Applicants must be United States citizens, residents of U.S. jurisdictions, or foreign nationals who have resided in the United States or its territories for at least three years immediately preceding the application deadline. Each title below is linked to the web page for the institute or seminar. Professional development programs include the following format options:

#### 2022 SC Council on the Holocaust Summer Workshop: Foundations of Teaching the Holocaust. 💝 👒 🦈 🕽

• T Columbia, SC / July 19-23, 2022. This course is intended for K-12 teachers, and other education stakeholders, seeking increased knowledge of teaching and learning about the Holocaust as well as deepening pedagogical understanding of inquiry-based approaches in Holocaust education. During the course, participants will examine what actions were necessary on the part of individuals (ordinary citizens, military officers, teachers, clergy, and so on) to enact and maintain a system that killed millions of Jews and others. The workshop also examines South Carolina-related resources, and different teaching methodologies (i.e., oral testimonies, historical inquiry, literature, and primary sources). This course is useful for all teachers, most notably for those who are new to teaching the Holocaust and/or those who wish to have a firm understanding of both the context of the event and how to approach teaching it in the classroom. The key benefits of the course are...

- ★ Teachers can earn 3 graduate credit hours from the University of South Carolina for each course and the cost of each course for each teacher will be covered by the SCCH.
- ★ Teachers will receive hands-on training in content, pedagogy, and methodology.
- \* Additionally, participating teachers will also receive books and resources to use in their classroom.

#### 2022 SC Council on the Holocaust Summer Workshop: Americans and the Holocaust. 😓 🧠 🦈 🕽 🗣 🏆 🕫

**Columbia, SC / July 26-30, 2022**. This course design is inspired by the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum's traveling America and the Holocaust exhibit which will be on display at the Richland Library in Columbia, SC in June and July 2021. This course is intended for educators seeking an increased understanding of the American perspective of the Holocaust as it was happening in the period of 1933 - 1945. While the participants will engage in learning about the context of the Holocaust as a whole, the focus will be to address three central questions: What did Americans know about the Holocaust? How did America respond to the Holocaust? Why did America respond in the way that it did? This course is open to all K-12 teachers and educational stakeholders. While it is not necessary to have taken the Foundations of Teaching the Holocaust or other related coursework before, it is helpful for participants to have a good grounding in the context of the Holocaust when choosing to take this course. The key benefits of the course are. . .

- ★ Teachers can earn 3 graduate credit hours from the University of South Carolina for each course and the cost of each course for each teacher will be covered by the SCCH.

Immersed for 10 days in the Peruvian Amazon, teachers learn about this key global ecosystem while building their ability to engage students in scientific research, engineering design, cross-cultural connections, and stewardship projects. Skilled Peruvian guides lead natural history exploration – in small boats, along trails, and on one of the world's most extensive canopy walkways. Professional scientists engage educators in field research and citizen science. And villagers in remote communities demonstrate their ways of life, highlighting conservation practices with which they are aiming for long-term sustainability of the rainforest resources on which their livelihoods depend. Each participant will. . .

- participate in science projects and inquiry-based field studies on a 1/4-mile Rainforest Canopy Walkway in one of the most biologically diverse environments on the planet.
- spend a day in an Amazon village as you explore the complexities of sustainability and the role of education in creating a sustainable future for Amazon children.
- ★ work with fellow educators to explore strategies for using the Amazon as a vehicle for incorporating STEM education, inquiry-based learning, and sustainability science education into your classroom.

2022 NATIONAL WWII MUSEUM SUMMER TEACHER SEMINARS. D 😓 🧠 🐡 🗣 🖇  $\pi$  🛄. Workshop 1: July 10 - July 15, 2022 / Workshop 2: July 17 - July 22, 2022. The National WWII Museum's Summer Teacher Seminar is an immersive teacher professional development programming experience. Designed for middle school and high school teachers, these weeklong seminars offer thematic deep dives into a variety of topics on the history of World War II. Employing a rich array of curriculum built upon primary source materials, these seminars will aid teachers to find new and exciting ways to bring the war to life in the classroom. Each seminar will give teachers access to noted WWII scholars, as well as hands-on experiences and virtual resources they can incorporate into classroom instruction. Participants who complete the program will become part of the Museum's nationwide network of teachers dedicated to improving the guality of instruction on World War II. WHO CAN **PARTICIPATE?** The Summer Teacher Seminars are open to any teachers at an accredited public, charter, private, or parochial school who have at least two years of classroom teaching experience and who will be teaching during the 2021-2022 school year. Teachers of subjects other than social studies may apply, but should explain in their application how they plan to incorporate WWII themes into their curriculum. Media specialists, librarians, curriculum coordinators, and academic coaches are also eligible provided they spend at least half of their time providing direct instruction to students. Applications include information on teaching experience, two short written statements, and two letters of recommendation. All applications received within the submission window will receive fair assessment. The Museum seeks to recruit a diverse cohort of 30 teachers for each seminar. Teachers accepted to attend the Summer Teacher Seminars will be expected to give at least one teacher professional development workshop featuring the Museum's curriculum in the year following completion of the program. COST: There is no cost. Participants will receive free lodging, a travel stipend, seminar materials, and most meals free of charge. The workshop dates are. . .

