Course Description:	<p>This year-long Introduction to Cabinetmaking course is a year-long course that will utilize intermediate woodworking skills including: joinery techniques, machinery applications, technical assembly processes, and advanced finishing techniques. Student projects and enterprise activities will enhance all processes. As students move through the course and become proficient with shop tools, they are given the opportunity to design and build their final project. Students will also have the opportunity to participate in SkillsUSA.</p> <p>The course fee is used to purchase project lumber, and various shop supplies (glue, nails, screws, finishing materials, safety glasses, etc.).</p>

Course Learning Units:	Industrial shop safety, hand and power tool safety, hand tool use, precise measurements, material finishing, material identification, introduction to joinery techniques, blueprint analyzing				
Major Course Assignments and Projects:	Students will be required to complete a minimum of 3 projects during the year, utilizing the power tools learned, as well as assembly and finishing techniques.

GRADING/ASSIGNMENT PROCEDURES:

Assignment Weighting for Course:

Semester Course Work (A1) : 80% + Semester Final Exam (E1) : 20% = S1 or S2 Grade

A1 category weighting:

Grade Scale:

Assignment Policies: Assignments will be due by the end of the school day.

Late Work: All late work will be accepted for a period of 1 week, with 20% deducted from the graded score.

Attendance & Absence:

A parent or guardian must notify the attendance office by phone or in writing on the day of the absence. Once on school grounds, a student may not leave campus without permission and without signing out in the attendance office.

Tardiness:

A student not in his/her assigned seat when the tardy bell rings is considered tardy. Absent Work:

A student is allowed 1 day to make up work for each day he/she is absent. (2 days absent= 2 days to make-up work, etc.)

District Homework Policy

Purpose:

- Homework should be purposeful, intentional, and relevant to instruction.
- All types of homework should promote high-quality learning and achievement.
- Teachers introduce new concepts, information, and skills in school, **not** in homework.

**Time:**

- Time spent on homework should be purposeful in terms of learning and skill acquisition.
- Homework may be assigned on a daily or long-range basis where students can expect an average of 70 to 120 minutes per night encompassing all subject areas.

Academic Dishonesty:

Academic dishonesty will not be tolerated under any circumstances. Cheating, copying, or plagiarism of any form will result in failure of the assignment, disciplinary referral, and a parent contact. (See Student Handbook)

School Behavior and Expectations:
