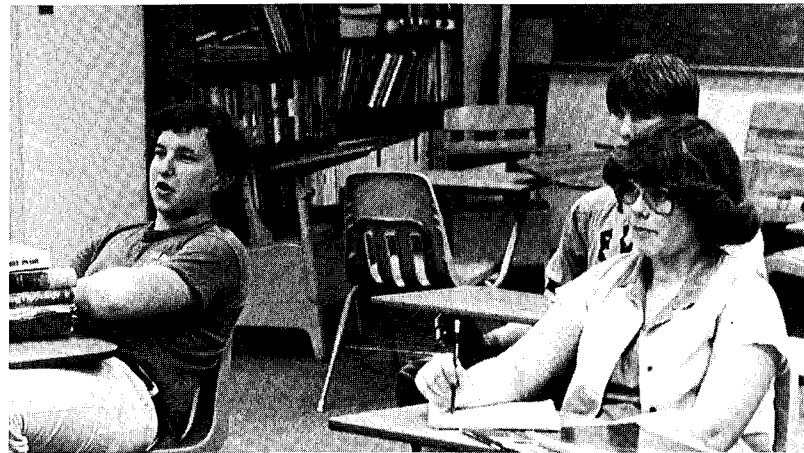


Underclassmen Lead Foreign Language Club

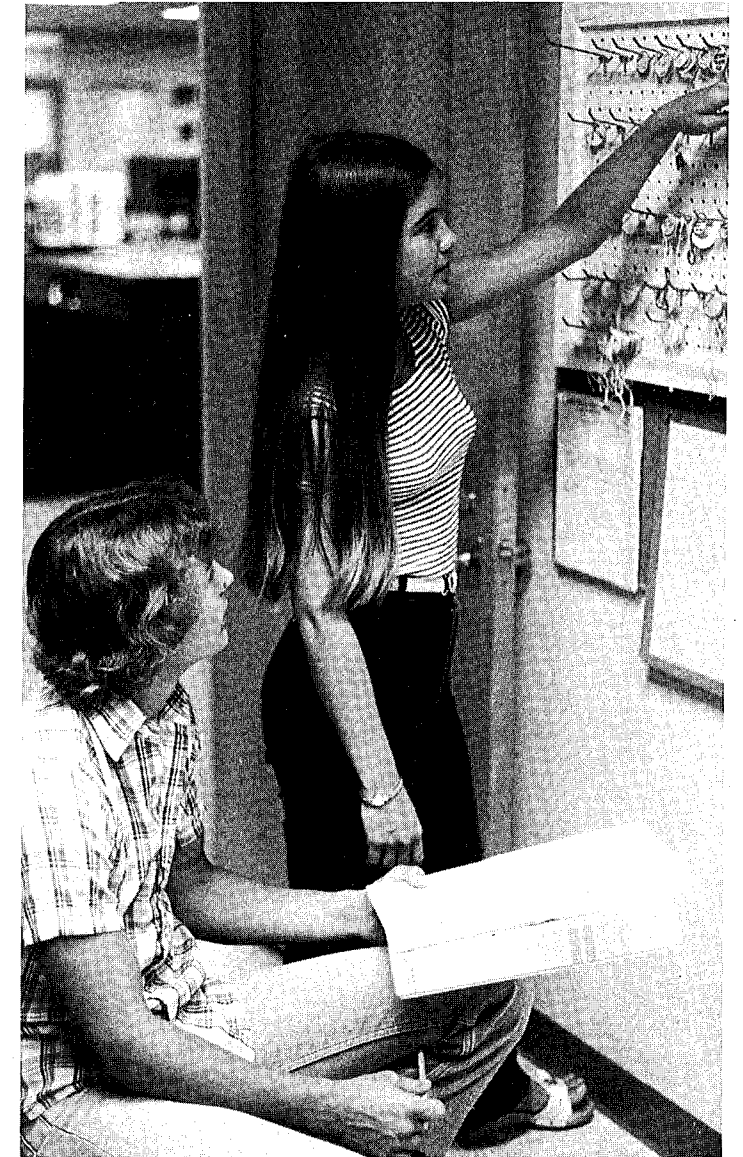

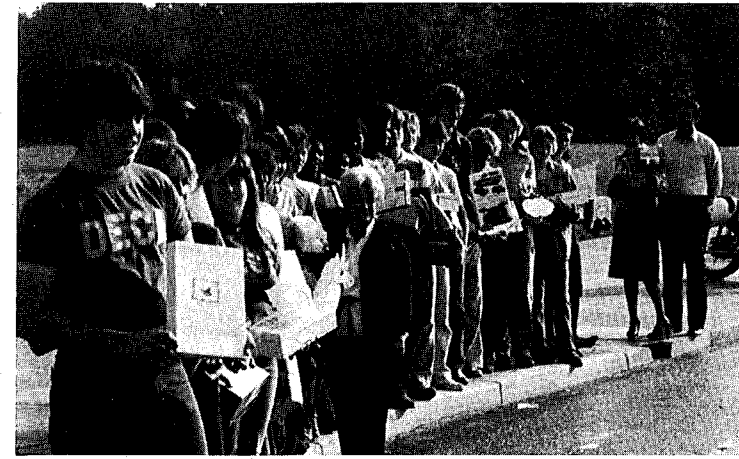
Joni Noreika Goes to State

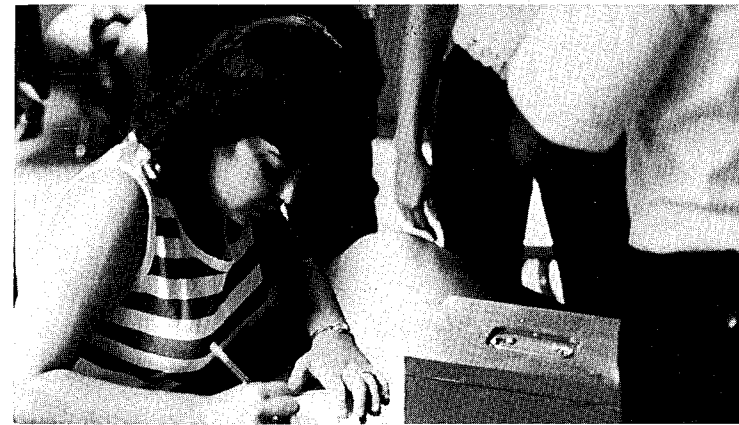
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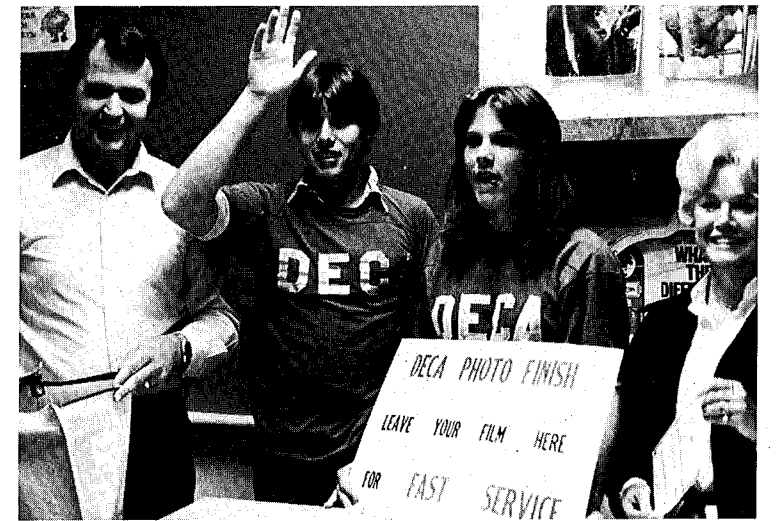

Mr. Deaton and Mr. Darrow were the sponsors for the chess club.

