## A letter from the Executive Director

I remember where I was when the program was "shut down" by Governor Wolf due to a virus called COVID-19. I thought this would go on for a couple of weeks. That was almost two years ago.

The journey has had its challenges, and in many areas, we had to find new beginnings of how to operate our 2-county program in order to support and provide programming to children and families. To describe it best, it was like trying to fly a plane while we were still building it.

Fast forward two years .... we are providing in-person programming and sometimes still needing to pivot to remote/virtual programming when a COVID-19 case touches us. Words like COVID, pivot, remote, team, victory sprayers, sanitizer, masks, quarantine, and isolation have taken on new meanings. Technology has been greatly impacted, and we now provide devices that can be used from home for both staff and families, as we use ZOOM and GoToMeeting platforms for meetings, home visits, lessons and trainings.

Through this pandemic we have learned that it truly takes a community to persevere when things seem bleak. We have learned to depend even more on each other; when one staff or parent needs lifting up, another is close by to offer support and encouragement.

Fortunately, our regulatory agencies and local Foundations have provided additional funding for us to meet the health challenges we face. We have purchased many more disinfecting, sanitizing, and personal protective supplies than "normal." Our Board and Policy Council have stepped up to the plate and continue to guide and direct us in a time where, for the most part, they are meeting virtually.

We have an incredible resource within our program and that is our staff who are heroes in their own regard. They face the challenges every single day by delivering items/food to families, providing in-person and remote services to children and families, getting 2+ year old children to wear a face mask, and providing safe environments for children and each other. Along this journey, we are paying particular attention to the well-being of our staff and provide support, wellness baskets, how to "build their bounce," and some monetary acknowledgements for their heroic efforts.












# Eligibility Statistics Early Head Start



## 2020-21 School Readiness Outcomes



In all age groups, gains were made in physical health & development, cognition & knowledge, approaches to learning, language & literacy, and social & emotional. For the birth-to-three population, the largest gain was in the physical health and development area with an 11% gain. In the three-to-five population, the largest gain was in the cognition & knowledge area with a 27% gain.



## 2020-21 Parent, Family and Community Engagement Outcomes



Parents participate in classroom and family play group activities. They are invited to develop a Family Partnership Agreement where they set goals for themselves as a family and work with staff to develop an Individual Plan for their child. Parents are invited to participate in curriculum activities where they receive training on their child's development, health, and education. Parents can serve on Policy Council, which makes decisions such as approving policies, hiring new staff, and approving program options.

This year's Parent, Family and Community Engagement Outcomes indicate that the area of Families as Advocates and Leaders had the highest gain at 23%.

- <u>State Program Review:</u> March 8, 2021: An exemplary outcome was achieved.
- <u>The 2020-21 Financial Audit:</u> completed August 2021; an exceptional outcome given with no findings or material weaknesses identified.
- <u>Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) Audit:</u> conducted the week of May 5, 2021 with minimal concerns.
