## Rocky Hill Public Schools Rocky Hill, CT

It is the policy of the Rocky Hill Board of Education that prior to entrance into the Rocky Hill school system, students must:

- Show proof of at least one Tuberculosis Screening Test (TST)
  <u>OR</u>
- A documented **negative** tuberculosis risk assessment (such as the one below) noted by a physician

If the country is one of the countries included in question 1, a TST should be place.

	Included as a household member are persons who take care of the child in the home. If				
	yes, and the person is from or has recently visited (as in question 2) one of the countries				
	included in question 1, a TST should be place.				

In accordance with the recommendations from the Connecticut Department of Public Health, the School Health Committee of the Connecticut Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics and Rocky Hill Board of Education Policy:

- Students not already known to have a positive test should be tested if they have any of the previous risk factors. (It is recommended that this assessment be made at each mandated examination.)
- A history of BCG vaccination is not a contraindication to testing nor should it be considered in interpretation of the skin test results.
- A symptom screen and chest x-ray should be performed to rule out active TB disease on all students with a positive skin test.
- Result of the risk assessment and testing, when done, should be recorded on the state assessment record (HAR-3).
