To promote VHS's paid summer internship program, Robins Air Force Base's Software Engineering Group's Computer Scientist and Internship Technical Facilitator, Ben Hawkins, attended. Houston County School District's Youth Apprenticeship Coordinator, Sandi Couillard, who works closely with RAFB on their graduating senior student recruitment efforts was also in attendance. VHS parents and students visited the RAFB SWEG's booth to inquire about the wonderful opportunities for their graduating seniors interested in software, electrical or computer engineering.

Twenty-five of middle Georgia's brightest students are selected each year. To qualify for this paid Department of Defense internship, applicants must be U.S. Citizens, be graduating high school seniors (Class of 2024), and must submit a completed portfolio (cover letter, resume, transcript copy, letters of recommendation, and an essay response). Students whose portfolios are selected will interview for the positions. Mrs. Couillard assists the students with their portfolios and interview preparation.

Perry High FCCLA Officers Attend Leadership Conference



The first few customers of Harry's Window Service were his family and friends, but he quickly expanded all over Warner Robins and Perry. Harrington constantly changed the service in the early months as he learned from experience. For example, he started by offering window, tracks, sills, and blinds cleaning, but changed to just window washing recently to maximize efficiency.

His motivation to start this business was to have flexible work hours to fit into his busy soccer schedule. He is also able to use knowledge gained in his General Horticulture and Plant Science classes when working around shrubbery. Harrington joined Work-Based Learning's (WBL) newest pathway which is for student entrepreneurs. Enrolling in WBL allows him to get out of school early each day which eases the stress of trying to balance his busy schedule. Without the program, he would not have been able to grow his business so quickly. Currently Harry's Window Service has three cleaners, Harrington, Cameron Nethaway, and Cullen McDaniel who are all PHS students.

FMMS FCCLA has a Great Start to Love the Children of the World FCCLA National Program Project

As a part of our Community Service project, Feagin Mill Middle FCCLA joined forces with the Feagin Mill FACS classes to collect items desperately needed for Orphanage Emmanuel in Honduras. FCCLA found out about the need through a non-profit run by Dr. and Mrs. Lance Slade. The Slade's and a team from the Middle Georgia area had a trip planned to Orphanage Emmanuel and requested items to fill up suitcases to help meet the many needs of the children. The chapter collected items from students, faculty, and parents for a total of 1,021 items. The items included clothes, shoes, toiletry items, accessories, crafts, candy, and bags, \$50, and wrote 109 personalized notes. The team came back from Honduras with hearts full of joy for all the needs that were met, but heavy hearts for the items still needed. Upon the team's return from Orphanage Emmanuel, a list was compiled of urgent needs. When the chapter heard about the needs, they had to be a part of helping again. Many of FMMS students, faculty, and parents brought in items for both collections to make this a successful project.



Toni Slade visited all the FACS classes to share about Orphanage Emmanuel, her family adoption process from the orphanage, and the greater purpose of Woodlands Coffee Shop and Café. The Coffee Shop and Café will be opening in January and will be located on Highway 96/Lake Joy Road between Goodwill and Black Barley. The students were touched hearing what an impact the items and notes made on the children at Orphanage Emmanuel. Mrs. Slade said that the sweet handwritten notes from FMMS students (some in Spanish) were especially treasured by the kids. She said they walked around with them in their hand or pocket all day and night proudly showing them to others.





FMMS surpassed the number of items from the first collection. The FCCLA collected 2,291 items (clothes, shoes, feminine products, bookbags, socks, underwear, and more). The collection filled up the back of a SUV and the bed of a truck. The items were taken to a drop off location at the Grove Church. The students are learning so much about reaching out to others and the impact it can make on others. FCCLA is all about family, reaching out into the community and developing leaders. Projects like these truly reflect the purpose of the organization and builds leaders with a better perspective of those around them.