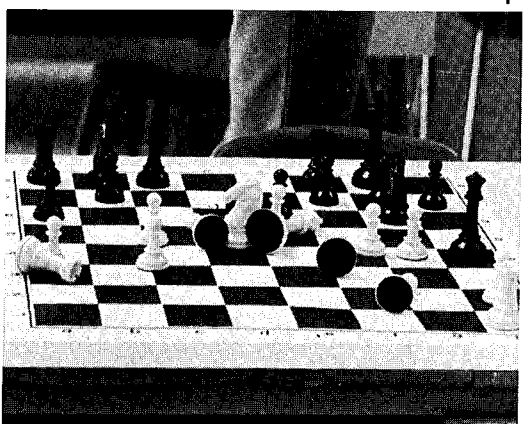

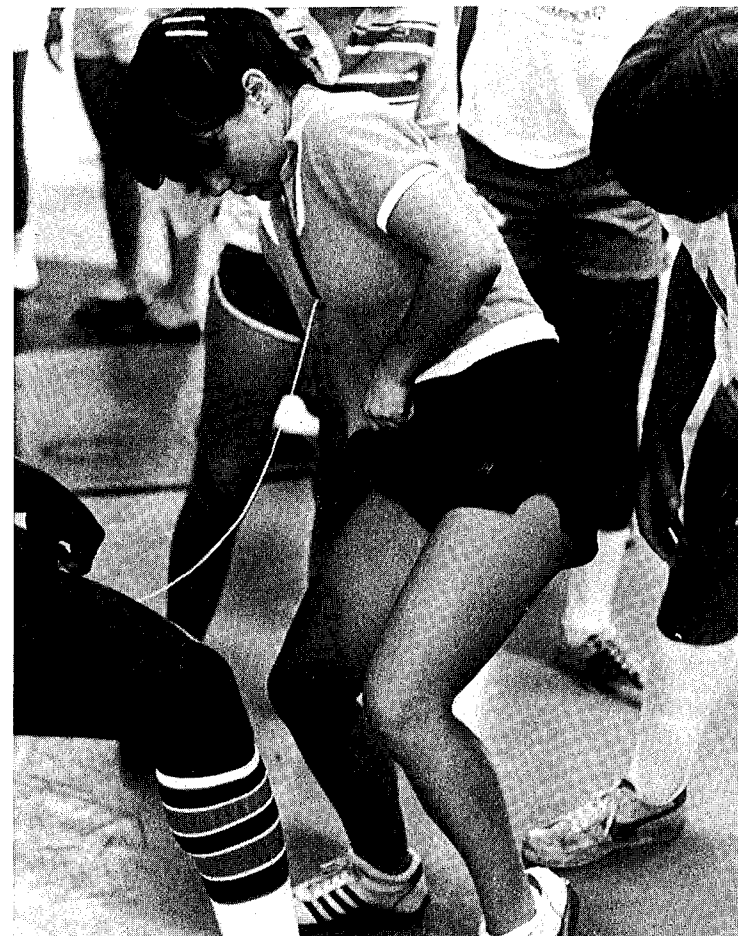

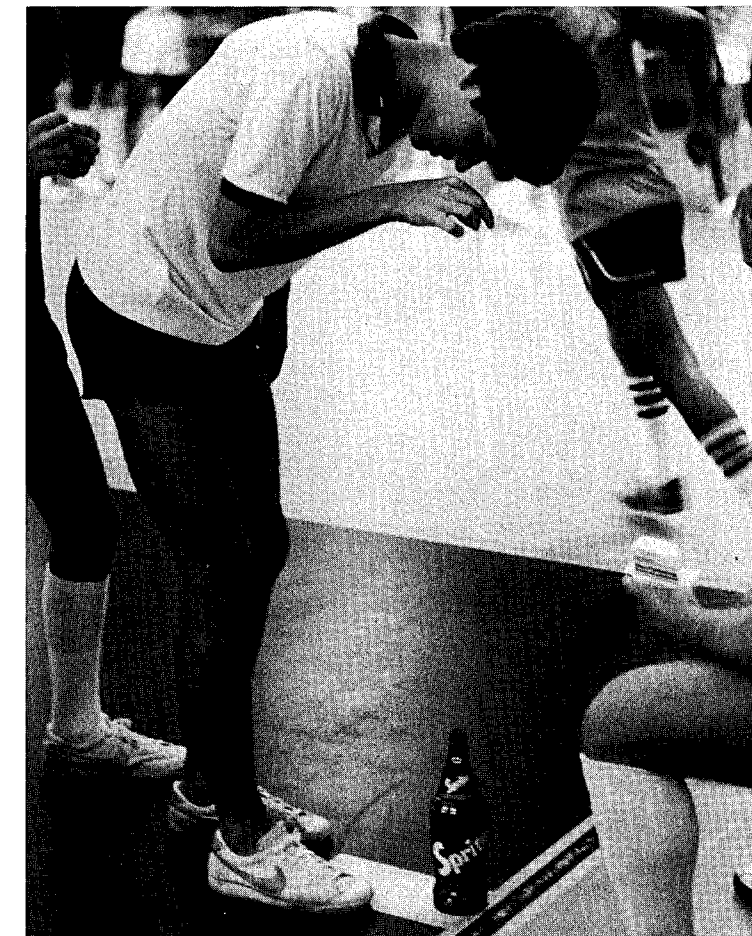

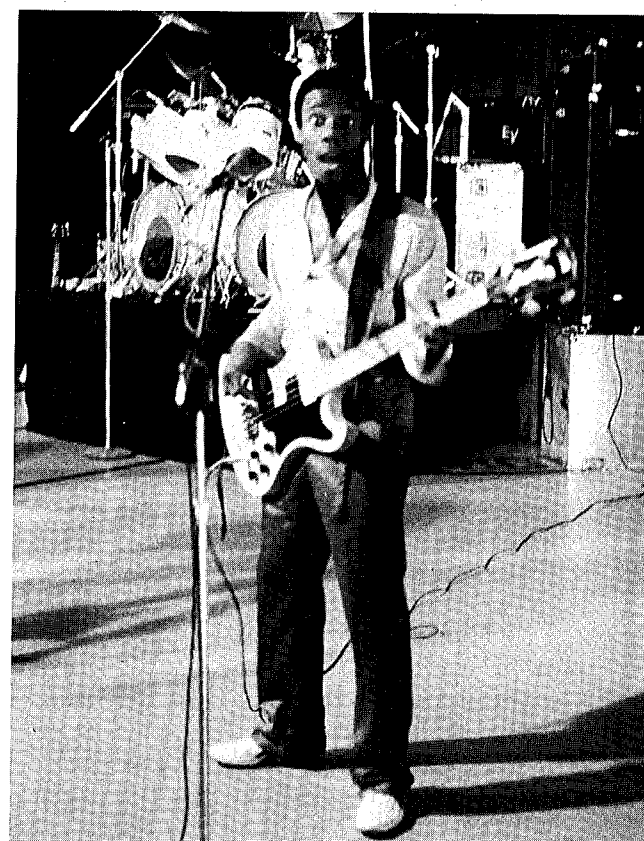

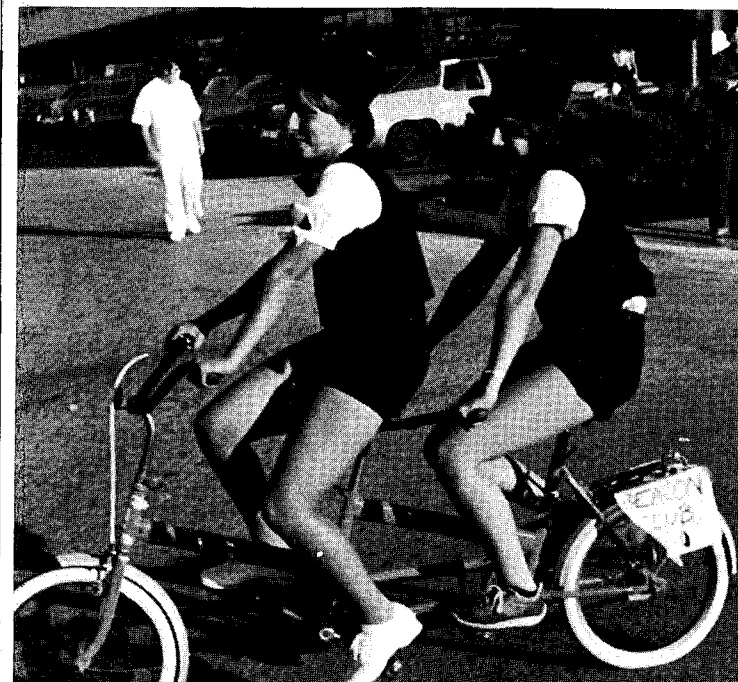

The club members were guests of Alpha Delta Kappa sorority, their sponsors, in February for a talk by Miriam Rockness.

