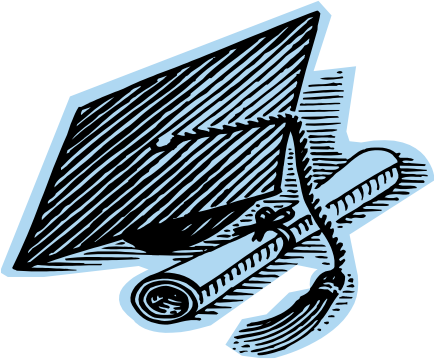

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

- 4 Units of English/Language Arts
 - 9th Literature and American Literature required
- 4 Units of Mathematics
- 4 Units of Science
 - Biology AND either Physical Science or Physics, and either Chemistry or Environmental Science required
- 3 Units of Social Studies
 - Civics, Economics, US History, and World History required
- 3 Units of Foreign Language and/or CTAE and/or Fine Arts
- 1 Unit Personal Fitness/Health (or 3 units ROTC)
- 5 Elective units

(Note: Foreign Language required by 4 year colleges/universities)



ADVANCED PLACEMENT CLASSES

- College level courses through approval and endorsement with College Board
- Rigorous content with increased pace compared to general high school classes

- Student can earn two grades

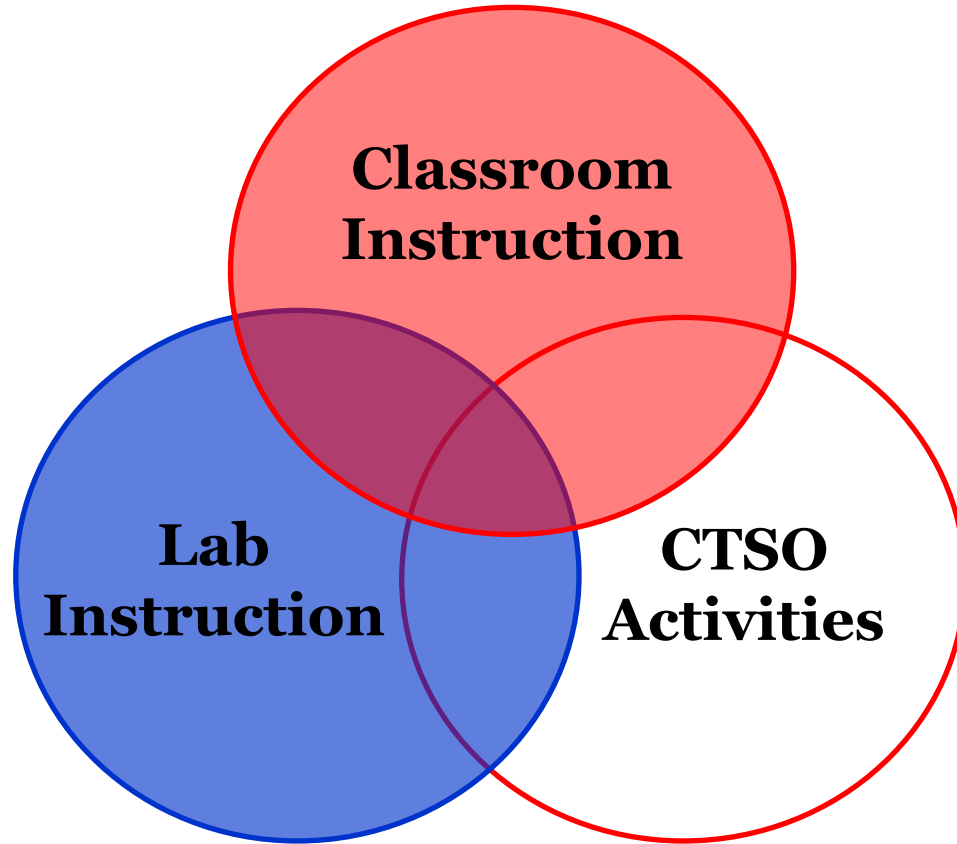

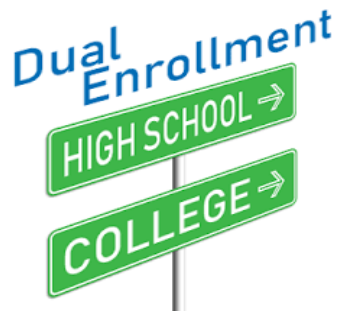

WHAT IS DUAL ENROLLMENT?



