
PRE-ORDER YOUR YEARBOOK!


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FLU CLINIC- MONDAY, OCTOBER 18TH, 2021.

6TH GRADE

ELA-As part of our English Language Arts (ELA) curriculum, we will begin a unit titled *Never Give Up.* In this unit, students will read about people and characters who refuse to give up, despite the hardships they face. We will consider different ways to face challenges and stay strong. The texts we will read center on the Essential Question "What keeps people from giving up?" This open-ended question is intended to spark thoughtful discussion. You may wish to explore this question with your student at home as well.

Science- Students will be starting on the Rock Cycle in October.

Social Studies- In Unit 3 students will be provided an overview of civic concepts, particularly as it relates to the role of citizens in Europe in affecting the decisions made by their

respective governments. Special attention is given to the governments of Germany, Russia, and the United Kingdom and how past historical events have shaped the present government.

Math-6th Grade Math

We will finish up Unit 2: Expressions

*Students will be able to translate verbal ideas and real world situations into algebraic expressions.

*Students will be able to simplify algebraic expressions by combining like terms.

* Students will be able to apply commutative, associative, and distributive properties to help simplify algebraic expressions.

*Students will be able to show if two expressions are equivalent.

Accelerated Math is currently working on positive and negative integers. We have studied where numbers are placed on the number line in relation to zero and will begin adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing integers next week. At home show your children how you use positive and negative integers in everyday life (bank accounts, temperature, debt, etc.)

7TH GRADE

ELA- We are delving into Unit 2, exploring the question, "How do actions define us?". We have read a short story about accepting ourselves for who we are, and are currently reading a myth about Icarus, a very popular story you may know! Some skills students should know by the end of this unit are finding theme, internal and external conflicts, character traits, coordinate adjectives, and so much more!

Science-7th grade students are studying the human body systems in science.

Social Studies- History of the Middle East.

Math-7th grade math students completed *Unit 1 Rational Number*s and started *Unit 2, Expressions, Equations, and Inequalities.* Understanding math standards in future units is dependent upon skills developed in previous units. During Unit 1, students learned how to compute with positive and negative whole numbers, as well as fractions and decimals. They will continue to use Unit 1 skills in Unit 2 and throughout the year. In Unit 2, students will solve real-world problems through the application of algebraic concepts. They will simplify expressions, evaluate equations, and find solution sets to inequalities. In this Pre-Algebra unit, students use variables represent real-world situations and use the properties of operations to generate equivalent expressions for these situations. They will be combining like terms and using distributive property, both important foundational concepts for Algebra. They will extend their previous understanding of one-step equations which may include rational numbers.

While students are learning algebraic concepts they may, at first, experience struggle as problem solving becomes more abstract. Please encourage your student to persevere, keep trying, don't give up. Our mathematical process standard states that students will make sense

of problems and **persevere** in solving them. Math mastery requires effort and tenacity. Mathematical fluency is developed through practice, practice, practice. Every moment spent struggling, practicing, and working on math contributes to current and future math skills needed for academic success.

8TH GRADE

ELA- We are in Unit 2 – The Thrill of Horror

Science- 8th Grade Science

Current Area of Study: Matter-States of Matter, Phase Changes, Physical and Chemical Properties of Matter & Physical and Chemical Changes

Coach Lane did a fun lab with "Oobleck" to help the students understand the different states of matter.

If you would like to make "Oobleck" at home the recipe is below: "Oobleck"

1. Mix water with the cornstarch until the right consistency is reached. (about 2 cups of water and 1 cup of water)

2. What are your initial observations about the putty before you begin.

3. Roll the putty into a ball. What happens when you stop rolling it?

4. Scoop some of the putty into your hand and allow it to flow out. Cut the putty with scissors.

5. Cut the putty in the pan with the plastic knife.

6. Rest your finger on the surface.

7. Hit the putty with your hand.

Wha did you observe? Do you think this substance is a solid or liquid?

Honors Science- Will be moving into their energy unit where they will discuss the different forms of energy and energy transformations. From there, they will dive into each individual form of energy starting with heat. Students will learn about specific heat, conduction, convection, and radiation.

Social Studies-We will end our study of Georgia's statehood and westward expansion after the Revolutionary War at the end of September. We will next begin Unit 5 – The Civil War, which covers the events in Georgia, and the United States that led to the war, the end of the war, and the importance of the Emancipation Proclamation. This unit will include one quiz and a test. We will finish this unit near the end of the month and being Unit 6 – The New South, which includes the 13th, 14th, and 15th Amendments to the U.S. Constitution.

Math-

Algebra - Will be learning about linear equations and inequalities.
