### **WELCOME BACK HAWKS!**

We cannot wait to have all our Hawks back on campus soon! Our students continued to reach new heights and showed tremendous gains throughout the course of last school year! This year, we are eager to put on our boots and reach even farther. Below I wanted to share just a few of the successes of the previous year, while the attached document outlines the goals we will tackle from our strategic plan for the upcoming year!

- Continued implementation of a growth mindset school-wide.
- We read a total of 49,861 books that were recorded through AR!
- Students showed great gains throughout the year on our new STAR and FAST progress monitoring.
- Increased parent involvement in parent nights and school wide events!
- Over 100,000 minutes of reading recorded for Read-a-thon and students made Mrs. Thomas have blue hair! That's an increase of over 20,000 minutes!
- Added Academic Coaching block to support ALL learners in understanding the standards.
- Added a Theater program and had 2 performances!
- Had increased participation in math and reading tutoring as well as a 5<sup>th</sup> grade Science camp for the first time.

We want to improve our opportunities for parents to be on campus and involved in school happenings. We invite parents to join us in several ways in the upcoming year, and below are just a few:

1) Continue to encourage **reading in your home each day** by having your child read for AT LEAST 20 minutes each night. Once they finish the book, they will take an AR test at school and earn points. Students that reach their AR goal can attend the AR reward parties each quarter. Students who reach set benchmarks will also be able to earn cash at the end of the year! You will continue to hear this initiative referred to as **READ 20** across our system.



- 2) Each month we will have a **school-wide celebration on the blacktop**, and <u>we invite parents to join us</u>. We will recognize STAR Hawks, celebrate our readers, and/or celebrate those who have had good behavior. We will also recognize students for other achievements throughout campus. Following our meeting, there will be a celebration that students can attend if they have reached their goal in behavior or reading! We would love to have you there to cheer on the students.
- 3) Come eat **lunch with your child ANY day** of the week!! When you arrive, you will need to check into the front office with your ID. You may then meet your child and picnic with them under the pavilion. If there is an available table inside, you may be permitted to sit inside. This is, however, a time for you to eat with your child, only. For safety, we cannot permit any other students to join you. Please also keep in mind that any outside food items must be kept outside of the cafeteria.
- 4) Commemorate your child's birthday by purchasing them a **birthday book**! The birthday book will be added to the school library with a sticker the front cover celebrating the child it was purchased for! That child will also be the FIRST to check it out and take it home to read. This is a great way to celebrate your child AND add books to our library for all students.

# Grade Level News

### **Kindergarten**

This past year your child had the opportunity to be engaged in reading numerous books during our weekly book themes, mixing fiction and nonfiction. We have read, discussed, and written about different animals and places as we have studied them. As you read at home this summer, you can do these activities to keep your child engaged. Emergent readers need 20 minutes minimum of reading time daily. Even though most children have begun to read on their own, it is still very important to read to your child. As you prepare for the transition to first grade, the stories will be written on a higher level: this is a great bonding experience for you and your child as well as an opportunity to improve their comprehension. Use this time to ask questions about the stories: characters, setting, comparing/contrasting characters, and making predictions of what will happen as you are reading. These types of comprehension questions take very little time yet make a world of difference in your child's progress during the school year. In math, your students learned many important skills that will only grow through the years. Basic math facts are the building blocks of mathematical learning. From addition to subtraction, to grouping and number lines, we've created a solid foundation for math skills to be built upon. Allowing your students to practice their math facts will help prepare them for the upcoming school year. Hands-on activities will allow them to see math in action. One fun way to help with math is in the kitchen. Allow them to help prepare dinner. It's a fun way to keep learning math and to help with life. To help maintain these skills, we are sending home a summer reading and math packet. Please work with your child on these. \*Those who return these packets when we return to school in August will receive an award.

### First Grade

The first graders worked really hard this past year and made huge gains and progress. We worked really hard in reading and writing. We worked on reading strategies this year along with phonics, spelling, grammar, sight words, and fluency. Our first graders took the challenge of Read 20 and shined! We were amazed at all the growth in reading.

This year we started the new Florida Math Standards and the first graders took off with it and SOARED. We are so very proud of our students and their gains in math. This is the first year using the iReady math curriculum and they did amazing. They loved all the math manipulatives and hands-on math activities we incorporated this year.

Science and social studies, we dove deep into our standards and did a lot of hands-on activities and learning, which we think the students really enjoyed. Towards the end of the year we did some project based learning. The students absolutely enjoyed it and applied their prior knowledge on these projects.

We would like to thank you all so much for all your hard work to make this school year an AMAZING one! Please continue to encourage your child to read daily and work on their summer learning packet.