- Dual Enrollment (DE), formerly Move On When Ready, is Georgia's program that allows high school students the opportunity to earn college credit while working on their high school diploma. The DE program covers tuition, mandatory fees and required textbooks.
- The goal of DE is to increase college access, as well as give students the necessary skills they need to be successful in today's workforce.

DUAL ENROLLMENT @ HOUSTON COLLEGE & CAREER ACADEMY

- HCCA is an extension of the programs of high schools in Houston County located at an off-campus center of Central Georgia Technical College.
- Current DE course offerings through Central Georgia Technical College are:

One-year programs

- Aircraft Structural Technology (13 hours- **not offered on HCCA campus**)
- Barbering (9 hours)
- Computer Systems/Information Technology (11 hours)
- Cosmetology (13 hours)
- Cybersecurity (18 hours) (***New 24 – 25**)
- Engineering and Technology (9 hours)
- Healthcare Science Technology
- EMR (11 hours)
- CNA (10 hours)

Two-year programs

Senate Bill 86

■ What is it?

- Early access to HOPE Grant
- For Eligible CTAE Courses
- Immediate Access

■ Why SB 86?

- Helps build out more pathway options
- Remove the CTAE barrier, Take more courses sooner!
- Assist GA in allowing students to “figure it out” sooner.
- Remove the fear of, “Not enough hours.”



ON CAMPUS DUAL ENROLLMENT

(COLLEGE COURSES TAKEN AT VETERANS HIGH SCHOOL)

- Juniors and Seniors who meet the admission requirements for Central Georgia Technical College have the opportunity to enroll in the following dual enrollment courses or Advanced Placement.
- DE US History
- DE Economics
- DE Sociology
- DE English

Each course is taught on the High School campus.

Students do not leave campus.



COLLEGE CAMPUS DUAL ENROLLMENT

- **Dual Enrollment (DE)**
 - Taught on college campuses or online according to college schedule
 - Students are released from high school 2 periods for each college class and required to make a yearlong commitment to attending classes for those release periods (minimum 2 college classes – 1 per semester)
 - Students are responsible for admissions, transportation and all communication with faculty during enrollment
 - Course grades do not exceed 100
 - Withdrawing from a college course could result in a Z code on the transcript
 - College credit is awarded upon successful completion of the course
 - Registration completed outside of Evening Advisement



THINGS TO CONSIDER

- ✓ Dual Enrollment is a yearlong commitment. Students attending college classes during specific periods of the school day 1st semester will be expected to take classes during those periods 2nd semester
- ✓ For every **college** class a student takes, he/she will be released for **two periods** of the high school schedule
- ✓ No quality points are added to Dual Enrollment courses
For example, in high school AP classes and Honor classes have added quality points
- ✓ The high school does not provide transportation, materials, or academic assistance for classes taken at college
- ✓ Deadlines are important! Participation in Dual Enrollment is subject to deadlines imposed by colleges and the high school.



FUNDING CAP ELIGIBILITY

How many hours will be paid for by the Dual Enrollment funding Program?

- The Dual Enrollment Funding Cap is 30 semester or 45 quarter hours.
- The Funding Cap is a hard cap based on hours paid by the Dual Enrollment funding program for terms of enrollment (as invoiced by the postsecondary institutions).
- The Funding Cap does not include dual credit coursework attempted and paid by other sources.



GRADE LEVEL ELIGIBILITY

- Students who are enrolled and physically attending a participating eligible public or private high school in Georgia or an eligible participating home study program in Georgia may participate.
- Eligible students may take any approved Dual Enrollment courses listed on the Course Directory, at an eligible participating postsecondary institution (USG, TCSG or private).
- Students in the **9th grade are not eligible** to participate in the Dual Enrollment funding Program.
- All eligible 10th Graders may enroll in approved Career, Technical and Agricultural Education (CTAE) courses listed on the Course Directory at a participating TCSG institution only.
- 10th Graders who have a minimum SAT score of 1200 or minimum ACT composite score of 26 in a single national test administration, may enroll in any approved courses listed on the Course Directory at a TCSG, USG or private eligible participating postsecondary institution.

- Meets college DE admissions requirements
- Responsible
- Takes initiative
- Can follow through on multi-step tasks
- Self-motivated
- Able to communicate with professor
- Has a specific pathway planned for graduation
- Can overcome any logistical challenges of traveling to and from high school and college