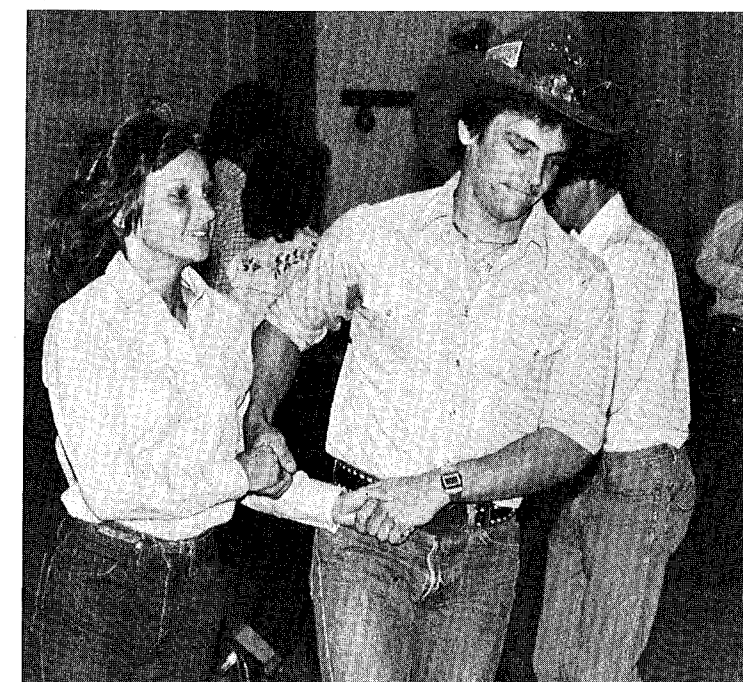

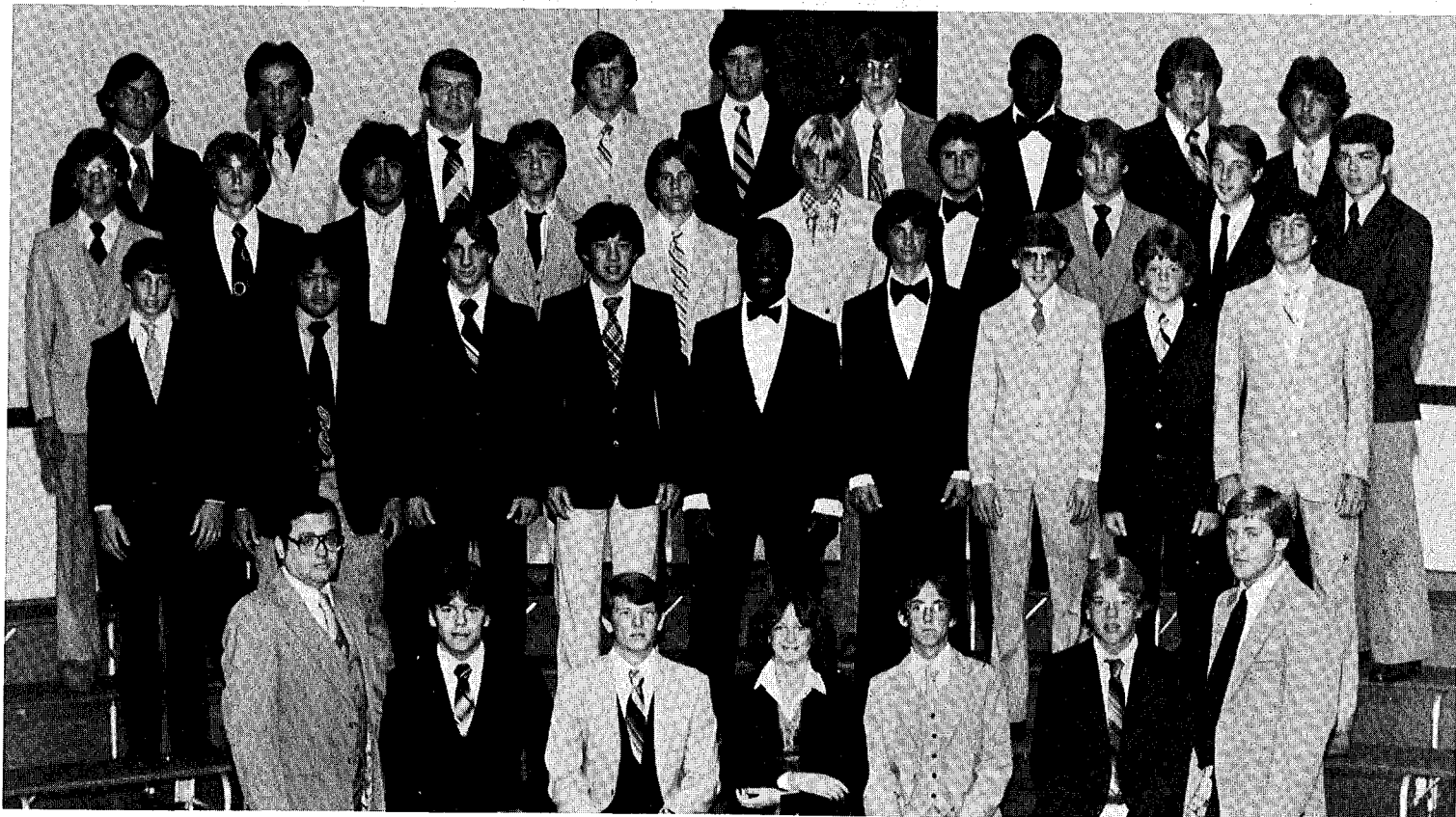
Kiwanis Sponsors Pancake Day

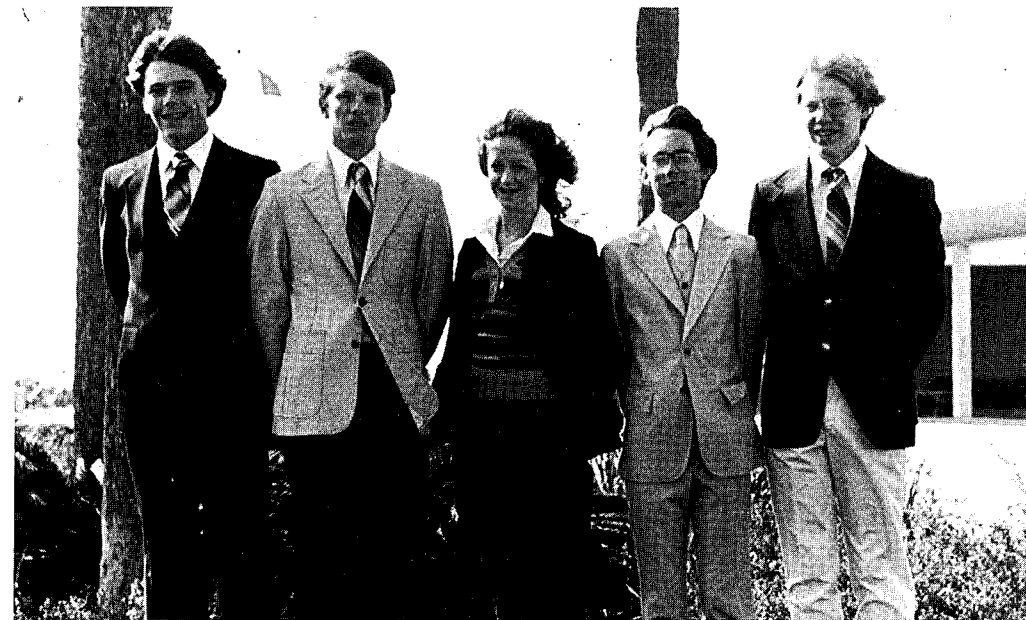

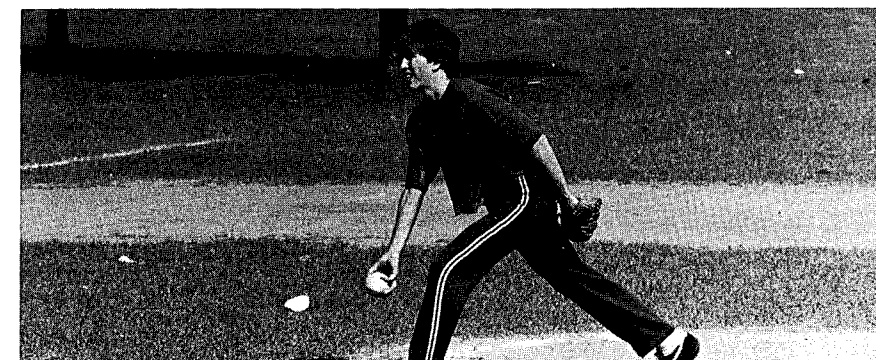

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