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TK and Kindergarten Mrs. Tinnin

Kindergarten learned about the letters 'c', 'o', and 'g'. Students are starting to sound out simple CVC words with the sounds we have learned so far this year. Each child has their own set of cards with the letters. As we learn a new letter, they get a new card. They are also learning ASL for each letter and a chant to help them remember the sound. Everyday kindergarten has Listen and Learn activities. They just finished Nursery Rhymes and Fables and started learning about the five senses.

Kindergarten is finishing up the third chapter in math learning about the numbers 6 through 9. They will learn a rhyme to help them remember how to write each number. They should know the rhymes 0-7 already. Part of this chapter is finding number pairs for the number we are learning so students understand how numbers are related.

TK is learning about their five senses as a part of the All About Me unit. They are learning about the numbers 1 through 5 by doing different hands-on activities.



Third and Fourth Grade Classroom Mrs. Mars

Students have been practicing their water tests that they will conduct at Winolequa Park on October 25th in the morning before the pumpkin patch. Students learned how to run all the tests as well as why we test for each thing and what the optimal levels are for Salmon.

In math both grades are now working on multiplication. 4th graders are working on multiplying things by one and two digit numbers. 3rd graders are still being introduced to the idea of multiplication and how it relates to repeated addition.

We have been talking a lot in class about starting a book and reading it all the way to the end. I will be meeting with students each time they finish and test on a book to

select their next book. Reading one book at a time helps students with their comprehension of the story. Please help your child to make sure to finish one book before beginning the next.
