Big Idea: What do you have in common with people around the world?

Ask your child how this week's reading selection helps him or her answer this question.

This week's reading selection: The Pot That Juan Built

Summary: More than seven hundred years ago, the inhabitants of a prehistoric settlement in northern Mexico made pottery using clay from the nearby hills. When a young man rediscovers their methods in the 21st century, he sparks an art movement that helps turn his small village into a prospering community.

DISCUSS with your child some of the ways your community celebrates art and culture.
