Providing a plan to support all mother tongues, supporting scholars who are not yet proficient in the language of the Middle Years Program, and learning the host country's culture and language will be the purpose of the Edward W. Bok Academy Language Policy.

Philosophy

The IB learner profile attribute of being "open-minded", builds the capacity for our scholars to value and respect their own culture and personal history, and be open to the cultures, values, and traditions of other scholars and their communities. Acquisition of additional languages and researching the culture of other countries, build greater capacity for respect for intercultural views. With respect to each mother tongue, a multilingual learning community is fostered with the language of instruction being English and the acquisition of language being Spanish. Language is central to the learning process in every course with a culturally rich focus incorporated through reading, writing, listening, and speaking with rich and purposeful assignments.

Mother Tongue Support

Edward W. Bok Academy North is committed to support the mother tongues of every scholar, staff member, and stakeholder. Our goal is to mirror the school community in the population of our staff as well as our curriculum and programs. Our multilingual, multicultural staff speak several languages and are often called upon to assist as

translators. Our school website has Google Translate in which families can choose the language of their choose to read the latest information. School call outs are translated into various languages with messages for families too.

English Language Learner Support

English Language Learners (ELLs) are in the mainstream classroom receiving the core curriculum with specific strategies provided. English as Second Language (ESL) course can be provided for intensive instruction in English through the use of second language acquisition methodologies designed to develop proficiency in comprehension, speaking, reading, and writing of the English language. Programs used are Rosetta Stone a,d Dual Lingo. Learning and language support is provided to assist in the acquisition of the English language at all grade levels through:

• Assessing of the progression of language acquisition using multiple points of data including: Writing Samples, Class and Subject Assessments and other work samples, observations, teacher feedback and student feedback;

• Offering professional development learning and training opportunities to Instructors to develop and refine ELL instructional strategies;

• Providing in-class support to instructors through various models of co-teaching and through pull-out support; and

Once a year, ELs are assessed through WIDA to monitor progress and determine further eligibility and placement. Language Acquisition Courses Language acquisition is a critical component of the MYP and in the development of the MYP student. We encourage every student to become fluent in more than one language. To this end, it is the expectation that all students will take Spanish.

The aims of the teaching and learning of MYP Language Acquisition at Edward W. Bok Academy North are to:

• gain proficiency in an additional language while supporting maintenance of their mother tongue and cultural heritage

• develop a respect for, and understanding of, diverse linguistic and cultural heritage

• develop the student's communication skills necessary for further language learning, and for study, work and leisure in a range of authentic contexts and for a variety of audiences and purposes

• enable the student to recognize and use language as a vehicle of thought, reflection, self-expression and learning in other subjects, and as a tool for enhancing literacy

• enable the student to understand the nature of language and the process of language learning, which comprises the integration of linguistic, cultural and social components

• foster curiosity, inquiry and a lifelong interest in language learning, within an enjoyable setting. (Language Acquisition Guide, 2015)
