Jonathan Mooney "Learning Outside the Lines" Thursday, February 10th, 6:30-7:30 p.m. A Virtual Gathering





BOE Adopts 2022-23 Education Budget



New Milford Public Schools Superintendent Alisha DiCorpo presented the Superintendent's Proposed 2022-23 Education Budget to the New Milford Board of Education for consideration on the evenings of January 18, 19, 25 and 26 in public session. The 2022-23 Superintendent's Budget, as proposed, was \$68,205,949 which is an increase of

\$2,359,925 or 3.58% over the current year's budget.

Ms. DiCorpo states, "The proposed budget is focused on supporting the programmatic and operational needs of each department, as well as the social emotional needs and resources of the District. This year, in addition to the operating budget, the COVID-19 budget and the five-year Capital plan for Technology,

Facilities, the Music and Athletic programs are presented as a reflection of the District and building needs, in order to ensure that we have the supports necessary to provide an excellent educational opportunity for all students with an emphasis on staff and student safety. COVID-19 has changed the way we educate students and the District has made tremendous strides in our efforts to focus on the major standards of the grade in every academic area and to integrate technology as a part of the student day. Therefore, we must continue our work of aligning curriculum and integrating resources to make learning engaging and fun; we must continue our efforts to identify and support academic needs; support professional learning to guide curriculum and technology implementation; meet the social emotional needs and mental health needs, as well as to provide students and staff with a safe and healthy learning environment."

Ms. DiCorpo hosted several workshops in December and January prior to the budget hearings. In January at the budget hearings, the Board heard detailed presentations regarding each of our five schools from PK-Grade 12; and from the departments of Instruction, Pupil Personnel/Special Education, General Administration which includes the Business Office and Human Resources, Facilities and Technology. Public comment was offered each evening.

The Board of Education's Adopted budget, as approved on January 26, 2022, was finalized at \$67,767,289, which represents a 2.92% increase over the current year's budget. Budget documents and video recordings of the workshops and the four evenings of presentations and deliberations can be found under the Budget tab on the district website <u>here</u>.

Board of Education Chairperson Wendy Faulenbach says, "The budget process is extremely difficult and time consuming for all involved. The entire Board and district recognize their responsibility and take this charge very seriously. Approval of the final BOE budget was unanimous. All members of the Board strove to balance the needs of the district while being mindful of economic challenges. Amendments to line items were geared to avoid reductions to instructional programs and any direct impact to students. We will continue to work with the Town and community throughout the budget process going forward."
