


HOME AND OFFICE SKILLS


Under three new coaches and an entirely new game plan, the Lake Wales Highlanders were sometimes victorious and other times defeated. Under the two platoon system, a new offense, a new defense, the team produced four wins, five losses, and one tie. Moments of exhilaration came for the team and for the fans when the Highlanders battered Dade City, 27—0, and Bartow, 20—6. Fifteen seniors and some outstanding first year men were on the gridiron, but sometimes victory escaped them. The Homecoming game with Kathleen fell just short of a win as the Highlanders in the final seconds pushed for a touchdown that was stopped by an interception. For the season, seven Highlanders were chosen for the all-county team.




Under the direction of first year coach Jim Lee, the Highlander basketball team rolled to an impressive 17-8 season's record. Thrilling and important games for the Highlanders were the conference contests with Bartow, Plant City, and Dade City. Though Bartow was rated a strong team, the Highlanders were victorious, 75—47, in the very first game, a game that provided plenty of excitement. The Plant City games were challenges in which the Highlanders met defeat in close scoring contests. After a defeat of only one point by Pasco, in their first meeting, the Highlanders whipped that team 76—48 in the second game.

When the season ended, the Highlander team was second in the conference. Lake Wales then reached the finals of the district tournament where they won two of their three games.










Undefeated in two years of conference play, the boys' tennis team, under the direction of Coach Linton, clinched the 1968-69 conference title with a 4—3 win over Kathleen. Challenging matches of the year that resulted in Lake Wales' victories were first man Ricky Allen's hard-fought win over Winter Haven (10—8, 7—5) and several tournament matches. Roger Allen won his finals match against Lakeland; Kerry Cofer upset the number 1 seeded opponent from Kathleen; second man Bobby Albritton and Ricky Allen in doubles play upset number 2 seeded Winter Haven. Lake Wales boys won second place in the county tournaments.

Coach Galloway and the girls team also played the game well. Their only loss in regular season was to Bartow. Both Laura Johnson, number one on the team, and Judy Weld, number two, reached the finals in the county tournament. Both were defeated by Lakeland. Lake Wales placed third in the county tournament. Both coaches and members of both teams worked hard on techniques: serving to set up the net man, and returning those difficult deep shots that require a strong backhand.












The Highlander Track Team under Coach Howard Barnhardt started slowly at first, but with proper training the team progressed rapidly. Lake Wales was particularly strong in the sprints. Brady Byrd was an all around trackman who continued to place in the discus, the high jump, the shot put, the high hurdles, and also on the mile relay team. Al Mitchell turned in a very good high jump with a leap of 5'9" using the now famous Fosbury Flop. At the Lions Club meet in Lakeland, Joe Ramsey blazed down his lane in the 100 to chalk up a 9.6 time, the second fastest statewide time to be posted this season. His good time also broke the old school record of 9.8 seconds. Leonard Burch was an experienced miler whose first places added depth to the Lake Wales Track Team.








FRENCH CLUB