- ★ A full-time preK-12th grade teacher who spends at least 50% of your time directly providing instruction to students;
- \* Returning to the classroom in the consecutive school year; and
- ★ Have at least three years' experience as a preK-12th grade teacher at the end of the school year.
  - Student and substitute teaching do not count towards the three-year requirement
  - As long as the applicant has three years' experience by the time of their fellowship, Fund for Teachers considers them eligible.

School support staff that do not provide instruction to students for at least 50% of their full-time position are not eligible. One-onone instructional time does not count toward the 50%-time requirement described above. Administrators, such as principals, may not apply, nor may they act as the partner applicant. Please contact Fund for Teachers if you have specific questions about your eligibility. <u>Individuals</u> may apply for up to <u>\$5,000</u> and <u>teams</u> may apply for up to <u>\$10,000</u> (while team members may be from different schools, districts or states, all members must meet the eligibility criteria). Upon award, Fellows will receive 90 percent of their grant, the remaining 10 percent to be reimbursed upon completion of post-fellowship requirements. Eligible teachers may submit one application per grant cycle. Fund for Teachers is interested in your ideas, only. Any indication of borrowed text will disqualify your application. Additionally, previously awarded proposals may not be resubmitted for consideration. Fellowships should begin after the last day of school in the spring and be completed by the first day of school in the fall, with all fellowship related expenditures made by **September 16, 2022**. Applicant coversheet and identifying information is removed prior to the selection process. Please refrain from using your name, your school or district names within your proposal. The entire application is completed online and will require digital signatures. As part of the application process an email will be sent from info@fundforteachers.org to your principal to verify your eligibility. **MELT PROGRAM SUMMER INSTITUTES 2022**.  $\pi$  The MELT Program was established in 1998 through a generous donation from the Cain Foundation. The goal of the program is to provide support and professional development for K-12 mathematics teachers in North Carolina <u>and other states</u>. The program currently emphasizes weeklong Summer Institutes and through-the-year follow-up activities. Summer Institutes, each of which is collaboratively developed and taught by a pair of highly qualified and experienced educators, provide teacher professional development on timely topics such as the preparation for meaningful implementation of the State Standards in Mathematics, the use of technology and other representational tools in the classroom, thoughtful and purposeful pedagogy, and analysis of teaching. Follow-up workshop activities include helping teachers implement problem-solving activities in their classrooms, collaboration among teachers and high school students in monthly contests, and the creation of exemplary classroom-based instructional and assessment activities. LIFTOFF 2022 SUMMER INSTITUTE: THE ARTEMIS GENERATION. 🐡 June 26 – July 5, 2022 / Houston, TX. Beginning in the summer of 1990, the NASA's Texas Space Grant Consortium initiated weeklong professional development training for teachers. This aerospace workshop, called LiftOff, emphasizes science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) learning experiences by incorporating a space science theme supported by NASA missions. Teacher participants are provided with information and experiences through speakers, hands-on activities and field investigations that promote space science and enrichment activities for themselves and others. A solar system is a star and all of the objects that travel around it - planets, moons, asteroids, comets, and meteoroids. NASA is conducting an unprecedented array of missions that will seek new knowledge and understanding of Earth, the solar system and the universe. Multiple NASA missions are studying our sun and the solar system, unraveling mysteries about their origin and evolution. By understanding variations of the sun in real-time, they can better characterize space weather, which can impact exploration and technology on Earth. So, what does the future at NASA have in store for us? Adding to its existing robotic fleet at the Red Planet with the InSight Mars lander set to study the planet's interior and the Mars 2020 rover will look for signs of past microbial life, gather samples for future return to Earth and investigate resources that could someday support astronauts. The James Webb Space Telescope will be the premier observatory of the next decade, studying every phase in the history of our Universe in infrared, while the Parker Solar Probe will "touch the sun," travelling closer to the surface than any spacecraft before. NASA's first asteroid sample return mission, OSIRIS-REx, arrives at the near-Earth asteroid Bennu in August 2018, and will return a sample for study in 2023. Launching no later than June 2018, the Transiting Exoplanet Survey Satellite (TESS) will search for planets outside our solar system by monitoring 200,000 bright, nearby stars. And a mission to Jupiter's ocean-bearing moon Europa is being planned for launch in the 2020s. Building on this growing scientific knowledge of our solar system, NASA is developing the most advanced rocket and spacecraft to extend human presence farther into space than we have ever traveled before. Launching from a revitalized NASA Kennedy Space Center in Florida, the agency's powerful Space Launch System rocket will carry astronauts aboard NASA's Orion Spacecraft past the Moon, and eventually to Mars. On Earth and in space, NASA is developing, testing and flying cutting-edge technologies for a new future of human and robotic exploration. NASA's current and future Earth missions use the vantage point of space to understand and explore our home planet, improve lives and safeguard our future. NASA brings together technology, science, and unique global Earth observations to provide societal benefits and strengthen our nation. Critical to understanding how our planet's natural resources and climate are changing, our observations form the foundation for important environmental planning and decisions by people all over the world. Join them as they reach for new heights to reveal the unknown at: Starry Night! The program features include...
