KEYNOTE SPEAKER

José Porfirio Morales



Son of Maria de Los Angeles and Porfirio Morales, Jose was brought to the United States just after he turned one. Growing up in a working-class, immigrant family that supported education, and emphasized service at the cornerstone of his life. After moving a few times, due to work transfers, the family settled in Arvin, California which helped further mold Jose during his formative years.

Soon after high school, he joined the Navy, working his way to Petty Officer Second Class. After returning to Kern County, he attended Bakersfield College and UC Santa Barbara. Jose married Laura Morales and wonderful things started to happen more quickly. He earned his Bachelor of Science in Chemistry, his Teaching Credential, Administrative Services Credential, and Masters in Education at CSU, Bakersfield and had two children, Olivia and Max, who are now fantastic teachers and coaches in their own right.

Jose feels fortunate to have been able to return to his alma mater as a teacher, coach, and all-around good guy. After teaching, he went to McFarland High School as a Vice Principal. He accepted the position of Coordinator for the Migrant Education Program and after fourteen months in that position he was promoted to Director of Migrant Education Program with the Kern County Superintendent of Schools where he spent his final 23 of his 31 years in public education.

Although Jose is officially retired, he continues to support the local education community. He continues to serve the San Juaquin Valley's educational community as a trainer, consultant, and provider of student services with Balanced Educational Support & Training (BEST). For example, the development of virtual and remote learning programs at the start of pandemic, implementing hybrid learning models, and transitioning back to more of an in-classroom learning model have all been part of the support and training that BEST has provided to local agencies after it became critical when corona virus safety shut down schools.

Sol Robinson is originally from Guanajuato, Mexico, and immigrated to the United States at the age of 15 with dreams of obtaining a college education in the United States. Sol completed that goal by graduating from California State University, Fresno and earning a bachelor's degree in Business Administration with an emphasis in accounting.

Sol prides herself on understanding the needs of migrant families and marginalized communities, recognizing that access to educational opportunities is limited.

In the last 4 years, Sol has been in charge of empowering and educating migrant parents through various programs that strengthen the bond between parents and the school. Sol believes that the most valuable gift we can leave to our children is precisely that of their education.

Angelica Cisneros Parent leader - Santa Maria JUHSD

Angelica Cisneros is originally from Puruándiro, Michoacán Mexico. She migrated to the United States 29 years ago with her husband in search of better opportunities. Angelica currently resides in the city of Santa Maria, CA and works in agriculture, picking red and black blackberries. Angelica is the mother of 6 children between the ages of 33 and 7. Angelica only had the opportunity to complete secondary education in her home country, she firmly believes that education is the door to better opportunities and a better quality of life. That's why Angelica decided to enroll in a program of study to earn her GED, in addition she enrolled in Allan Hancock Community College where she completed non-credit ESL classes to learn English and received her first childcare certificate. Angelica is about to start ESL credit classes at this college. Her greatest motivation has been her children, she can better support them in their own journey by setting an example herself.



Juvenal Cortes Parent leader - Santa Maria JUHSD

Juvenal Cortés is originally from the state of Oaxaca, Mexico and immigrated to the United States at the age of 14, currently residing in the city of Santa Maria which has been his home for the past 30 years. Juvenal is the father of 4 children ages 22, 20, 17 and 8. He believes that parental support is important for children and their academic success. Juvenal has been a member of several school committees and has been actively involved in the academic education of his children. Like many migrant parents, he was unable to continue his education beyond middle school in Mexico, but that has not been an impediment for him, and he continues to prepare day by day. Being an involved parent has allowed him to provide his children with the support they need in their education and achieve their goals.



PANELISTS

Wendy Enriquez Villalba

First generation college professional

Epidemiologist - Department of Public Health, Santa Barbara County



Wendy Enriquez-Villalva is an epidemiologist working in the Department of Public Health Santa Barbara County. Her personal experience and that of her family and close friends is what led her to pursue a career in public health. After immigrating from Oaxaca, Mexico to the United States; her parents worked as field workers following the seasons of work. Eventually, they put down roots in Santa Maria, which is where she grew up along with her three siblings.

Growing up, she noticed many differences in access to health care, education, and resources in general. Often, people in her community who were Mexicans of indigenous roots, immigrants, and farmworkers, just like her parents, struggled to navigate the health care and education systems due to language, culture, and other barriers. She saw how this affected both their lives and the lives of their children. Although she didn't know how to express what she was witnessing, she often wondered what she could do to change these systems and increase access to health and information. This led her to pursue degrees in Public Health Policy (BA) and Public Health Sciences (BS) from the University of California, Irvine. During the pandemic, she returned to the Central Coast and worked for the local county's Disease Containment Unit. Eager to pursue a career where she could positively impact the community that raised her, she joined the California Department of Public Health's California Pathways to Public Health Program, where she was assigned to the local county Epidemiology Unit as an intern. This experiential learning program would provide her with the skills to combine her formal education and lived experiences to help keep health equity at the center of her work as an epidemiologist.
