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## Grant Union Creates Online and Hybrid Program

Grant Union Jr/Sr High School's Online Hybrid and Fully Online Program is a flexible, high-quality learning option for students in grades 6 through 12. With 72 students enrolled in the hybrid program, 1 hybrid student at Humbolt, and an additional 4 fully online students; this program supports a diverse range of student needs, allowing students to progress at their own pace with the support of experienced teachers and real-world, project-based learning. This program is part of the Individual Success Plan implemented by the school district for all students.

The program includes four dedicated teachers of record: Elijah Humbird, Drew Lusco, Sonna Smith, and Cindy Dougharity-Spencer. These educators create quarterly projects required in all core courses to promote academic rigor and enhance learning. The focus on project-based assessments helps ensure students can apply what they learn in practical settings, preparing them for both post-secondary education and the workforce. With the completion of the first quarter's projects, student progress is on track, and the feedback has been positive, indicating strong learning outcomes and high engagement.

Students enrolled in the Online Hybrid Program have access to various learning environments that cater to individual preferences and needs. They can work from the online classroom, study in the Student

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Commons, or, with permission, complete their assignments from home. The online classroom is always available for those seeking in-person assistance, allowing for a blend of independent and supported study. Heather Rookstool has been a great support to many students, providing a comfortable, yet structured environment for learning in The Commons area, and tutoring them when needed.

One of the program's key strengths is the ability to adapt to students' interests and future goals. The Career Coordinator, Tonia Seebart, collaborates closely with the students and me to make sure students are enrolled in classes that align with their future goals and fulfill graduation requirements. Hybrid students have the opportunity to attend in-person classes tailored to their career aspirations, while also opting for online classes to meet various needs, such as flexible scheduling, credit recovery, accelerated learning, or earning college credit. The curriculum includes all core subjects and offers an array of specialized courses, such as Spanish (levels 1-3), Forestry and Wildlife Management, Computer Programming, Culinary Arts, Certified Nursing Assistant, Graphic Design and Illustration, and Introduction to Veterinary Studies. Science labs provide engaging virtual experiences, giving students hands-on learning opportunities in a digital format.

The program aims to help online students enrich their high school experience and build a sense of community. These include access to extracurricular activities, lunch and study groups, and educational field trips.

As Grant Union Jr/Sr High School's Online Hybrid and Fully Online Program continues to grow, we are committed to providing a rigorous, supportive, and flexible learning environment for students at all levels.


## Alumni Focus on Roger & Meredith Ediger

Roger and Meredith both grew up in John Day, walking to school at the John Day Grade School. Roger attended first through eighth grades at the John Day Grade School (currently the Painted Sky Center for the Arts). By the time Meredith started school, first through fourth grades were held in the Annex (current location of Kam Wah Chung), while fifth through eighth grade classes met in the Grade School. They shared stories of favorite teachers, Mr. Kodesh ("Never end a sentence with a preposition!") and Mrs. Pocock ("Who can forget Mrs. Pocock?"). When there was a fire in the Annex, the students continued school in Kearns Hall at the Grant County Fairgrounds while the building was repaired.

In ninth grade, students moved to Grant Union High School and most continued to walk to school. "I would catch the bus on the corner when I could," Meredith said. Roger and Meredith began dating during his junior year and her freshman year. She giggled as she recalled fixing a sewing mistake because she had been distracted by Roger walking past the classroom. "Take it out," was the quiet correction from Mrs. Benson, the Home Ec teacher. They also shared memories of Mr. Swenson, who taught typing, bookkeeping, and coached football; Mrs. Allison, Physical Education teacher; and Mr. Valliant, Science and Chemistry teacher. Roger credits Mr. Baucum as the one who inspired him to be a teacher, although he did not realize that until several years later.

Being a student was very different in the 60s. The Edigers both remember freshman initiation, which included hiking up to clean and weed around the letter G on the hillside above the school, white-washing the letter, and using motor oil on the ground to inhibit weed growth. Meredith remembers there was never a lack of social engagements, and they had "all kinds of dances," including the traditional Homecoming and Prom, but also a Sadie Hawkins dance and several others. Roger adds, "The Elks Club sponsored dances every other week, and there were always enough chaperones to keep eyes on everybody."

