

Use the different sections of this letter to begin conversations with your child about what he or she is learning.

Big Idea: What does *respect* mean to you?

Ask your child how this week's reading selection helps him or her answer this question.

This week's reading selection: Damon and Pythias

Summary: Damon and Pythias show what true friendship means in this Greek legend set on the island of Sicily. When one young man is captured by King Dionysius, the other one volunteers to take his place.

Essential Questions: How important is trust between friends? Have you ever worked hard to show somebody that you care about him or her? What would you be willing to give up for a friend?

DISCUSS with your child all the things he or she can do to be a good friend. Together, write a list of friendship rules on a piece of paper.