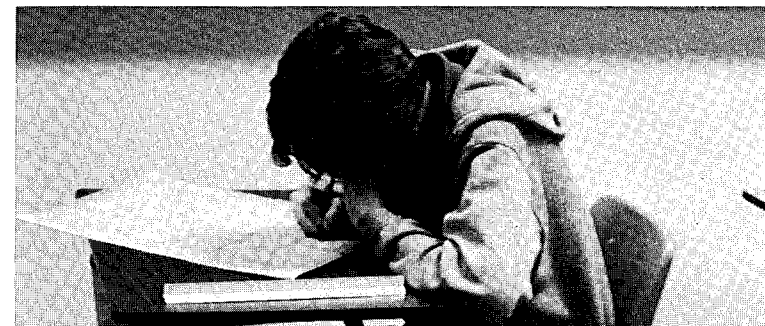

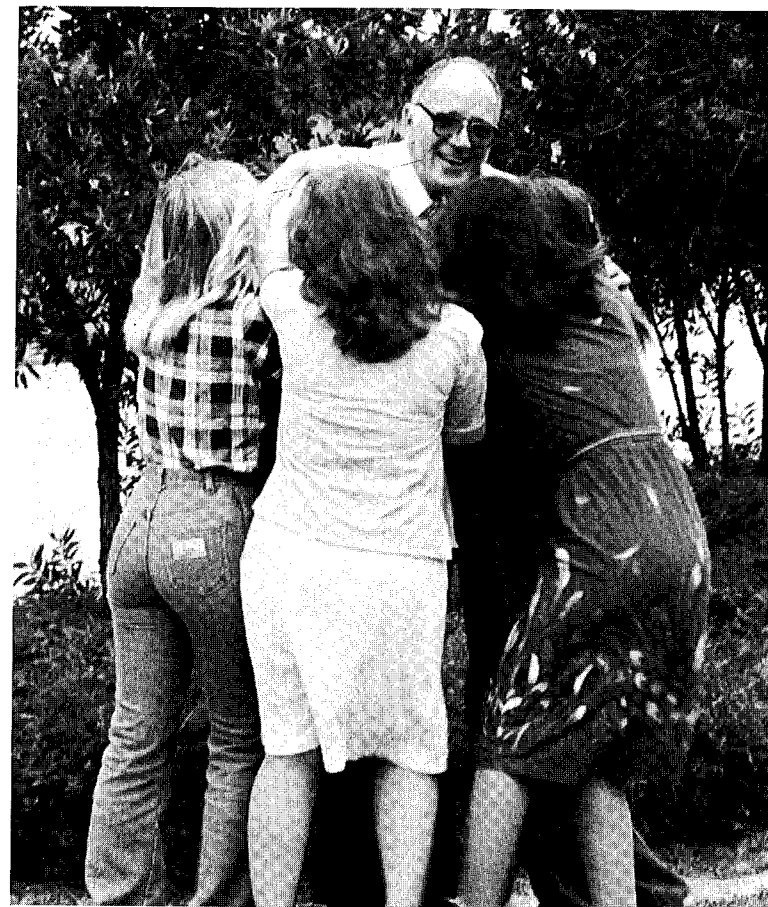

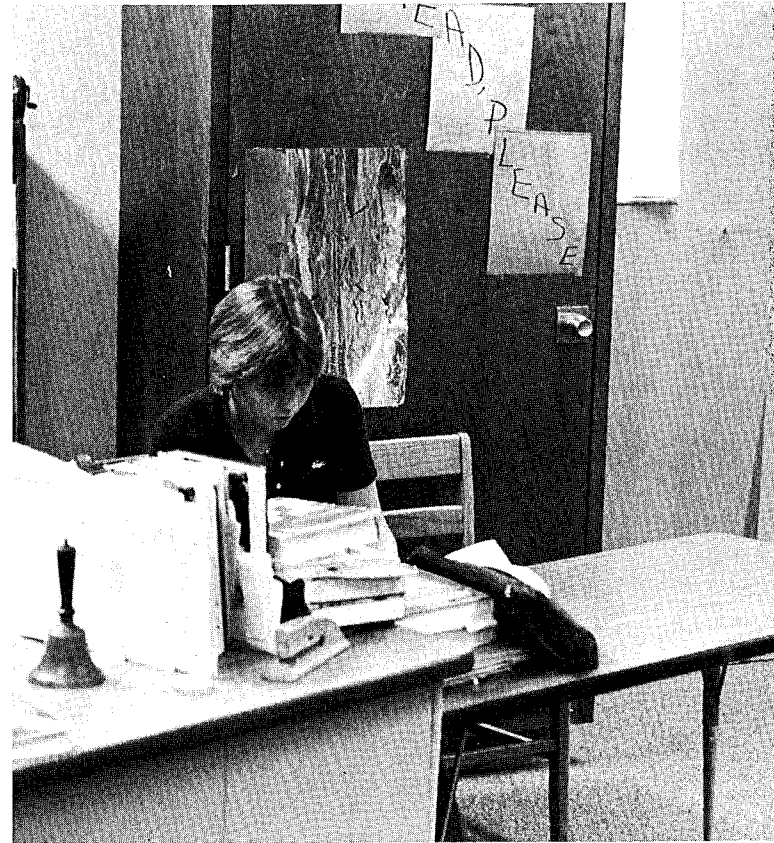
Honor Society Promotes Career Day

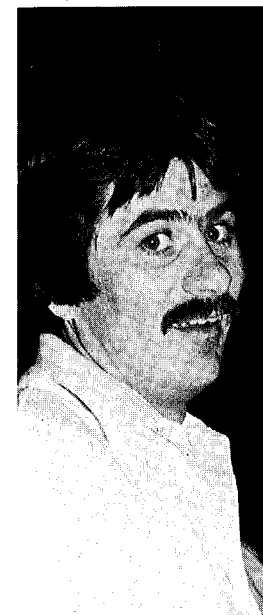
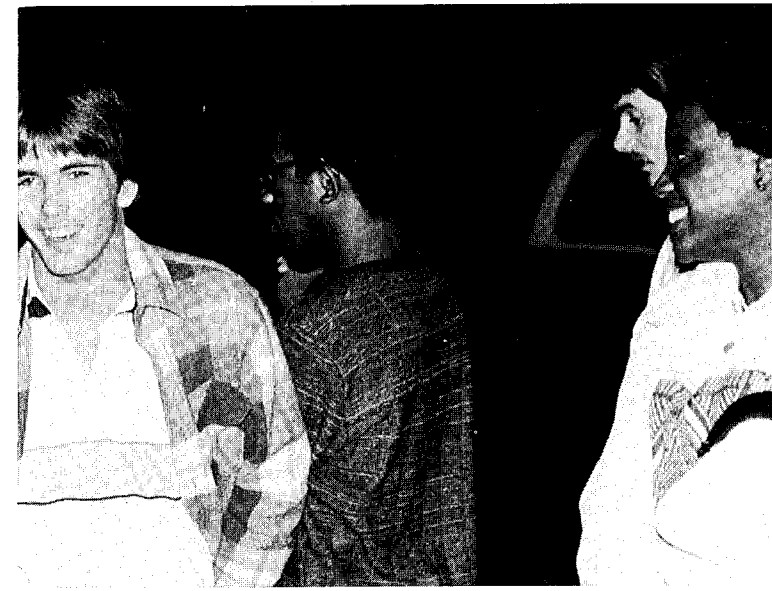

