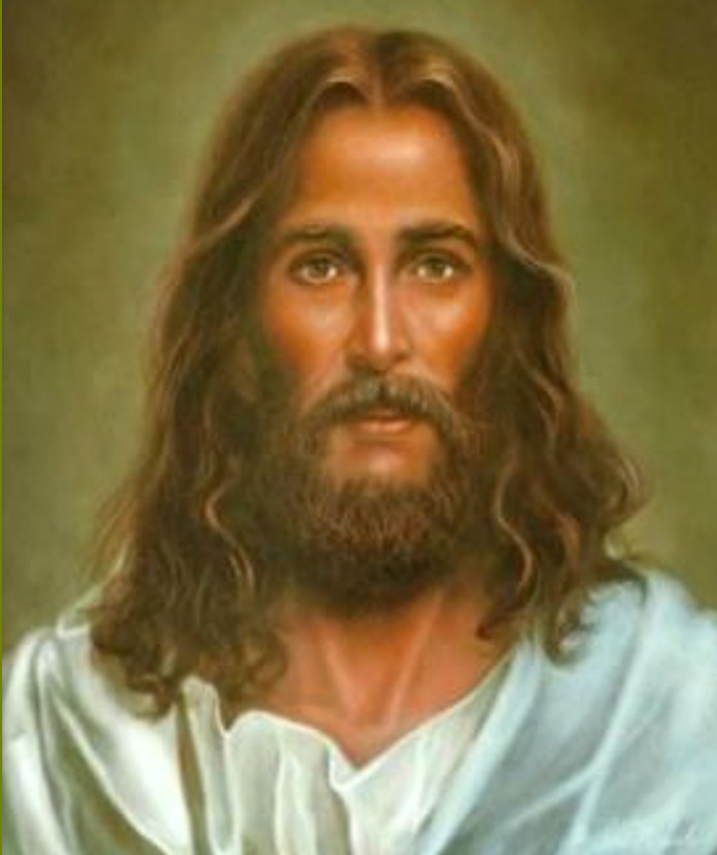

Pause to hear God speak...
"See to it that no one be deprived of the grace of God, that no bitter root spring up and cause trouble, through which many may become defiled" (Hebrews 12:15).

Here is a reflection about healing from bitterness:

Today, I choose to fast from the sin of bitterness. When you eat a bitter food, it often leaves a sour look on your face. Emotional bitterness has the same effect on our insides. It poisons our hearts and gives life an "unpalatable" taste. We can be bitter toward others as well as toward ourselves. In both cases, bitterness has one outcome: destruction. If we are routinely sarcastic, harsh, and hostile, we should check for bitterness. If we constantly criticize the failings or shortcomings of ourselves or others, bitterness probably has a hold in our lives. The Scriptures refer to bitterness as a root, meaning that it is unseen. When we allow bitterness to take root in our lives, we often blame those around us for our circumstances, rather than take responsibility for the way we handle them. As we reflect today, let's expose this bitter root.

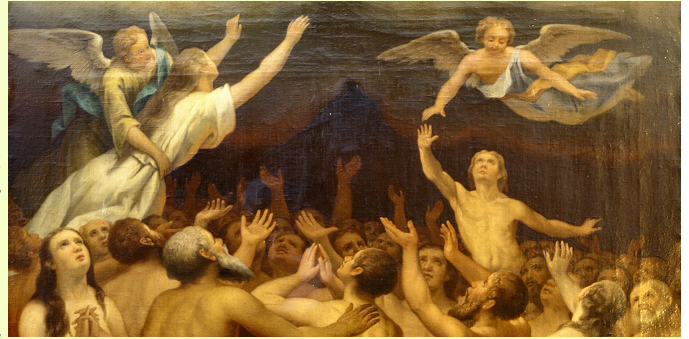
Pray slowly...

IS PURGATORY A "DEAD" ISSUE?

Purgatory is seldom mentioned anymore in sermons and articles, except by way of denial of its very existence by non-Catholics. Is it true that Purgatory is not mentioned in Scripture? If so, how could it have been taught by the Catholic Church for 20 centuries, especially since the Catholic Church also teaches that Jesus died to take away all our sins? Some Catholic writers and preachers downplay the emphasis on the doctrine of Purgatory (perhaps as a diluted attempt to be ecumenical). Yet, ironically, the doctrine of Purgatory itself is becoming accepted by

more and more non-Catholic theologians, especially in Germany, Denmark, and England. These are returning to the concept of Purgatory as a "post-death purification," a teaching held by the Jews from the time of the Captivity, six centuries before Christ. These non-Catholic theologians are also coming to approve intercessory prayer for the dead, commonly practiced a century before Christ (II Maccabees 12:43-46), as well as commonly accepted by Jesus' fellow Jews in His day, as Josephus wrote in 70 A.D. (The "Kaddish," or Jewish prayer for the dead, used from the first century, appeared to be based on Malachi 4:3 and Psalm 49:14-15. Perhaps it was in that context that St. Paul prayed for the deceased Onesiphorus [II Tim. 1:16-18]).

