Bus safety is important both on the bus and while waiting for the bus to pick up your child.

SAFETY GUIDELINES FOR PARENTS/GUARDIANS OF STUDENTS USING SCHOOL BUSES

The following guidelines outline parent/guardian responsibilities relative to families using District school buses and transportation services.

1. Riding the school bus is a privilege. This privilege may be temporarily suspended or permanently revoked if a student's misconduct violates School Bus Conduct Rules, jeopardizes the safe operations of the school bus or the safety of the children riding this bus. See Board policies EEA and JICC, and District regulations JICC-R.

2. Parents/guardians are responsible for the safety of their children from the time they leave home in the morning until the time they board the school bus; and at the end of the school day from the time the school bus departs the loading/unloading area and the children reach home. Once the child enters the school bus, the authority lies with the bus driver and the school.

3. Students should leave home early enough so that they arrive at the designated school bus stop point five (5) minutes before the scheduled arrival time of the school bus.

4. Parents/guardians should be aware of their responsibility not only for their child's behavior while on the school bus, but also their responsibility for damage caused by their child(ren) to the property of others, including the school bus. When a child walks to and from the bus stop, and while he/she waits at the school bus stop, and when he/she walks home from the school bus stop at the end of the school day, he/she must show consideration and respect for the property of those citizens whose homes and places of business are located along these routes.

5. Parents/guardians, together with the child, should develop a route to and from the school bus stop, or school, which minimizes the exposure of the child to vehicular traffic. Shortcuts through isolated fields and woods or across streams or railroad tracks can often be dangerous. Entering of abandoned houses or deserted buildings by children on their way to or from school should not be condoned. The route should be direct and uninterrupted.

6. Parents/guardians should walk with younger children to and from the school bus stop, using this opportunity to teach the child(ren) proper pedestrian practice. If the parents/guardians cannot accompany their child(ren), arrangements should be made, if possible, for older children (brother, sister, or neighbor) to escort the younger children to and from the school bus stop or school.

7. Parents/guardians should develop in their child(ren) an awareness of the molestation (personal harassment) problem. Encourage children not to accept candy, soft drinks, money, toys or rides from strangers or to associate with anyone they do not know. If your child is confronted with these problems on his/her way to or from school, he/she should tell you or his/her teacher as soon as possible. This is a situation that should be referred to the police.

8. Parents/guardians should realize that weather determines how a child is to be dressed. Encourage your child to wear the type of clothing that will not only keep him/her warm and enable him/her to see where he/she is going, but also permit him/her to be seen. If the child(ren) cannot be seen by the drivers of vehicles, they are in danger. For example, white clothing is difficult to see in snow, but makes one clearly visible at night. If the weather is inclement, the child should be dressed for the occasion and leave a few minutes earlier than his/her normal starting time in order to reach the school bus stop or school safely and on time. 9. Inclement weather announcements regarding the closing of schools or delayed opening begin at approximately 6:00 a.m.

During severe weather conditions, pertinent information concerning the transportation program will be announced on the radio. 10. The application of common sense is the best method of determining the role of the parents/guardians regarding the safety of children traveling to and from school, either as a passenger on a school bus or as a pedestrian.

MHS Math Department

The MHS Math Team hit the ground running this fall with new Savvas (formerly Pearson) math textbooks and online curriculum support. We received training over the summer to help us implement the curriculum, and will receive a second training during the school year. We have had a positive response from students so far. At the HS level, Ms. Halm and Mr. Robertson like that students have the option to consult their hard copy textbook or access the homework problems and supporting examples online, based on their preference. There is also a cool interactive feature called Mathematical Modeling in 3 Acts which helps students think through mathematical ideas with various real-life scenarios.

At the MS level, Ms. Wilson and Mrs. Kraus like how lessons in the new textbooks start with a **"Solve & Discuss It"** problem that gives students the opportunity to talk out ideas and explore solutions before being taught specific skills. Students are engaged and good discussions are taking place!

The art teacher gave each student half of a sheet of paper. Then she asked the students to color one fourth of their pieces of paper. What part of the original sheet did the students color? Solve this problem any way you choose.