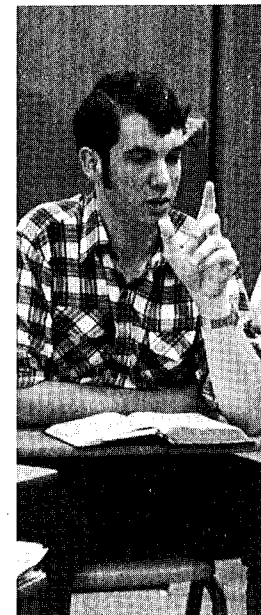
Youth Rally Held

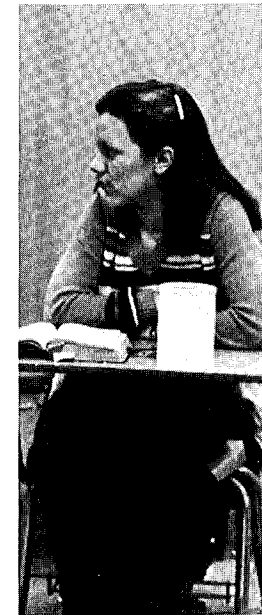

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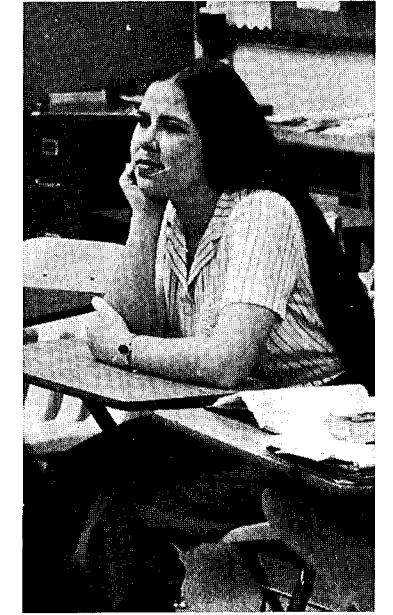
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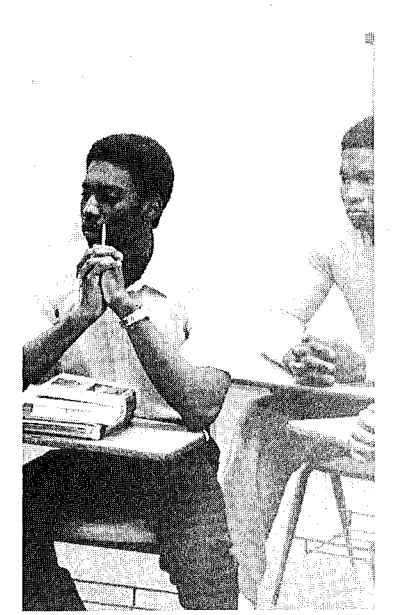
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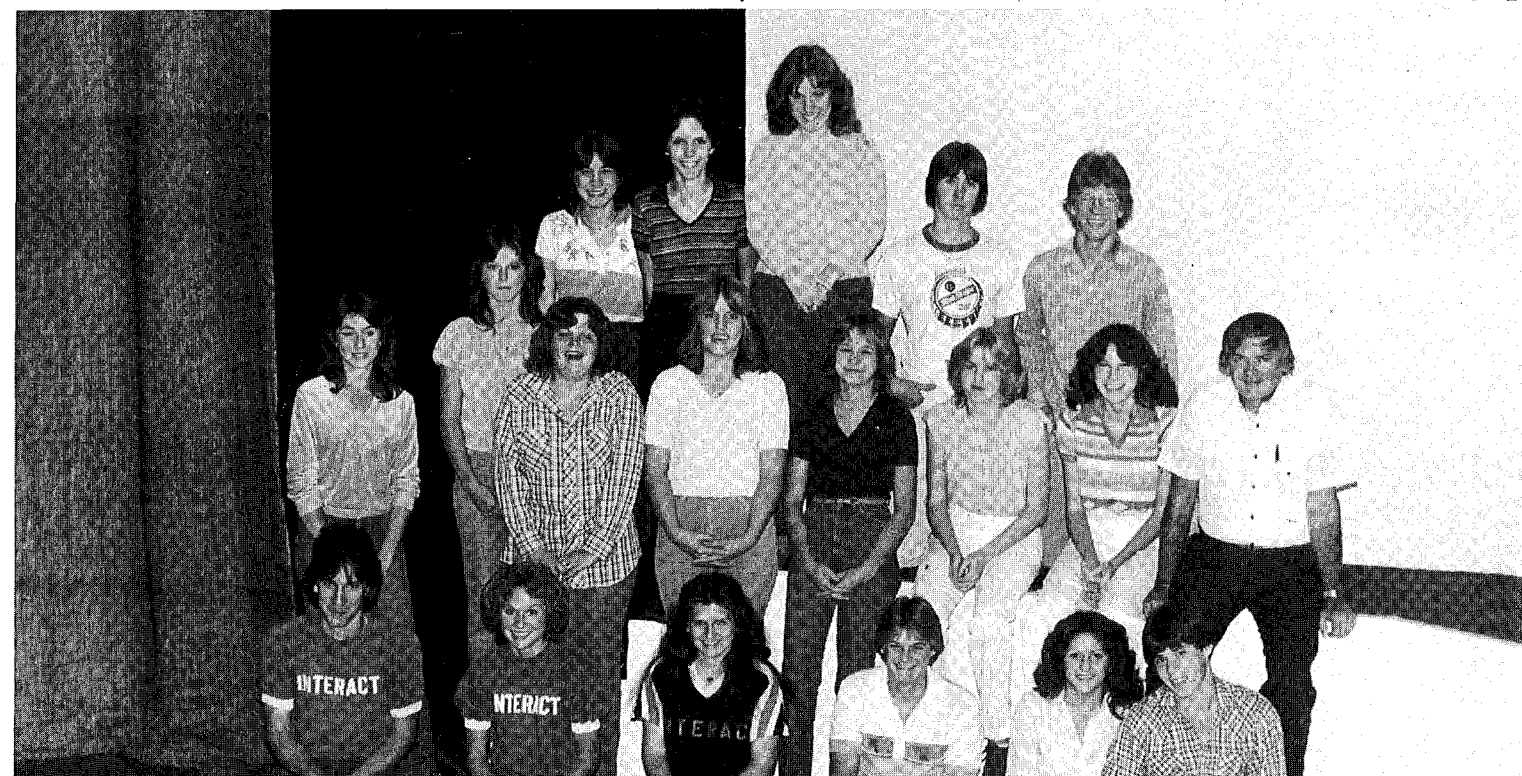
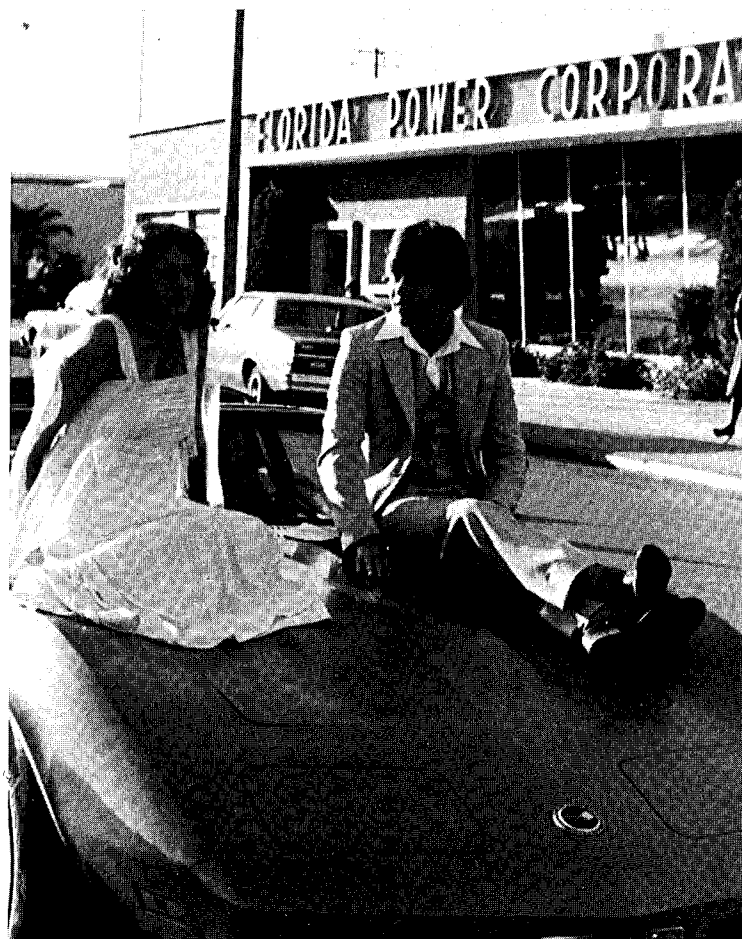


