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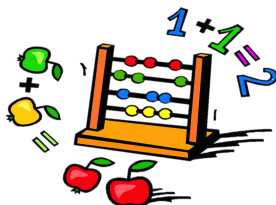
Kindergarten

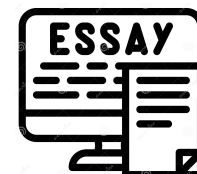

Perseverance and Thanksgiving and Thankfulness

This month our students are learning about the character trait of **Perseverance**, which we have defined as being the ability to work through situations even when there are obstacles or challenges in the way. We have focused on understanding the value or benefits in persevering when facing something that appears challenging, as opposed to giving up or not trying at all. We have also been applying this to not only school situations, but also toward challenges we may face in our home or community as well. We have taken the opportunity to look back in history at examples where people have needed to demonstrate perseverance.



This is not a new concept in our country's history, as demonstrated at our nation's first Thanksgiving Feast. We have studied that the Pilgrims faced many challenges when traveling and starting their new lives in, what to them, appeared to be a strange new country. In fact, they were facing extreme challenges related to providing the basic needs to survive that first winter in America, and must have felt many uncomfortable feelings as they came face to face with the Native Americans who already lived here, and appeared very different in their style of dress, the ways they communicated, and their ways of doing everyday tasks. Meanwhile, the Native Americans were facing the challenge of strangers, who looked and sounded so different from themselves, moving onto their land, using their resources, and bringing unknown resources to their land. This must have been very scary for them. This could have been a disastrous moment in our country's history had either group of individuals chosen to not

persevere despite the challenges, or had they chosen to not reach out in an attempt to support, encourage and learn about each other. However, instead, the first Thanksgiving was created and enjoyed by all, combining resources from both cultures and creating what is now one of our country's most celebrated holidays.

Evaline likewise has, as a tradition, celebrated Thanksgiving for years as a school, as depicted in the following community write up about the Feast written 38 years ago, in 1983, when the school was 100 years old.

"Each year Evaline students reenact the first Thanksgiving. The students with help from their parents take two days preparing the feast. We have turkey, mashed potatoes, gravy, vegetable, cornbread, pumpkin dessert, and hand turned ice cream. Half the students were pilgrims and the other half were Indians. We wore hats so everyone could tell if we were a pilgrim or an Indian. When the meal was ready we prayed and then we ate." by: Eric Anderson, Deanna Combs, Bill Kimble and Joe Trainer.



Just like our forefathers before us at our country's first Thanksgiving, Evaline has not been immune to facing their own challenges or conflicts either. However, like the pilgrims before us, we have had to dig deep and face them head on in order for our school district to not just survive, but to continue to flourish. When our school building burned down our community provided the resources to keep our children in school and to build a new school building. When we struggled with paying our teachers one year, our community stepped in to cover wages and to help out as needed. In recent years, when we needed a helping

hand to move out and back into our school during our remodel in 2012 our community lent a helping hand, and during the past 2 years, when our school faced the unprecedented challenges associated with the pandemic the community rallied to encourage and support our students and teachers so that learning could continue. These are just a few examples of the persevering spirit of our Evaline community - for which we at our school are very thankful and aware of how blessed we truly are. As we sit down to continue our time honored tradition and enjoy our modified "Feast" in our classrooms this year, and look at our holiday themed crafts we have made and share what we are thankful for with our classmates, we will also be remembering how blessed we truly are for being part of the larger Evaline community, and thankful for all that we have and all that we can look forward to in the future.