If you have a 6th grader ask about the solution they came up with for this one:

In 8th grade math, students had a lively discussion about the "Solve & Discuss It" problem below and then debated over which floor plan they liked best! A 6 foot by 6-foot floor plan was the winner!




BUILDING TRADES


Lin-Wood Food Service News

Thanks to a waiver from the USDA and National School Lunch Program (NSLP), Lin-Wood is once again able to serve free breakfast and free lunch to all students in K-12 for the 2021-22 school year. This means that each student can have the daily breakfast or lunch meal that is on the school lunch menu for that day at no charge.

Here's some additional information on the Lin-Wood Food Service:

- 1. All breakfast and lunch meals include a milk option. It is part of the free meal.
- 2. Milk purchased separately must be paid for on student accounts.
- 3. A la carte items, including milk purchased separately, must be paid for on student accounts. No charging is allowed for a la carte items.
- 4. If a student wants an additional meal during lunch, it will be charged to their lunch account, like an ala carte purchase.
- 5. Funds can be added to student accounts in different ways. If cash is brought in, please identify your student's name and grade on the envelope so it gets applied to the proper account.
- 6. The preferred methods of adding funds to student accounts are prepayment by check or using the online payment portal through MySchoolBucks. (see additional information in this newsletter)



Working with our Community to Keep Children Safe

Mandatory Reporting & DCYF

According to New Hampshire law (RSA 169-C:29-31) <u>any</u> person who has "reason to suspect" that a child has been abused or neglected *must report* that suspicion to the Division of Children, Youth and Families of the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services (DCYF). Under the law, these reports are expected to be made immediately.

Quick Facts

- It is not the reporters role to investigate.
- 2. Proof of abuse and neglect is not required to make a report.
- 3. Sometimes, people are unsure if a situation is abusive. Reporters in doubt are still encouraged to call.
- 4. In some cases, failure to report could result in criminal prosecution.
- Results made in good faith entitle the reporter to both civil and criminal immunity.

Some professionals may have further requirements and ethical codes regarding mandatory reporting. In schools this includes; teachers, school officials, nurses, social workers, psychologists, and counselors. In our community this can also include medical doctors, hospital staff, childcare workers, foster care workers, therapists, faith leaders, and law enforcement officials.

It is important to remember that these laws were developed to support and protect children. We take our role in keeping the children in our community safe and hope that you do as well.

If a child tells you that he or she has been hurt or you are concerned that a child may be the victim of any type of abuse or neglect, call the Division for Children, Youth and Families (DCYF) Central Intake Unit at: Telephone: (800) 894-5533 (in-state) or (603) 271-6562 (out of state) 24 hours a day, including weekends and holidays. For immediate emergencies, please call 911.

2021-2022 STUDENT DRIVERS

If your student will become licensed for this upcoming year, please review the following information:

- Student Automobile Use Policy Any licensed student may be permitted to bring their vehicle onto campus. Student transport of minor siblings must be authorized by parent/guardian and on file with the office for siblings to leave school grounds. Additionally, students must follow the handbook policy regulations stated below regarding their vehicles on campus:
 - Student use of an automobile on school grounds is a privilege. Careless driving is <u>prohibited</u> and is subject to disciplinary actions. Anyone guilty of careless driving, may be reported to the police. Improper use of a motor vehicle on school grounds <u>can</u> result in suspension from school.
 - Driving a motor vehicle from school grounds during the school day without authorization will be considered improper use of a motor vehicle and will be considered grounds for suspension.
 - Parking at the school is a privilege granted by the school and the privilege <u>will be</u> withdrawn if it is abused. Prior to driving or parking on school grounds, students will be required to register motor vehicles in the main office. If a student leaves the school grounds in a motor vehicle without authorization, parents will be notified, and the student will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including suspension from school.
 - Automobiles *must* be parked in the designated parking area.
 - Students, including the driver, are not allowed in vehicles during school hours, except for arrival or departure. Drivers and their passengers must leave the vehicle as soon as they arrive at school and are not to be in it until they leave school again.
 - NOTE Any items displayed in or on a student's vehicle which violate normal codes of conduct may be subject to disciplinary actions, including student suspension and loss of parking privileges per policy GIC.