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Interact Dies

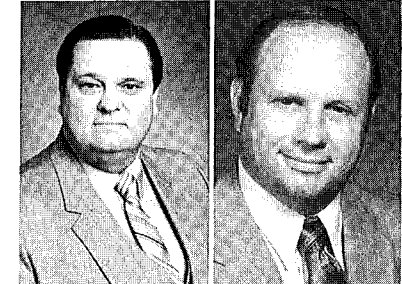
Administrators Use Law Enforcement Against Drugs

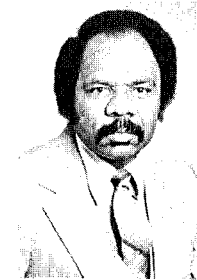

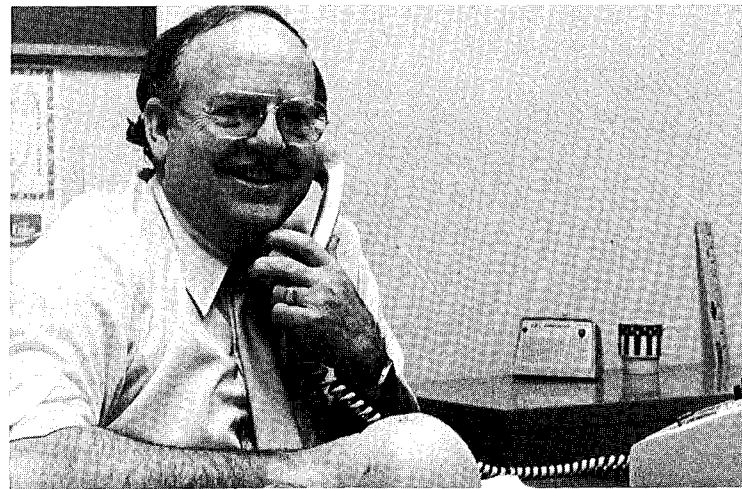
New Xerox Machine Aids Faculty

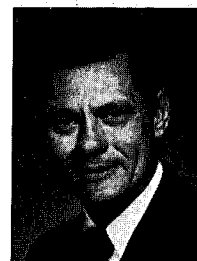

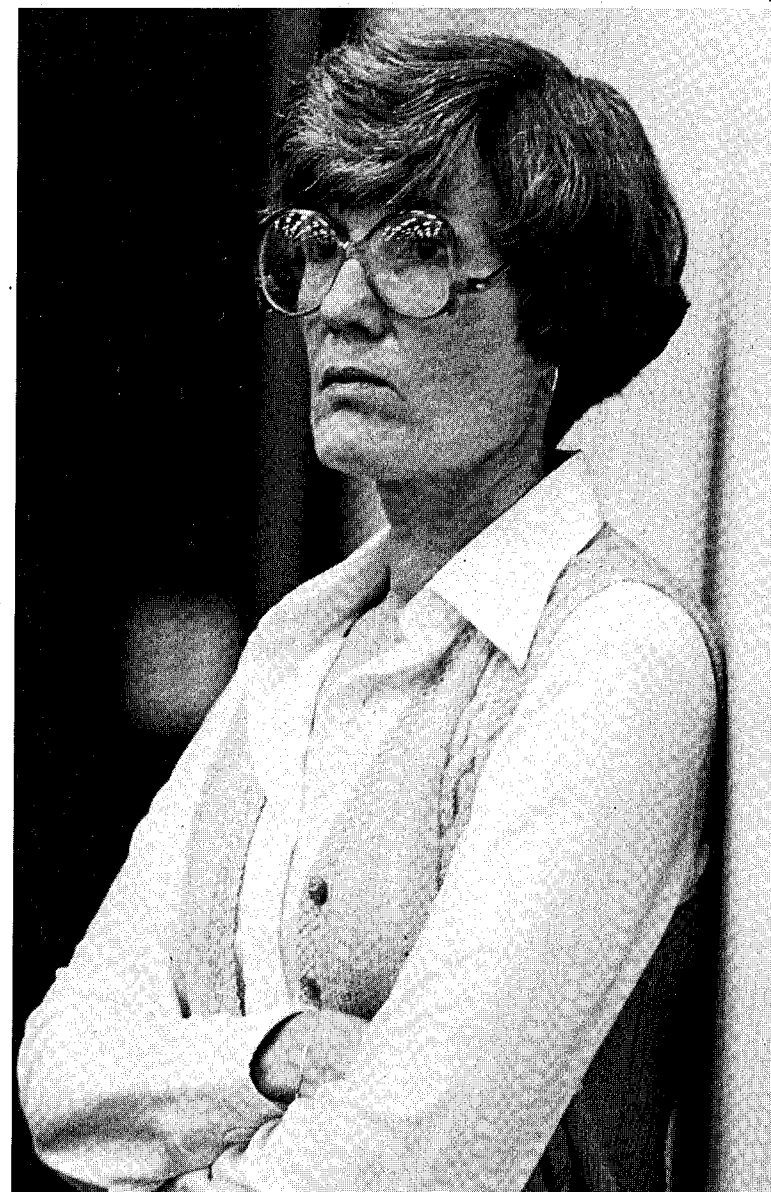
County Computer Causes Schedule Changes

