What a privilege to be wrapping up

another year of ministry at Nebraska Christian Schools. Again this year we have added to the number of students who have graduated from Nebraska Christian Schools with a Christ-centered education, a Biblical worldview and a love relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ. We thank God for that.

Success in our mission at Nebraska Christian Schools is accomplished by the contributions of many. For each student who enrolls at Nebraska Christian Schools, at least three distinct contributions are made.

The first contribution is made by the staff of Nebraska Christian Schools. The cost to educate any student in the state of Nebraska averages \$10,000. Many of our staff have accepted positions at salaries lower than they could make elsewhere. We thank God for staff members who see their work as a ministry and not just a job. Their contribution to our mission means that our cost per student is only \$7,000. This cost is for actual classroom instruction and excludes room and board, extracurricular activities, the cost of the international program, etc. It is about the same for every 1st through 12th grade student.

The next contribution is the tuition checks written by parents, students, and other interested parties. We thank God for students, parents, relatives, churches, and others who see the value of our mission and invest in it. The board's stated policy is that tuition costs should be held "to a minimum" without allowing "expenses to exceed the funds the Lord provides annually..." A very small number of our students are charged the full \$7,000 for tuition, and the average student pays quite a bit less than

Lady Eagle Volleyball Camp



When looking to move ahead, it's often helpful to look back and remember the lessons the Lord has taught us

in the past. In reviewing the history of the school, I was struck by how God worked in the unlikeliest of ways.

This beautiful campus was the last choice of the founders – in fact, they weren't even going to take time to look at it until after the Grand Island dog pound building didn't work out. Fifty-four years later, Nebraska Christian sits on a beautiful campus with space to grow as the Lord leads.

The Nebraska Department of Education told the founding board how unlikely it was that a non-denominational Christian school would ever survive, because how would it raise enough funds to pay **Honor** continued from pg. 1

students K-12 to get information about the soon-to-be graduates. I asked them to answer questions about a few of the seniors that they knew. I asked what gifts and talents they saw, words to describe them, things that they appreciated about them, and stories or examples of how they had used gifts or talents to serve others in a Christ-like manner. I was very encouraged by the answers that came in.

The following are just a few of the responses that were written about the graduates. I hope the following excerpts give you a glimpse of the fine young people that are graduating.

We are pleased to report that God has chosen to pour out his blessing on NC by once again moving on the hearts of many very generous donors to give to the Dinner and Benefit Auction. While final figures are not yet available, it appears that we will have a net profit from the event of well over \$180,000. Over 350 donors contributed to the success of this event along with approximately 100 willing volunteers.

Two hundred eighty-five guests at the Saturday night dinner were welcomed by the soft glow of lamps and candles and the big band sounds of the Knights of Rhythm. The student servers once again impressed our guests with their gracious service.

Twenty-six items were offered for sale on the Live Auction. An Asian dinner for eight, donated by Larry and Barb Hoff and prepared by the girls' dorm students was the item bringing the highest bid at \$4,500. And, it sold again for \$4,400.

Lt. Governor Rick Sheehy, who attended the event, challenged the crowd to make this the first time the Lt. Governor's luncheon brought more than the Governor's dinner. After much spirited bidding, the Lt. Governor won out at \$3,550 for his luncheon. Gov. Heinemann's dinner for eight

brought \$3,500. Three Cornhusker football tickets brought \$3,500, in part because the Lt. Governor added an invitation to the Governor's tailgate party prior to the game.

Hot air balloon rides were another "hot" item, selling three times for a total of \$7,950. U.S. Figure Skating Spectacular VIP tickets, River City Rodeo and Concert tickets, "Fiddler on the Roof" at the Orpheum tickets and several other exciting experiences and fun items kept the bidding lively.

The Scholarship Auction continues to be an avenue of giving that our donors are enthusiastic about. NC has a \$100,000 line item in the budget for student scholarships each year. Prior to the event, \$47,242 had been received in re-

sponse to mailings and phone calls toward the \$100,000. The Live Scholarship Auction bidding resulted in \$41,612, bringing the total to \$88,854! We are praising the Lord that we are within \$11,146 of funding that line item 100% for this year. All these funds will be used to provide a Christian education for students who might otherwise not have the financial means.

We are grateful to all who were able to donate time, talent, or treasure in order to make this event a success. Please join us in thanking God for blessing NC in a big way through the Dinner and Benefit Auction.



Two Qualify for State Wrestling; Elge is State Runner-Up

Senior Isaac Elge added to his collection of state medals when he became the state runner-up in the Class D 132-pound weight class. Elge, a state wrestling qualifier each of his high school years, was defeated by Eric Coufal of Howells, who became a four-time state champion. Elge finished the year at 38-4. In 2009, Elge wrestled at 103 pounds and was eliminated in the consolation second round of the tournament. In his sophomore year, he lost in the first round of the tournament but came back to place 5th overall in the 119-pound class. In 2011, he won the Class D 125-pound state title. Elge ends his NC wrestling career at number one on the leaderboard for season wins (38 in '11-'12) and near falls (52 in '11-'12) and for career wins (131), escapes (84), reversals (97), and near falls (275).
