

My father, <u>Harold Willis</u>, was a head basketball coach (1955-64) and a history teacher (1955-1985) at Wadena High School. I grew up loving the game of basketball. He would be happy to know that I eventually grew up to appreciate the importance of documenting the past.



Bob Zosel was, among other things, the great local historian of Wadena. I was lucky enough to have played basketball for Wadena High School in the early 1970's at which time Mr. Zosel was in charge of running the game clock, the scoreboard and "the horn." When coach said to get back in the game one would promptly approach the scorer's table. Once

acknowledged by Mr. Zosel the player would sit and wait for a dead ball so the horn could be sounded, and the substitution made. While waiting to get back into the game it was typical for Mr. Zosel to offer a few words of encouragement.

I wish they were both still here to have helped me assemble "The Scrapbook."*



The Beginning

Wadena Indians basketball started around the turn of the century, the exact year was not determined. The Wadena High School athletic teams' nickname of "Indians" came from the town's namesake, Ojibwe Chief Wadena, who lived in the later part of the 19th century.

In the 1980's when the Wadena and Deer Creek school districts merged the new WDC athletic teams' nickname was changed to the "Wolverines."

Wadena High School Colors

Until the late 1940's the Wadena Indians were often referred to as the "Orangemen." Dating back to 1925 the Wadena school colors were orange and white. However, because of a shortage of dye needed to make the color orange they chose to switch their colors effective the 1948-49 school year. The student body voted and blue and gold were selected as the new school colors. The "Orangemen" ceased to exist.



1900-09

1905: Boys and Girls Teams

This was the oldest article I found relating to any high school basketball in central Minnesota. As you can see Little Falls and Staples had both boys' and girls' teams.

The boys' and girls' basketball team of Little Falls high school played the boys' and girls' team of the Staples high school last night the latter winning in both cases. The girls' score was 7 to 9, the boys' score was 16 to 14. Both games were close. Montgomery, center of Staples, played the star game of the evening.

Brainerd Daily Dispatch, January 31st, 1905

It was newsworthy in 1905 that the Aitkin basketball team traveled (presumably by train) through Brainerd on its way to Staples.

The Aitkin basketball team passed through the city this afternoon en route to Staples where they will play this evening.

First Game Lost by Local Basketball Team Due to Poor Hall at Wadena

In a fast, exciting game Friday night at Wadena, the locals were defeated by a good margin, 22 to 8. Wadena enthusiasts say it was the best game ever played at Wadena.

The locals' defeat was due to the fact that the Wadena floor is very smail and exceedingly low. The baskets were only about two feet below the ceiling and is intercepted by two cross beams and eight lights with guards which protrude about a foot below the ceiling. The seats are on three sides and only about two feet from the court. Thus the long shots which are the feature of the Brainerd team, were impossible. All shots that were made had to be shot from the immediate vicinity of the c baskets.


From February of 1914 to March of 1916, it appears that **Zimmerman** was the star of that era.

The Minnesota State High School League was first organized in 1916 as the State High School Athletic Association. Its primary purposes were (1) to promote amateur sports and (2) to establish uniform eligibility rules for interscholastic contests.







" HELPS BASKETBALL IN BRAINERD

THE cause of basketball in Brainerd high school will be benefited if the recent proposal of the board of control of the Minnesota State High School Athletic association which has redistricted the state, is adopted for next year's playing. As matters stood in the old days, Brainerd faced the hardest kind of schedule such as St. Cloud, Bemidji and Little Falls. With teams of such caliber, the contest in our old district was one which sapped the strength of even the winner so that the team usually made little showing (

Under the new arrangement, information of which was transmitted to Supt. W. C. Cobb, the whole state has been redistricted in 82 districts, and in the determination of basketball championships these districts are grouped by fours for eight regional tour-newests.

Brainerd, in District 11, will be associated with Aitkin, Crosby-Ironton, Eagle Bend, Motley, Pine River, Staples and Wadena and plays at the regional tournament to be held in St. Cloud. The winner there competes in the finals with the winners of the seven other regional tournaments.

St. Cloud is placed in District 12 and is associated with Annandale, Buffalo, Little Falls, Maple Lake, Monticello, Paynesville, Royalton and Sauk Rapids.

