AR books are available in the school library for students to pick a book at their own level and read it at their own pace. Many of the AR books are located throughout the library as well as in a separate and easy-to-find section. When students are finished with reading the AR book, there is a short quiz on the computer to check their understanding. As students read and take quizzes, they earn points and track their progress to move up to their next level. Having computer access in the library offers an extra opportunity for students to reach their reading goals so their reading skills will be at, or above, grade level.
