School-Based Behavioral Health Services Offered in Two New Milford Schools This Spring—More To Come!

School-Based Health Centers (SBHCs) are coming to New Milford Public Schools. In partnership with CT Institute For Communities, Inc., we are engaging in an innovative initiative to support students and families. SBHCs will offer families behavioral and physical wellness opportunities that typically occur outside the school walls. With busy schedules, families often need to juggle and rearrange their day in order to bring their children to appointments, and, as a result, students may need to miss valuable learning time. While not meant to replace the work of your health providers or our school personnel (nurses, social workers, etc.), the SBHCs will provide an additional option to families.

Behavioral health services are already available to students at New Milford High School and Schaghticoke Middle School. They are part of a larger-scale plan to offer behavioral health and medical services to all schools in the Fall of 2022. Information sessions have been held for parents and guardians to share more information. We plan to provide additional opportunities for the families and the community to learn more through community conversations and our district webpage in the near future.

According to Melanie Bonjour, CIFC School-Based Health Center Program Manager, "The overarching goal of the service delivery model is to support a student's academic achievement by reducing a student's number of days absent from school by diagnosing and treating problems early so that they can attend classes healthy, happy, and ready to learn." Services will be offered with no out-of-pocket costs to families. Insurance may be billed; however, parents will not be responsible for copays or deductibles. Uninsured students will be offered a sliding fee scale and assisted in enrolling in the State's HUSKY insurance plan.

Our district recognizes and values our partnership with families. Supporting student success requires us (schools, families, and the community) to attend to the whole child. As a result, we can work to meet the needs of students and ensure their success and preparedness for life, learning, and work beyond school. Click here for more information.

First grade experimented with composing on a one line felt board and Kindergarten and Excel worked on playing with high and low sounds.














This month, SNIS held their second annual Math Week planned by Math Coach, Mrs. Muir, and Technology Integration Specialist, Mrs. Bonnell. The week started with sidewalk chalk math, with students arriving at school to see math problems written all over the sidewalks, track, and catwalk by parent drop off.

Each morning on the daily announcements, students heard about a famous mathematician and a silly math joke. In classrooms, students worked on challenging math problems of the day. On Tuesday, there was a math scavenger hunt around the building, both inside and outside.

Mrs. Muir says, "On Wednesday, we held our first ever Family Math Night virtually. Over 100 people attended and participated in live math sessions with teachers. Some activities included math games, an escape room, estimation activities, 'Would You Rather' discussions, math mind benders, and interactive math trivia style activities. There was also a section of activities that were meant for families to work on independently that includes estimation mysteries, dice and card games, and interactive two part math problems, as well as a page developed by some 5th grade students who love math, that included escape rooms, puzzles, and much more." The site is still available for families to use here. On Thursday, classes participated in a St Patrick's Day themed estimating activity. The week ended with a school wide Math Shirt Friday and classes reading a math story and completing activities based on the story.









A school wide math poster contest was open all week, where over 200 students created posters for the theme "Mathematics Unites Us All" along with a family cooking challenge where families would plan, purchase, and make a meal together and then share their experience, recipe, and pictures on a school wide Padlet. With the wide variety of activities, there was something to interest every budding mathematician!

Schaghticoke Middle School

In the classroom, seventh grade students in Mrs. Santovasi's Tech classes have been planning their dream vacation. Students use Google Sheets to plan their itinerary and budget for the trip. There are many destinations

that students are researching and planning adventures in, including Disney World, Las Vegas, and Paris. This is a real-world assignment that gets students' thinking about costs in the real world. In Mrs. Patella's ELA Writing classes, sixth grade students have been engaging in rich discussion about personality traits and how dynamic characters change their personalities based on their settings, events, and other characters. Students have been learning about these things while reading the mentor text "Raymond's Run" and then applying their knowledge through small group discussions. During these discussions students work on making claims about characters that show multiple traits and then grow as a person throughout the story. Students then use evidence from the text to support their claims. Mrs. Patella is very proud of her students and shared that they are making great connections to the importance of their own social-emotional learning.

Teacher of the Year Nominations are Open

Teacher of the Year Committee Co-Chairpersons, Connie Williams & Roxanne Kraft, are pleased to announce this year's Teacher of the Year process:

Last year, the district's Teacher of the Year Committee piloted a revised and expanded process for selecting the district's Teacher of the Year. The committee's desire was to provide an opportunity for more teachers to be honored for their exemplary work and dedication

to students, families, and colleagues. The new program included naming a Teacher of the Year at each of the district's five schools, then selecting the district Teacher of the Year from those candidates. The program was an overwhelming success, with the committee receiving 174 nomination forms from students, parents, and staff. Eighty-nine educators were nominated! The five Teachers of the Year were announced at each school in June, and the district Teacher of the Year, Lisa Montemurro, was announced during convocation in August. The Committee has decided that it will again follow this format for the current school year.



According to the CT Department of Education's website, "The Teacher of the Year Program recognizes and honors teacher excellence. It does not attempt to select the "best" teacher; rather, to identify, from among many outstanding teachers of the year, one teacher to serve as a visible and vocal representative of what is best in the profession. The program celebrates excellence in teaching by recognizing teachers who have inspired a love for learning in their students and who have distinguished themselves in the profession."

Beginning on Monday, March 28th and continuing until Friday, April 8th, staff, parents, and students will again be invited to nominate educators that they believe show excellence in teaching. After the nomination process has concluded, a list of eligible candidates will be announced. Staff at each school will then vote for their school's Teacher of the Year. Announcements will be made in mid-May as our Superintendent, Alisha DiCorpo, along with members of the committee and this year's Teachers of the Year will surprise each school's new Teacher of the Year with the official announcement. Each Teacher of the Year from all 5 schools will then be given an opportunity to move forward as a nominee for the district title. The full district committee will convene to follow the same process they have followed in the past to choose our district's Teacher of the Year. This educator will then be eligible to submit an application to the State Department of Education for consideration as Connecticut's Teacher of the Year. The teachers' application packet includes biographical and professional information, essays on topics ranging from personal teaching philosophy to the issues facing public education, and letters of endorsement. As was the case in the past, we will continue to expect and encourage our nominees to submit their application to the state after accepting the nomination at our district level.

We encourage you to participate in this process by <u>nominating a teacher</u> that has inspired you and has inspired students this year. We are excited to see the results of this process that showcases more of our talented and dedicated educators!

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
