


Learning about poetry can sometimes make students feel a little uneasy, and the use of just two verses that rhyme at a time, builds students confidence to explore poetry.

Teaching rhyming poetry by using simple couplets is a perfect starting point prior to moving to more difficult rhyme schemes. Once the students hear and read the first two consecutive verses, they can easily identify the last rhyming word in each sentence. As the poem continues to be read, couplets continue to be identified in each pair of verses.

Poetry is supposed to be fun, and the use of a free app called <u>RhymeZone</u> can help. Students can simply type in a word, and then it provides rhymes, near rhymes, and more!


Community Volunteers make Reading FUN!
