







Special Departments Serve Students




Science Unfolds Mysteries


Science attempts to unfold the mysteries of the unknown in nature through the study of laws, properties and experiments. An understanding of scientific methods are needed for day to day life.


The science department offered solid learning opportunities for students including the fundamentals of physical science and general biology.




History Classes Relive Past


English Department Enriches Lives


Basic skills preparation for students continued as an emphasis in the English department. Remediation after testing was a challenge for some eleventh and twelfth graders. Students tried to learn all the skills required of them by the state. A big step for the English department was changing from semester to yearly courses. The compensatory classes which were limited to fifteen students in each class caused some overcrowding in the regular English classes but were helpful to the many who needed special help.

Several classes took a field trip to Lakeland to see the Asolo Theatre Production "Press Cuttings". The Taproot Theatre visited the school to present lively interpretations of poems like "Jabberwocky" and stories such as "The Diary of Adam and Eve" by Mark Twain.

The literary magazine McLeod, edited by Kathy Odom and Mark Boyd and under the leadership of Mrs. Cloud, was published by Mr. Potter's shop classes. The magazine contained selections from the classes of '78, '79, and '80. Many students entered the county poetry contest as well as other writing contests. Kathy Odom was one of the winners of the Sertoma Essay contest, while Vicky Collins took first place honors in the V.F.W. speech and essay contest. Lorrie Frederick won the second place trophy for the 11th grade in the Polk County poetry contest and the special prize for her poem honoring Bok Tower's fiftieth anniversary. Debates, dramatic presentations, reading assignments, journals and various projects were not neglected in the English curriculum. Television enriched our lives presenting the students with many fine works such as The Scarlet Letter and many Shakespeare plays.














Highlander Music Vibrates Pride




















Students Become Bilingual


Compensatory Forms Plague Math Faculty


If Jim sees a vested suit he likes for \$69.95 on sale at twenty percent discount, what would the amount of discount be? How much would the suit cost? What would be the total cost including four percent sales tax? Compensatory math students tackled such problems with the aid of their teachers. As skills were mastered, results of testing had to be recorded on a student's computer printout if he had taken state tests, on his compensatory form, on two forms for curriculum and guidance and various other reports. These were in addition to planning work, grading papers, and recording grades in roll books. Folders containing work completed had to be maintained for each student as math and English teachers bore the brunt of work in preparing students in "basic skills." Many students, however, were ready for such tasks as finding the value of "x" in algebraic equations, proving geometry theorems, or even meeting the challenge of data processing or calculus. Our society requires knowledge of math. At times math was fun as well as a puzzle.



Students Reach Physical Goals in P.E.







Both Girls and Guys Learn Importance of **Home Economics**




Girls Join **Industrial Arts**







Electives Offer Self-realization and Lifesaving Skills







Business Ed Prepares Students



















ROTC Demands High Goals



























Highlanders Capture Victory








Highlanders Win In First Annual Harvest Bowl






Freshmen Overcome Defeat


Volleyball Struggles Through Tough Season






Musclemen Give School a Lift

The season was successful because of the players hard work and consideration for team play.






Freshmen Boys **Defeat Bartow**

Girls Undefeated



The girls' team, consisting mostly of sophomores, laid the groundwork and with the YMCA pool coming it looks as if this program is beginning to take shape.






Boys Pound Pavement For Points



Girls Place In County Meet






Highlanders Capture **County Championship**


JROTC Remains Honor Unit

Basic purposes of the JROTC program are to help a person become a better citizen and become a well-rounded individual. It prepares for leadership and the future.






Leo Awarded **Outstanding Club**


Lettermen Acquire New Sponsor


Freshmen Explore With Spirit