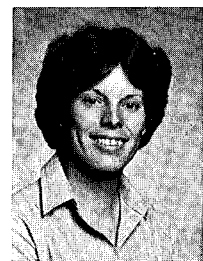
Students Get Into Christmas Spirit

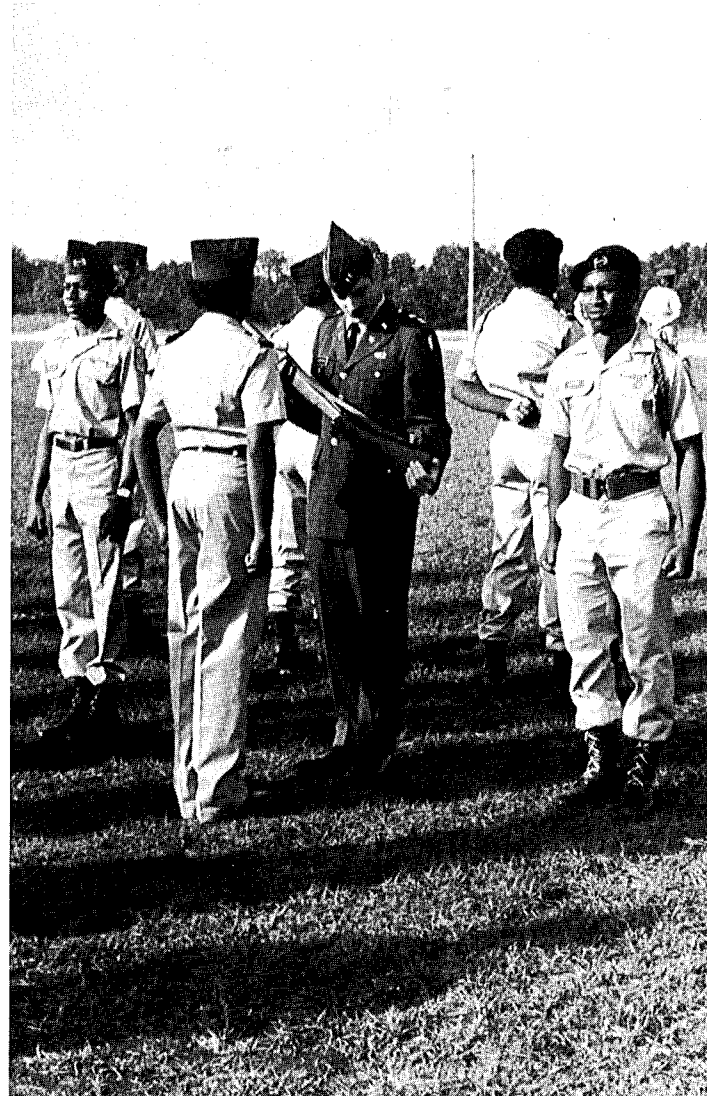
Martial Arts Team Performs for Student Body

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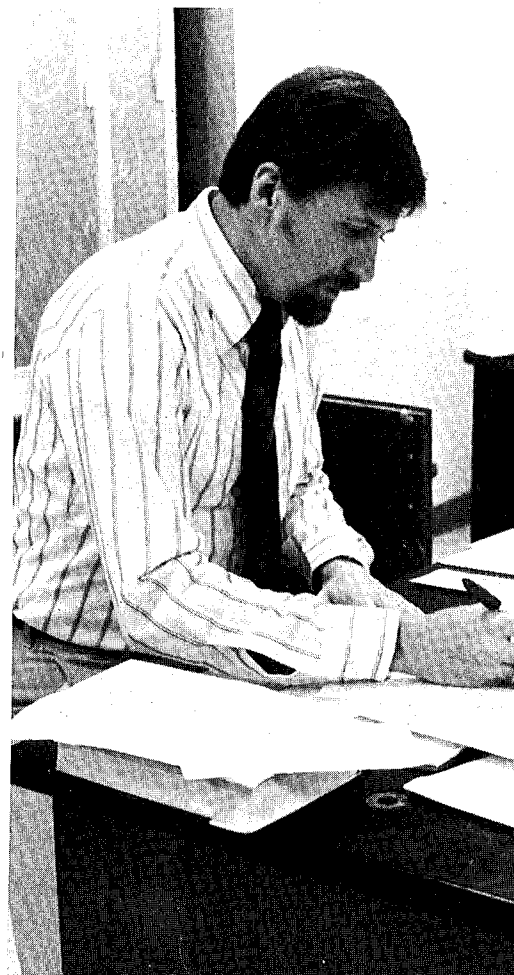
Physiology Classes Study Cats

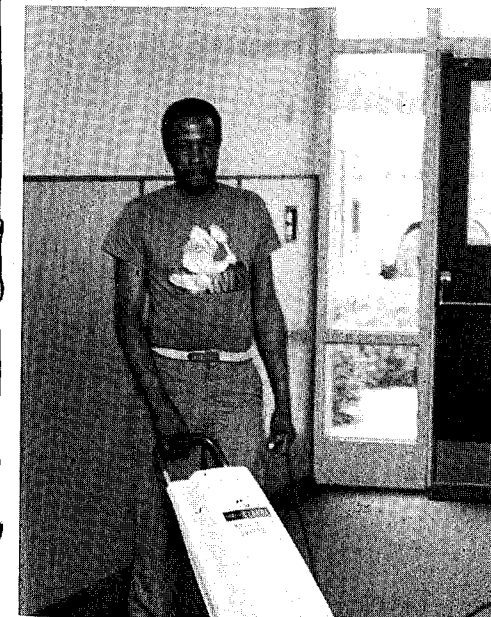
Energy Provided

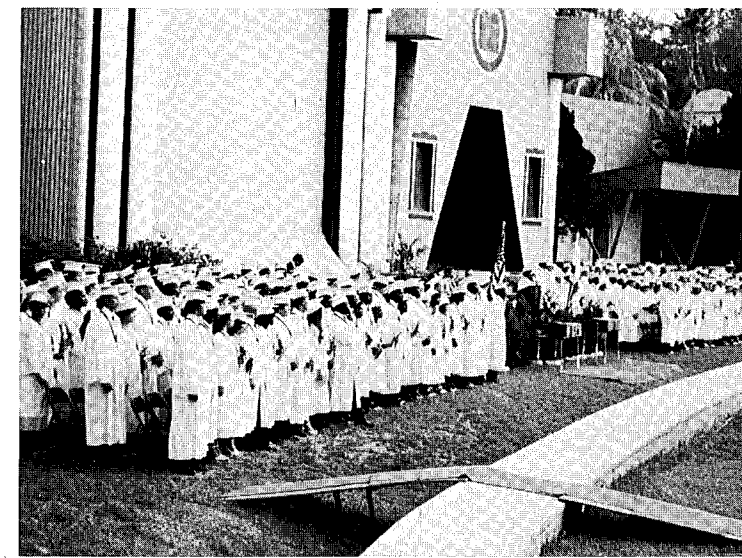
The Hope of Tomorrow . . .

