# **Big Idea:** How is science put into action?

Ask your child how this week's reading selections help him or her answer this question.

# This week's reading selections:

My Brother's Flying Machine: Wilbur and Orville Wright's sister reveals what it was like to watch her brothers invent the airplane. She describes how they first became interested in flight and their determination to invent a flying machine a person could control and maneuver.

The Diary of Orville Wright, 1903: In this diary entry, Orville Wright describes the first four flights he and his brother Wilbur took on their flying machine from the beach at Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. An engine lifted the craft into the air, but erratic winds and rudder placement contributed to crashes and damage.

DISCUSS with your child what can inspire inventors and how and why they record their observations.
