages and/or social media posts with a timestamp during the school day are considered use of the electronic device. If a student is observed by an adult with a cell phone or electronic device during the school day, consequences will be assigned accordingly. Cell phone and electronic device consequences will reset each grading period per administration discretion.

IS DRESS CODE 2021-22

Conventional dress worn in a traditional manner is the norm for approved dress at Cook Middle School. It is the student's responsibility to come to school fully clothed and to wear clothes that are not dangerous to health or safety, do not disrupt the learning process, and stay within the school dress code. Extremes in dress and grooming are not permitted.

- · Hats, hoods, and sunglasses are not permitted inside the building during school. IF SEEN, these items will be confiscated.
- Clothing should be fitted so there is no midriff or underwear showing when standing, bending, seated, or moving.

All pants must be worn at the natural waistline. Sagging pants (worn below the waistline) are not permitted. If belts are worn, they must be buckled. Zippers must be zipped, and fasteners must be fastened.

The following items of clothing are NOT PERMITTED:

- Outer clothing which resembles sleepwear or underwear, pajama-type pants or bedroom shoes or slippers (Shoes are required at all times.)
- Fanny Packs
- Tank tops or shirts with shoulder straps narrower than two (2) inches, (Females). Midriff tops, low-cut tops and one-shoulder tops, see-through blouses covering bras/tube tops
- Pants should be worn at the same length on both legs. Pants may not be tucked into socks
- Sleeveless shirts for males
- Miniskirts and short shorts Shorts and skirts must be longer than mid-thigh length. No tight or sagging sweatpants or wind suits. They are to be worn appropriately.
- NO HEAD COVERINGS (male or female) unless documented religious apparel. Including
- Females may only wear hair "bands" 1/2 inch in width or less. Large bows are not permit-
- NO BANDANNAS OF ANY COLOR.
- Towels, hand cloths, curlers, combs, sunglasses and metal chains
- Bike pants, or other apparel that is extremely tight fitting
- Leggings, jeggings, joggers or any skin-tight pants, must be covered with long loose tops approaching the mid-thigh length.
- · Clothing/jewelry with profanity, vulgarities, or other offensive language, references to alcohol or drug use,
- Gangs, social clubs, weapons, or sexually suggestive items
- Clothing/jewelry that could be used as a weapon. No piercings with sharp points.
- Cut-out jeans with holes above the knees. No skin can show. If there are holes in pants above the knee, leggings or shorts must be worn under the pants.
- Any clothing with group, club, or organization names on them, unless the group(s) are approved as school
- Non-prescription glasses or Glasses with no lens
- Face masks worn for medical purposes are permitted but must not cover the eyes.

Note: Administrator discretion applies to all the above.

Dress code discipline will be enforced by both teachers and administrators. Discipline will be assigned and, if necessary, students will be loaned shirts or scrubs to wear or a parent/ guardian will be called to bring a change of clothes. Students will not be allowed to remain in the classroom with inappropriate clothing.

7TH GRADE TDAP REQUIREMENTS:

Cook County Health Department wants to remind all students within the Cook County school system that any student born on or after January 1, 2002 and entering or transferring into 7th grade need proof of an adolescent pertussis (whooping cough) booster immunization (called TDAP). Proof of a TDAP immunization must be documented on the Georgia immunization certificate (Form 3231).

TDAP vaccine can prevent tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevents, Diphtheria and pertussis spread from person to person. Tetanus enters the body through cuts or wounds.

- TETANUS (T) causes painful stiffening of the muscles. Tetanus can lead to serious health problems, including being unable to open the mouth, having trouble swallowing and breathing, or death.
- DIPHTHERIA (D) can lead to difficulty breathing, heart failure, paralysis, or death.
- PERTUSSIS (aP), also known as "whooping cough," can cause uncontrollable, violent coughing which makes it hard to breathe, eat, or drink. Pertussis can be extremely serious in babies and young children, causing pneumonia, convulsions, brain damage, or death. In teens and adults, it can cause weight loss, loss of bladder control, passing out, and rib fractures from severe coughing.

Ask your pediatrician or local health department about other shots your child may need including the human papillomavirus (HPV) series, an annual flu vaccine and catch-up immunizations, including chickenpox, MMR (measles, mumps, rubella) and hepatitis B.

A full immunization guide is available on the Georgia Department of Education's website www.gadoe.org.

Parents can visit the health department or their child's physician to receive a full list of their required vaccines. For a list of health departments in our area visit https://southhealthdistrict.com/county-healthdepartments/.

If your child does not have health insurance or their health plan won't cover these vaccines, call your local health department and ask about getting no cost or low cost vaccines. For more information, visit http:// dph.georgia.gov/vaccines-children or call your local health department.

Cook County Health Department wants to remind all Cook County parents and students that before starting the 2021-2022 school year, all students entering or transferring into 11th grade will need proof of a meningococcal booster shot (MCV4), unless their first dose was received on or after their 16th birthday.

Meningococcal disease is a serious bacterial illness that affects the brain and the spinal cord. It is spread through saliva and can be contracted by sharing food, drinks or makeup, kissing, sneezing and coughing. Meningitis can cause shock, coma and death within hours of the first symptoms.

MCV4 or meningococcal conjugate vaccine, is a two-dose booster shot. It helps protect against four types of the bacteria that cause meningococcal disease (serogroups A, C, Wand Y). While most people who get the vaccine do not have any serious side effects it is always a possibility. The most common side effects include redness or pain where the shot was given and occasionally a fever. These side effects typically go away within 1-2 days.

Ask your pediatrician or local health department about other shots your child may need including:

- an annual flu vaccine; and
- catch-up immunizations, including chickenpox, MMR (measles, mumps, rubella) and hepatitis B.

PARENT DROP-OFF/PICK-UP PROCEDURES

The lane nearest the sidewalk directly in front of the school is for student drop-off only. Drivers should pull as far down as possible along the curb (there is a sign posted where this begins) in lieu of waiting to drop off students directly at the front entrance. This will prevent traffic from backing up so much along the entrances to the school. No drop-offs should occur in the two lanes nearest the teacher parking lot. Please be reminded that the speed limit in front of the school is 5 mph.

Although some students may have to walk a few feet further through this process, this will speed up the flow of traffic directly in front of the school in the mornings. This will also help with afternoon drivers, especially those that arrive early before school has ended. We thank all drop-off drivers for adhering to this policy for the benefit and safety of all of our students.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION

Students must meet diploma requirements in three areas:

Assessments, courses, and credits.

- Courses: students must complete specific course requirements as outlined by the graduation rule and local requirements.
- Credits: students must earn 24 units as a minimum requirement.

GENERAL LOCAL POLICIES

A student will be placed in regular, advanced, and support

courses beginning in the ninth grade based upon standardized, criterion-referenced, and formative assessment data; grades; achievement; other evidence of mastery of the Georgia

Standards of Excellences; and teacher/guidance recommendations

 To be eligible for participation in graduation ceremonies, students must have completed all requirements for a diploma and all state assessment requirements.

COOK HIGH SCHOOL SUPPLIES

Individual teachers will provide supply lists the first day of school. The high school is equipped with very large lockers. Students are strongly encouraged to purchase a locker for \$10 (covers the entire year) to secure and store their valuables. PE Lockers are available for \$5 per semester.

Student Parking permits are \$20 and will be available on a first come first serve basis during scheduled days for 10th, 11th, and 12th grade students. Freshmen are not allowed to park on campus.






