TK and Kindergarten

Kindergarten students are currently learning the ch, sh, and th digraphs. For each sound, they are taught a "secret" to help them remember how the sound is made. They recently completed a unit on farms and have begun learning about Native Americans. Families are encouraged to ask students about what they are learning in class. Each afternoon, kindergarten participates in Blue Book activities. One of the students' favorite activities is learning nursery rhymes. Students create actions to match the rhymes and practice them throughout the week. This week, they are learning "Hey Diddle Diddle."

TK students have just completed their plant unit and will begin an exciting new unit on habitats. This unit includes many hands-on activities, art projects, and an increased focus on letter sounds. Students continue learning the letters in their names and practice writing their names while saying each letter aloud. TK students are learning the sounds and letter formation for M, T, D, and A, and are also working on matching pictures or objects with the same beginning sounds.

In math, kindergarten students continue practicing solving story problems involving addition and subtraction with numbers 1–10. TK students are focusing on identifying and working with the numbers 6, 7, and 8.

Math has seen a lot of progress this week in strengthening their skills. 5th graders have practiced division with decimals in the divisor and dividend and 6th graders have practiced finding the percent of a quantity and finding the number from a percent.

We began Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream this week with a lesson on the life of Shakespeare. We then started to read through the play while talking about the difference between old English and modern English. Students are also learning how to read a printed script and what the stage directions mean. It is quite entertaining to hear 5th and 6th graders try to speak in iambic pentameter!


Please make sure that your student continues to read at home! 5 AR points per month are required for students to attend Lion Paw events on First Friday.




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Special Education-Title1/LAP- Social Emotional Learning (SEL): Mrs. Duren

During the month of January we have challenged your students to increase the art of noticing while focusing our attention on the character trait of Empathy. For our educational purposes, Empathy has been defined as having the ability to understand and connect to the feelings of another. In other words, Empathy is learning the importance of knowing what it's like to "walk in another person's shoes." At the heart of being a student of character is the core belief that every person should be kind and nice - and that a key aspect of being kind and nice is noticing, understanding, and caring about how other people feel. Just ask any 5 year old to describe what to do to be a student of character, or to excel at any character trait we present to them, and the universal answer they instinctively give, even before any lessons are given, always includes these descriptors - being kind and nice.



Noticing is an important component of Empathy because not only does it make one aware of others around them and how they are presenting themselves and their emotions, but it also builds self-awareness as well as strengthens one's connections with others. Noticing can inspire one's learning and creativity along the way while challenging people to step out of their comfort zone to encourage and help others, leading ultimately to personal growth and more effective problem-solving. So in case you find your student(s) paying more attention to how you look or act ... or asking you more questions than normal about how you feel or what you think, realize this may be their attempt to be "present" as an effort to increase their efforts at noticing within their own world, and perhaps showing a bit of empathy along the way as well.



As we present the importance of the character trait of Empathy this month, we also have the opportunity to remember Martin Luther King Jr, and all the ways he was able to help our country. With that said, I want to leave us all thinking about this quote from him which further emphasizes the importance of having Empathy in our lives: “It takes empathy, patience, and compassion to overcome anger, hatred, and resentment.” So let's take a lesson from our youngest learners, and remember the importance of being kind and nice - and to always care about others and what they are going through and feeling.