In a cemetery in Ohio there is a tombstone with a classical epitaph that reads: "Too Bad for Heaven, Too Good for Hell; Where he went I cannot tell." In a facetious way, that simple epitaph provides a framework for the answer to the Purgatory question. "Too Bad for Heaven," is another way of saying what Scripture says in Revelation 21:27, namely, that nothing defiled can enter Heaven. The phrase "Too Good for Hell" reaffirms the assertion of I John 5:16-17 that, "all wrongdoing is sin, and yet not all sin leads to (spiritual) death."

Such non-damning sins on one's soul, unrepented of at the time of death, need to be "purged" by some purgatorial cleansing after death. Any soul thus "defiled" must become "undefiled" to enter Heaven, as required by Revelation 21:27. For instance, a dying person who does not totally and lovingly accept death-bed suffering and the consequent death as God's will, would have some degree of "defilement" because of that non-conformity with God's will. That sin or fault would have to be purged before that soul could enter the awesome presence of the all-holy Godhead. Also, deep-seated habits or thought patterns reflecting insensitivity to sin, like impatience, habits of gossip, resentment, etc., need to be purified. Thus, Purgatory is a school of relearning, in which souls are fully trained in the ways of God that they neglected to learn during life. And, incidental to this spiritual training, there is suffering, for "suffering is a part of training" (Heb. 12:7). There are many hints also in the Old Testament about this "escape" or "release" of the dead from some kind of bondage. To quote only a few: "From the sovereign Lord comes escape (release) from Sheol—the place of the dead (Ps. 68:20). Psalm 56:13 says: "You have delivered (released) my soul from Sheol (the abode of the dead)...that I may walk before God in the light of life." This thought is reasserted in 1 Samuel 2:6, in a quote from Hanna's song: "The Lord brings the soul down to Sheol, the abode of the dead, and brings it up" (releases it). Yet, no release is required for those who die in true holiness: "Those who walk uprightly enter into peace; they find rest as they lie in death" (Is. 57:2). **(This article will continue in next week's bulletin).**

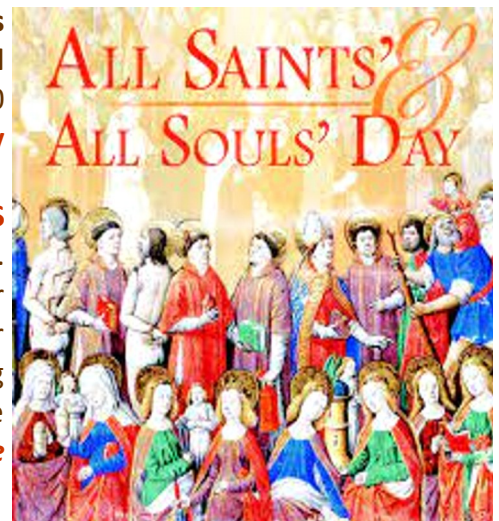
ALL SAINTS / ALL SOULS

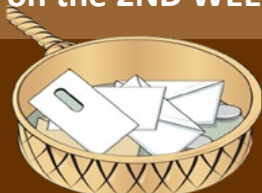


We will celebrate a **NOVENA OF MASSES**

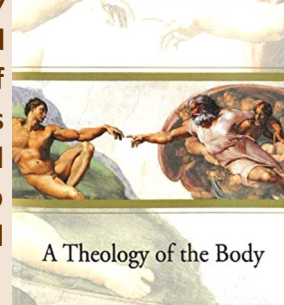

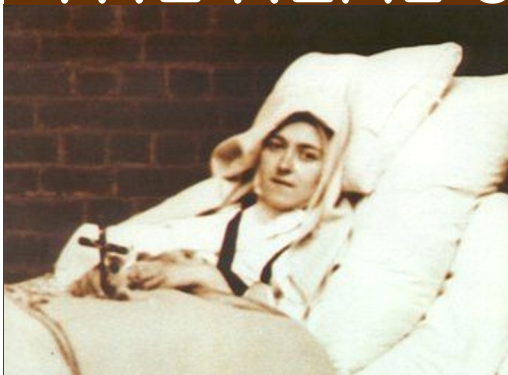


LOVING GOD AND NEIGHBOR

As we near the end of the liturgical year, we are listening to Gospel readings from the final stage of Jesus' ministry—His teaching in Jerusalem. This Sunday, Jesus is in conversation with one of the scribes of the temple. In a rare occurrence, Jesus and the scribe agree on the two greatest commandments—to "love God with all your being and to love your neighbor as yourself." In today's selection from Deuteronomy, Moses gives this teaching to the Israelites as the core of their life of faith and prayer, and Psalm 18 echoes this prayer with the words, "I love you, O LORD, my strength" (Psalm 18:2). Jews and Christians agree that our greatest responsibility is to love the one and only God, and that we cannot claim to love God without loving our neighbor as ourselves.

