Item Title: Authorization to Engage into MOU with OSEA for Program

Assistant-Severe Needs Salary

Presenter: Dr. Fritz, Superintendent

Background Information Related to this Issue:

On February 19, the School Board approved the job description for a *Program Assistant – Severe Needs* position. Subsequent to that approval, district staff have engaged with OSEA to discuss the rate of pay for the position. The parties have reached agreement related to the pay level.

The agreed upon rate of pay is:

The parties have tentatively agreed that this schedule accurately reflects fair compensation for the work described in the job description.

Financial Impact:

This rate of pay is approximately \$4/hour higher than a regular Program Assistant position and \$3 per hour higher than for a Highly Qualified Program Assistant position. These new positions are needed to meet student needs, and providing this level of service, given student needs is mandatory under IDEA and civil rights laws. Some of this cost will be offset by the avoided cost of serving students in Knappa rather than in the county consortium. The additional cost will be eligible for high cost disability funding, which is likely to be better supported in this legislative term and shall be reimbursable (in part) during the 2025-26 fiscal year (the claim is due in March 2026).

Recommended Action:

It is the recommendation of the Superintendent that the Board authorize the superintendent to engage into a Memorandum of Understanding with OSEA Chapter 52 reflecting the wage rates for this position noted above.
