Junior Meeting

Welcome to the Junior Meeting!

The purpose of this meeting is to guide you through the steps of graduating and preparing for life after high school.

I plan to cover several topics in this presentation that will help you navigate the final year of high school.

I will also share resources to help guide you along as you transition to life after high school.

Graduation Check & Transcripts

- Are you in the classes you need to graduate?
- Did you repeat any classes? Make up failed classes?
- Early Graduation?
 - Current policy permits students who have completed all graduation requirements and meet the outlined requirements in the early graduation policy to graduate after seven semesters December of senior year.
 - Students who choose to graduate early must provide proof of postsecondary enrollment or have an approved job.
 - Interested students should see Rachel Harris.

Graduation Requirements

- 28 credits needed to graduate
- 4 credits of Language Arts (ELA)
- 3 credits of Science: Biology and 2 more
- 4 credits of Math: Algebra, Geometry, and 2 more
- 3 credits of Social Studies:

.5 Government, .5 Economics, World History, US History

• 1 credit of Physical Education:

.5 PE; .5 Lifetime Wellness

• 8 electives: CTE classes, Fine Arts, Spanish I and II

How do you figure out your Quality Point (4.0 Scale) GPA?

- Each grade you receive in all credit bearing courses is worth a point value:
 - An "A" is worth 4 points
 - A "B' is worth 3 points
 - A "C" is worth 2 points
 - A "D" is worth 1 point
 - An "F" is worth o points
- The point values are averaged together to determine your GPA

Preparing For The Next Step

A few tips.....

- Plan ahead to avoid being overwhelmed.
- Stay on top of your grades.
- Pay close attention to deadlines.
- Research the schools you are interested in.
- Start planning for tomorrow TODAY.
- Juniors should have the ACT score and the GPA they want by the beginning of their senior year.

Applying to Colleges

- Pick 3 to 5 schools that interest you.
- Get an application for admission from the school's website or office of admissions. Most applications are online.
- Complete and return the application with all necessary materials that must go with it.
- Request a copy of your official transcript. Have your transcript sent to the school.
- Get a housing application if you plan to live on campus.
- Find out what test (ACT or SAT) is required and the deadlines for submitting your official score report.
- If you have questions ask your parents, guidance counselor, or an admissions director.

- These visits must be pre-approved by the principal.
- Juniors can schedule up to 2 college campus visits.
- A request must be submitted <u>three days in advance</u> if you want school leave. Request forms can be found in the counseling office.
- Try to visit college when they are in session or during Open House or Preview Nights.
- On weekends, all you will see are empty buildings!

College Visits

Dual Enrollment

- Dual Enrollment programs allow students to enroll in classes that earn them college credit and count towards their high school diploma.
- Through the Tennessee Dual Enrollment Grant, qualifying students may receive \$300 per semester towards the cost of a dual enrollment course.
- Dual enrollment decreases the amount of time and money needed to attain a postsecondary degree.

ACT Information Register for the ACT at <u>www.actstudent.org</u>
Cost \$63 this year

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- Offered 6 times each year, nationally on Saturdays no limit on how many times you can take the ACT
- Score range from o to 36
- Some schools superscore
- Online registration is required.
- Check with your selected schools as to what tests are required for admission.
- If you plan to re-take the ACT, register ASAP

ACT Superscored

WSCC, for example, does not "Superscore," however, you may "mix and match" your scores and take your highest subtest score from any of your ACT tests.

*For WSCC, need a 18 in English and 19 in Math

 - ACT Online Prep is available for FREE to all GHS students. ALL students should have an account now!

ACT Preparation

- Some colleges require a counselor or teacher letter of recommendation.
- Letters of Recommendation require 2 weeks notice to counselor.
- Student must provide a completed a Brag Sheet to the counselor.

Letter of Recommendation

- If you hope to play college sports, you must meet NCAA academic eligibility requirements.
- Visit <u>www.ncaa.org</u> for more information and up-todate guidelines.
- NCAA will need an official copy of your transcript. To send a copy of your transcript to NCAA, see Mrs. Rachel Harris.

NCAA Guidelines

- Now is the time to talk to your parents about financing your college education.
 - GHS will host a Financial Aid Night in Fall 2022.
 - Typically in late October or early November
- Most colleges require the FAFSA. This is a <u>FREE</u> Application for Federal Student Aid.
- Apply online for the FAFSA at <u>www.fafsa.edu.gov</u>.
- Apply online for the FAFSA in the fall of your senior year.