THE REAL ST. THERESE

A continuing bulletin feature, excerpted
from *The Passion of St. Therese of Lisieux*

**"I am not dying; I am entering life."
St. Therese (1873—1897)**

St. Therese and the Early Symptoms of Her Disease: Let us examine the documents which mention explicitly Therese's health during the three-year period. From 1894 to 1897. The climate of Lisieux, and in particular that of the Carmel, situated on the banks of the Orbiquet River, was hardly suitable for a young adolescent who had a rather weak throat, was subject to winter colds, and who had suffered earlier from "difficulty in breathing." To an unfavorable geographical position must be added the very strict regime of the Carmelite life at the end of the 19th century: the continual cold that made Therese suffer, "even to the point of dying from it," as well as the poor food, the prolonged fasts, and her lack of sleep—all conditions not helpful to the physical growth of a young girl between fifteen and twenty. Nevertheless, during the severe "flu epidemic" of the winter of 1891-1892, which claimed the lives of three sisters in the community,

Therese—in the strength of her seventeen years—was almost the only one left on her feet to carry out the most arduous tasks.

It was only in June 1894, when Therese was twenty-one and a half, that we have the first evidence that she was given medical treatment. It is possible that she had been sick before this date, as many complaints can pass unnoticed by others. "She had a weak throat and often suffered from it," Mother Agnes noted in 1909. "At Carmel they are waiting to see **Dr. Francis La Neele** (Therese's cousin Jeanne's husband) to ask his opinion about Therese's continual sore throat, huskiness, and chest problems. They would like Francis to examine her, but that could be rather difficult because of Dr. de Corniere..." These lines of her cousin Marie Guerin, written to her sister, Jeanne, on June 28, 1894, introduce us to the two doctors who cared for Therese during her last illness. Dr. de Corniere, who was the Carmel's official physician, was fifty-six and had given his services free to the nuns since 1886. He was a friend of Mother Marie de Gonzague and the Guerin family and had known Therese for a long time. He would hardly have been in favor of her entering the monastery. It is easily understandable that, when Dr. La Neele, thirty-six, came to the parlor to visit his cousins by marriage, the temptation was great to ask him to look at Therese—since her sister, Mother Agnes, was prioress—to ask him to look at Therese. But the Martin sisters did not want to provoke any "awkward situations."

In June of 1894, Celine, who was soon to join her sisters in Carmel, was again concerned: "Above all, take good care of yourself," she wrote to Therese, "it is a moral obligation." The next day she received a somewhat ambiguous reply back from Therese: **"But above all, do not be alarmed, I am not ill; as a matter of fact, I have iron-clad health, though the good God can break iron like clay."** Why this last phrase? Did Therese have a premonition of an early death? Celine must have pondered on the meaning of these sibylline words: **"Jesus will take one of us,"** which she had read a few lines before. Mother Agnes in her turn told Celine: "Sister Therese of the Child Jesus is no worse, but she is still subject to sore throats which flare up in the morning, and again about 8:30 p.m., when her voice becomes husky. We are doing our best to care for her." Celine was sent to help in the infirmary shortly after she entered Carmel on September 14, 1894. According to her own account, she cauterized Therese's throat with silver nitrate.

In October, Marie Guerin expressed the concern of the family, and especially of her father, Isadore Guerin, who was a pharmacist, in writing about Therese: "I hope my little Therese takes care of herself. Yesterday I found her voice noticeably changed. I have spoken to Francis about her. It is absolutely necessary for her to look after herself properly. At present, it is nothing serious, but it could become so at any time and then there would no longer be any cure to help her. She can very well get better now, if she takes constant care of herself. She needs, above all, frequent gargles. My little Therese must obey the doctor's instructions. Francis specializes in these diseases. He cured Mdme. Feroulle of a very serious complaint, and he will also cure my little Therese. PS... Papa insists that Therese be well cared for. When I spoke to him of her, he seemed worried."

The year 1895 seemed to bring an improvement, as Therese's health is not mentioned in the documents. However, there is another significant indication in something said to Sister Therese about St. Augustine. Therese recalled it in these words: **"I am going to die soon."** When Sister Therese said that, she was enjoying perfect health! According to this witness, Therese said that she was going to die **"not in a few months, but in two or three years."** But we do not know if her health was as "perfect" as it outwardly appeared.

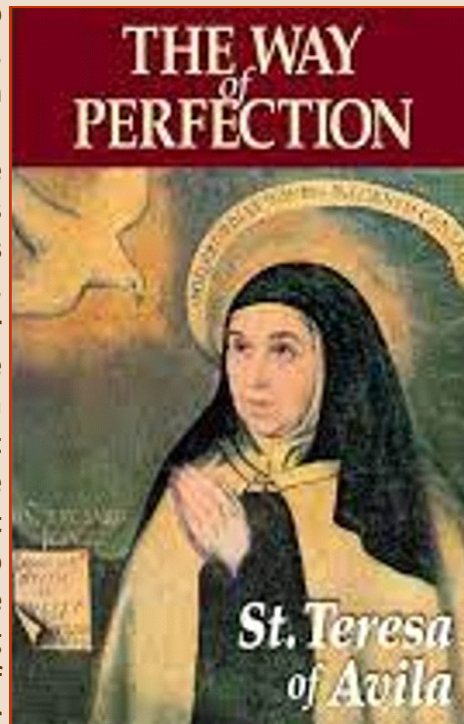