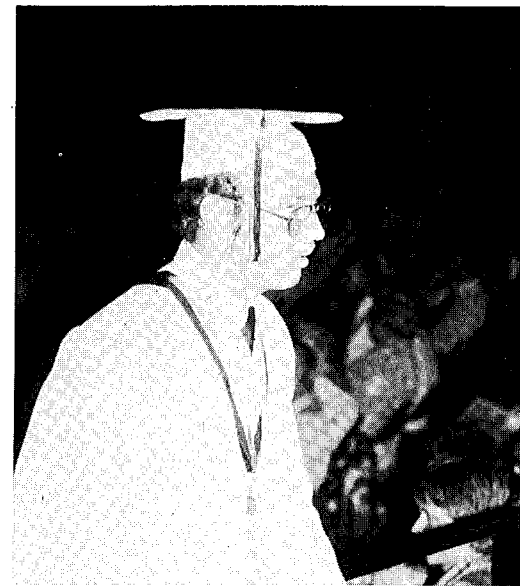
A Long Journey Ended, A New One Begun

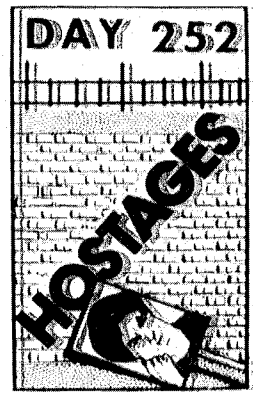
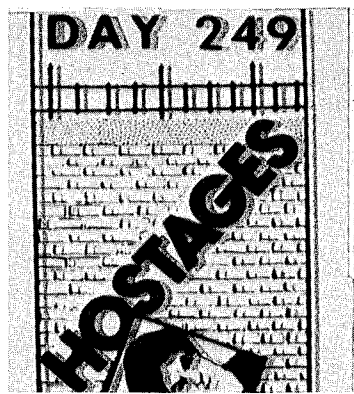
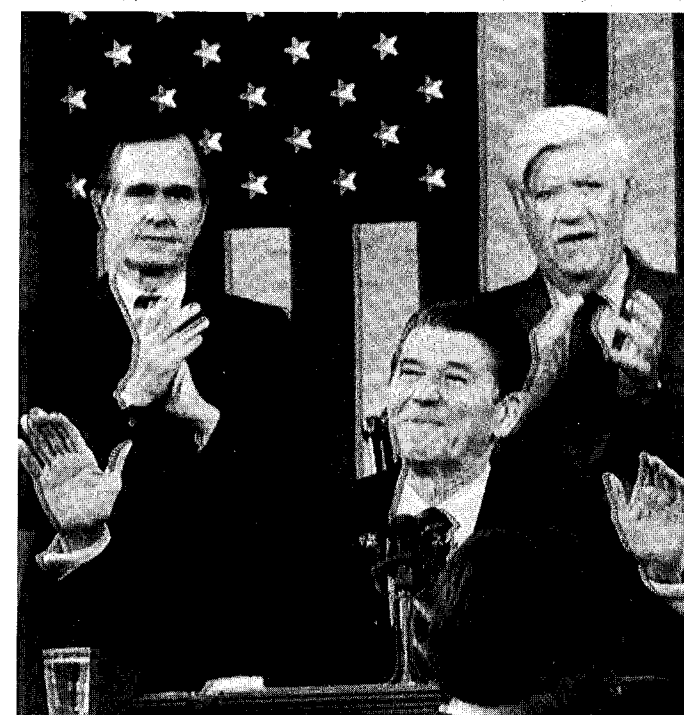
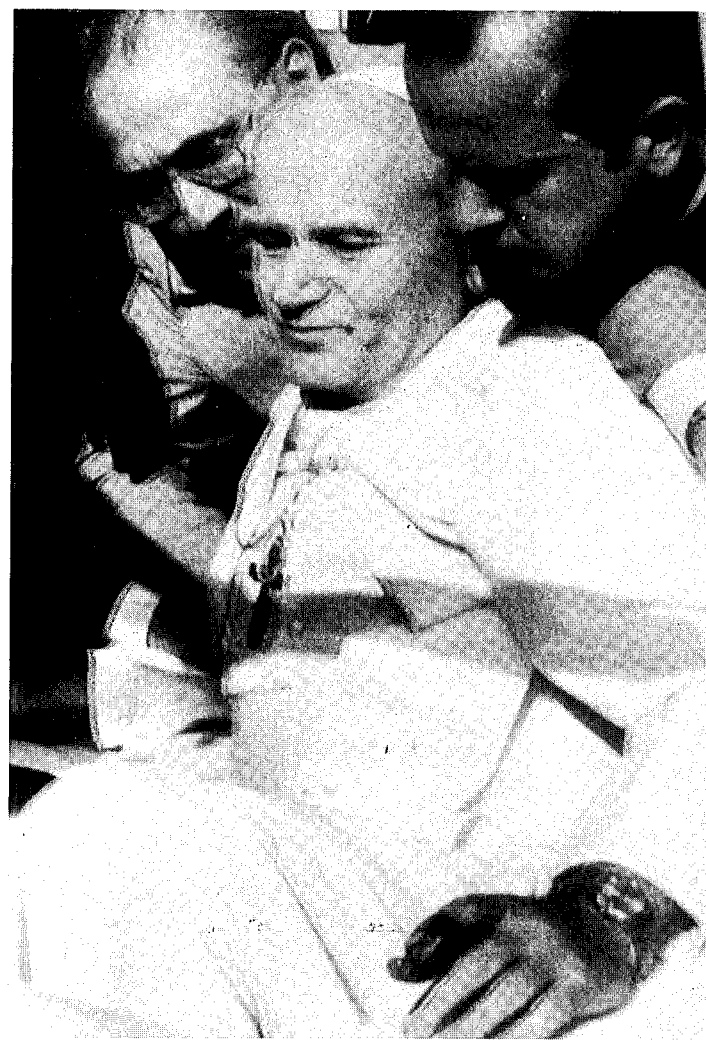
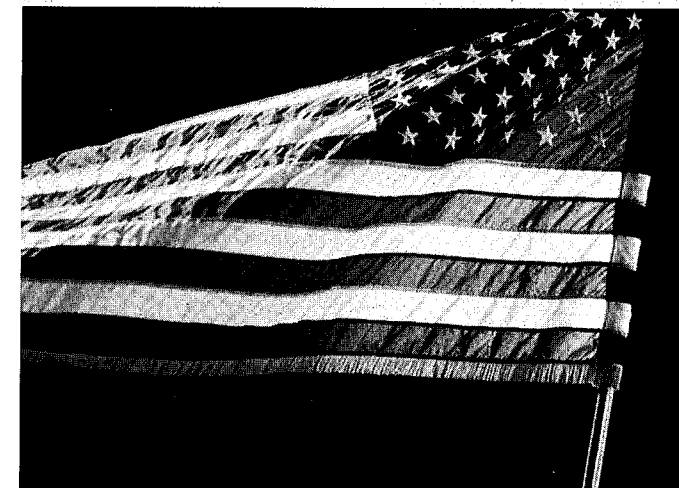
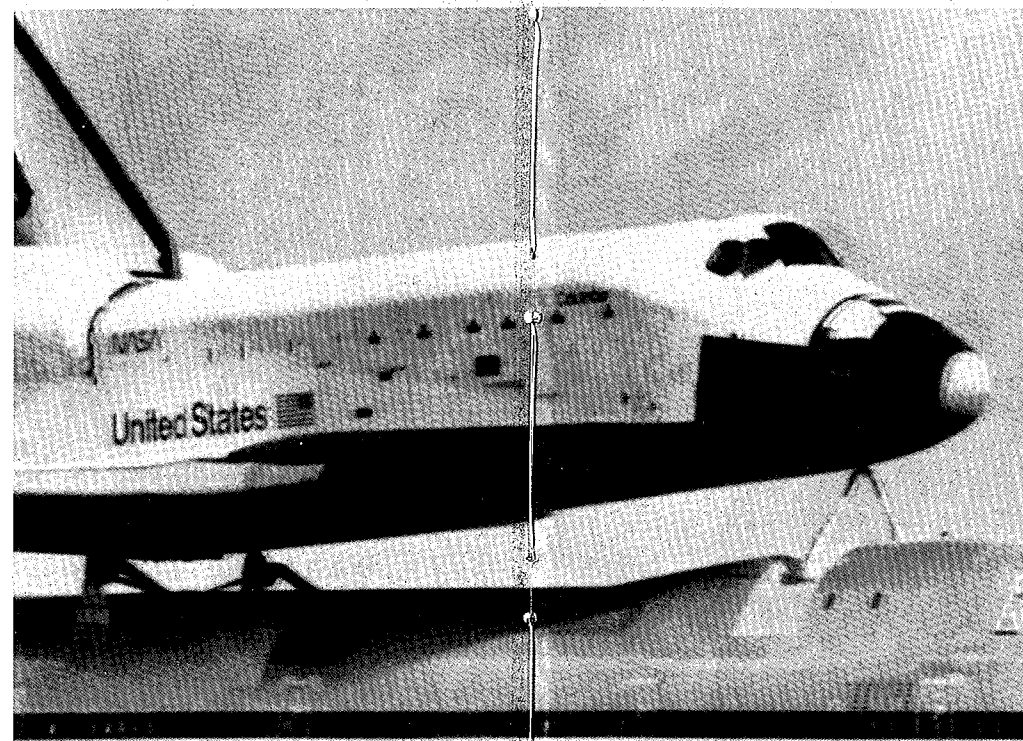
The nation rejoiced and greeted with love the hostages that spent over a year of their lives as prisoners in Iran. They were the nation's strong and brave heroes.
