The administration of a modern High School requires of its leaders a variety of skills and complex decisions in which many share.






Teletype Machine Increases Learning


The Math department widened its horizons by including a teletype machine in its "staff." A computer became a part of the teaching staff. The machine acts as a terminal computer connected by phone lines to a main computer in Orlando. The computer functions by using the given information, changing it to musical tones, transmitting it to Orlando. The data desired returns to Lake Wales. The computer can be programmed to work not only practical math problems, but theoretical problems, such as computing fuel needed to land a lunar module on the moon within five feet per second velocity. The teletype uses system basic language to work out these problems. With most of the world using computers, a teletype in our Math department helped us to become familiar with modern technology.







New Teachers Bring New Techniques

Five French I students from the Foreign Language department and five teachers journeyed to France during the Easter break with two other schools, Fort Meade and Lakeland. They stayed eight days, visiting popular places such as: the Mont St. Michel, the Le Mans, several chateaux such as: Azay-le-Rideaux, Chambord, and Chenonceaux; Chartres, and the Normandy invasion beach. The last three days were spent in Paris seeing the Eiffel Tower, Notre Dame, the Louvre, Versailles, Napoleon's tomb, and the Follies Bérgère. 
Musicians Strive To Perfect Performances

Physical and mental growth are the concerns of the departments of Driver Education, Special Education, Physical Education, and Learn and Earn.






Learn and Earn is an on the job vocational program. While some students work with engines, others learn secretarial skills and office work.

Later in the year a bake sale and car wash were also held to increase funds for the coming years.



Bicentennial Brings In Girls' Sports, Or 'You've Come A Long Way, Baby!'





First Season Record 5 Wins-5 Losses




Team Scores Four Wins











Cheerleaders Ignite Spirit!



Awards given at the end of the year included Tommy Dawson for most important member, Teddy Manley for most valuable member, and Jeffrey Hart for most outstanding member of the team.


















Swim Team Shivers And Splashes


















Pep Club Cheers at Parade

New Club Holds Devotional








FHA Changes to FHA/HERO