Bemidji is placed in Diatrict No. 5 of Regional Tournament No. 2 and is associated with Akeley, Bagley, Blackduck, Cass Lake, Deer River, Park Rapids and Walker.

The new plan if made effective next year meets the hearty approbation of the Dispatch. Every baskethall fan when he studies the new districting will undoubtedly concur.

BASKETBALL, 1924-25

WADENA entered the 1924 season in basketball with prospects for a successful season rather dim. Four regulars of last year's team had been lost through graduation or ineligibility and this necessitated the working in of new men. However, there were quite a few members of last year's squad remaining and some good material was found in the Freshmen class. Under the direction of Coach Voss, the team started work early and played its first game with Sebeka on December 11 at Wadena. Wadena was handicapped by injuries and lost 9 to 7 in a wild game. The next week, on December 15, Wadena played a return game at Sebeka and won 18 to 8. On December 17, Wadena journeyed to Deer Creek and defeated that team 29 to 21. The next game was with the strong Little Falls team at Little Falls on December 24, Wadena losing in a hard fought battle by a score of 31 to 17. In the first game after the Christmas vacation, Wadena journeyed to Crosby-Ironton and lost by the score of 24 to 13, the boys seeming lost on the huge Crosby floor. On January 22, Crosby came to Wadena for a return game and again was victorious, 12 to 7, in a rather uninteresting game. On January 29, Brainerd came to Wadena and won 6 to 5 in a very closely contested game in which Brainerd

had all the breaks. The next game was with Aitkin here, and Wadena succeeded in coming from behind to win 13 to 9 in a hard fought game. On February 13, Wadena went to Brainerd for a return game and lost 21 to 13. The next game on February 20 was with Little Falls at Wadena. Wadena took the lead at the start of the game and never relinguished it, winning 11 to 7. The next day Wadena traveled to Bertha for a game, and lost 22 to 11, being badly off form. The final game of the regular season was with Long Prairie at Long Prairie on February 27, Wadena winning 10 to 8. On March 6, Wadena traveled to Aitkin for the district tournament. Wadena was eliminated in the first game by Pine River, district champions, by a score of 20 to 18 in the fastest and hardest fought game of the tournament. Wadena won five games and lost eight during the season, and scored 173 points to its opponents 198. Captain Zosel was the leading scorer of the team with 58 points, Keachie followed with 44, Young with 30, Krause with 25, Stevens with 14, and Jacobson with 2. Prospects for a winning team next year seem bright as the greater share of this year's team will return.



During the 1930's Wadena had no conference affiliation except in 1935-36 when they joined the new Central Eight conference. After that one year they inexplicably dropped out.



District 24 Tournament Format (Dist 11 / Dist 25)

Through the 1930 District 11 tournament there was no sub-district. In the 1930 district tournament Crosby-Ironton and New York Mills received first-round byes. The remaining 12 teams (five large and seven small schools) reduced their numbers to six after the first round, leaving the tournament with eight teams. After District 11 became District 25, and with the creation of a sub-district, the format of the District 25 (1931-1933) and District 24 (post 1933) tournaments had two components. First, the small schools competed in the sub-district tournament. The champion and runner-up (usually) would then be seeded in the district tournament with the six large schools. The top four large schools would be seeded accordingly, and their first-round opponents would be assigned or randomly picked.

For basketball the Central Ten became the Central Seven and then the Central Six (Wadena was not a member of either) and football still had a Central Ten Conference (Wadena was a member). It is known Wadena basketball was a member of the Lake Region Conference in the 1950-51 season. It is possible they were also members in the year prior and likely members through the 1953-54 season, after which Wadena joined the new Mid-State Conference effective the 1954-55 school year.

In the District 24 championship game, held in the Wadena Auditorium, the Indians took on the #1 seed Crosby-Ironton Rangers. C-I had won the District title the previous 3 years running. This year Wadena won 33-25, led by **Dick Schmitz**, the leading point getter with 10 and top rebounder. Sophomore **Bruce Wilcox**, **Jr.** added 8 points and **Jack Browne** had 7.

Sophomore **Sam Phillips** led the team in scoring at almost 10 ppg. His best outings were 25 points vs Perham and 22 points vs Brainerd.


Another sophomore, **Bill Gaslin**, averaged 7 ppg. His high point effort was 19 vs Brainerd.