Roger graduated in 1962 and spent his time working on his grandparents' ranch and at Glen Lee's sawmill, although he enjoyed hunting and fishing in his spare time. He decided to pursue higher education and attended Blue Mountain Community College for a year before Meredith's graduation in 1964. The pair attended Eastern Oregon College together, marrying in 1967 and





graduating in 1968; he with a degree in Biology and a minor in Chemistry, she with a degree in Elementary Education. Roger planned to continue into Veterinary Medicine but the Veterinary program was difficult to get into. His mother encouraged him to pursue a career in education. They moved to North Dakota to attend graduate school, but soon returned home to Oregon, and he completed his master's degree at Eastern Oregon College. Roger continued to work on the ranch until a call from Mr. Nodine in 1972 offered him the opportunity to teach junior high science. After 12 years at John Day Junior High, Roger taught for 18 years at Grant Union High School.

Roger enjoyed giving the students hands-on science experiences by having the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife in the classroom frequently and taking field trips to the Malheur National Wildlife Refuge, Strawberry Lake and counting salmon on the Middle Fork of the John Day River. He was known to say, "Kids do not care how much you know until they begin to realize how much you care." He received several awards in education, including the 1983 EOSC Ralph Badgley Outstanding Science Teacher, 1996 NW Exposition Sigma XI Outstanding Research Teacher of the Year, and 1999 Oregon Small School Association Teacher of the Year.

Roger worked with fellow teachers Richard Neafie and Matt Jones to create a Science Club for the students, which included lunch time meetings and fund-raising money from a hoop shoot and dances to support many different field trips. A favorite was taking students to Lava Beds National Monument in California. "The students would be given hardhats, lights, and a small amount of instruction from a park ranger, and we would turn them loose to explore." Other trips included the Oregon Coast, Seattle, and rafting on the Deschutes.

Roger remembers when the school decided to take the large metal GU out of the front yard, so he worked with welder Boyd Britton and student Jamie Brown, who did the artwork, to redesign and mount the letters on the front of the school with the addition of "Home of the Prospectors," which remains to this day.

Teaching was not Roger's only full-time job. Even as a teacher he continued working on the family ranch. He would head to the ranch in the morning to "feed cattle and move whatever needed moving" before getting to school. He would then return to the ranch after school to care for his uncle and complete the chores before joining his own family for supper. Roger and Meredith raised three kids, who all graduated from Grant Union High School, and the couple moved to the ranch full-time in 1995. Meredith retired after 17 years with the Circuit Court and Roger joined her in 2002, after 30 years with Grant School District 3. Their biggest reward from teaching is having students who drop by to visit or receiving thank you cards and letters to share what is going on in their lives. As Roger always dismissed his students, "Stay safe and clean!"

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


# The History of Grant Union High School


Grant Union High School was created in the fall of 1935, combining the John Day, Canyon City, Seneca, Marysville, Silvies, Izee, Belshaw, and Logdell school districts. Combining the school districts would make transportation more difficult but it allowed the new, larger district to qualify for government grant funds to build a high school building halfway between John Day and Canyon City. Here is an excerpt from the Grant Union High School 1937 yearbook. The full article, written by A.H. Wright, will be available on the district website at grantschooldistrict.org or in person at the District Office, located at 401 N. Canyon City Blvd in Canyon City.

The question of consolidating the schools of Canyon City and John Day has been a subject of discussion for a great many years. A number of people have had the idea that a better school system could be maintained at a cheaper cost of having one school for the two towns rather than maintaining separate systems only two miles apart.

However, during the fall of 1935, Mr. Frank Oliver in a discussion with some of the interested people in Seneca received the impression that it would soon be necessary for Seneca to provide High School facilities for their students and they were of the impression that it would be best to form a Union High School district consisting of Seneca, Canyon City, and John Day, which would make the cost lighter on all concerned.

Accordingly, the matter was discussed by Mr. Oliver with E.P. Hicks of the Canyon City School Board, Mr. Theron Knox of the John Day Chamber of Commerce and Carl Ewing, President of the John Day Lions Club. It was thought that it would be a good idea to have a joint meeting of the various school boards in John Day or Canyon City to discuss the question. A meeting was held sometime during the month of August at the Scout Hall in John Day, Oregon, and the school boards of Seneca, Canyon City and John Day were requested to look into the matter with the idea of securing Government aid under P.W.A. Loan and Grant.