### **Second Grade**

The second graders have made a great deal of progress this past year! In reading they learned how to find text evidence and answer comprehension questions. They also learned other reading skills such as finding the theme, identifying the plot, and identifying the author's purpose. In math they learned how to add and subtract up to three digits with regrouping. In writing they learned how to write a narrative, expository, and opinion paragraph. Second graders have been earning their AR points in class and reaching their goals to attend the wonderful AR celebrations. Students also benefited from their great behavior by being able to attend the quarterly exciting PBS celebrations. Please continue to encourage your child to read at home daily. This is an important key to your child's success as a lifelong learner! We will be sending home a summer packet with work in reading and math. They will return them in August to their new teacher. That along with a daily reading habit will prepare your child with the transition into third grade.!

### **Third Grade**

This past year has been one of incredible growth! Our third graders have worked so hard and we are so proud of them! The amount of new vocabulary they have obtained this year has been incredible! In math we have seen a tremendous amount of growth from the beginning of the year to the end! This summer we encourage our students to continue to read daily and practice their math fluency skills to avoid the dreaded "summer slide." Our students have come such a long way this year and we want to continue that momentum as they prepare for the rigor of 4th grade. Keeping up with their skills will help them be better prepared for success in 4th grade! Our fourth grade team will be sending home a summer learning packet that will be due the week school begins. Please encourage your child to complete this during the summer. If you need more ideas for how to keep your child reading and writing over the summer, consider keeping a summer journal. Writing about fun summer experiences will help build memories and keep their skills sharp! The Lake Wales Public Library is a wonderful resource to find exciting new books for your child to read. They offer books by mail, a mobile Book Mobile, and a locker system for parents to check out books after library hours. In the summer packet, the math team has included some practice to keep the learning fresh. Games with playing cards and dice are a fun way to develop number sense and critical thinking skills. There are several ideas online and there is a post on the school story on Class Dojo with ideas. We are looking forward to seeing your students in the fall. As this year comes to a close, we want to thank you again for all your support! It's been a pleasure working with your child and we were so grateful for this wonderful group of kids! We wish them well as they move on to 4th grade! Have a wonderful summer!



### **Fourth Grade**

Our fourth graders are becoming 5th graders! It all happened so quickly. This past year, we've learned so many different writing skills as well as learning how to write expository, argumentative and narrative pieces. Narrative is by far their favorite genre of writing. We have introduced the students to several new grammar skills that they've demonstrated in more aspects than just their language arts class. We've read more books than we've ever read and gained more knowledge than they expected at the beginning of the year. We have also excelled in our math abilities. Students were taught several math skills that they mastered, from place value to fractions and we've learned about stem and leaf plots which was also new to teachers. These skills will definitely take them further than just passing fourth grade. We've wrapped up all of our math standards for the year and preparing them for what fifth grade holds. We encourage you to always look for ways to help develop your child into a strong critical thinker. Always ask questions that help them think deeper than just the general "yes" or "no" answer. We believe each student has the potential to be whatever they want to be. Strive for greatness Hawks!

### **Fifth Grade**

Fifth grade students rocked it this past year across each curriculum area! In reading, students began the year with a Book Tasting, learning about so many different books and genres to explore during the school year. We worked through our ELA standards with many projects, on-level story dissecting and making connections across the texts. In the spring, we even had a March Madness tournament, where several teachers read aloud several books and the students had to vote on the winner! They loved it! Finally, in writing, we learned all the tools for writing a 5-paragraph essay, as well as implementing our grammar standards. In math a new standard was finding the mean, median, mode, and range of numbers. Additionally, students had to add, subtract, multiply, and divide decimals and convert units. Adding and subtracting fractions with unlike denominators was also a big know-how! In science, fifth grade dug deep into standards with field trips that provided real experiences as well as exciting hands-on learning experiences. We wish all of our 5th grade students the best of luck as their enter into middle school! Once a HAWK, always a HAWK!




### A Letter From the PTO President

### Student Attendance Policies and Procedures 2023-2024

### Daily Procedures:

All students will report to their designated area prior to the 8:10 bell ringing. Students will be dismissed to their classrooms once the 8:10 bell rings.

Any students who arrive at the classroom after 8:15 should check in to the front office for a tardy pass .

### Daily Call Outs for Absences/Tardies:

Call outs are routinely made to those families who have a child that is absent or tardy based on the information in FOCUS by 9:35 am. Any changes to attendance after that time, will still be documented in the system, but will not be recognized by the call-out system. These changes will be made by the front office.


#### **Tardy Policy:**

All tardies will be initially marked as Unexcused (unless arriving in the front office with a Doctor's note).

In order to have a tardy excused, an adult must escort the student(s) to the office. Those who are not escorted to the office will remain with an unexcused tardy. No student should be allowed to enter the room tardy without a pass.

Unexcused tardies factor into student truancy and are reviewed by the attendance manager and LWCS social worker. Letters will be sent home quarterly for tardy issues. Phone calls will be made as well when concerns arise.

documentation would be overseen by the before care director(s).

### FAILURE TO MAKE PAYMENT:

Any incurring debts for before care will first be requested from the parent. At the end of the year, any outstanding debts will be added to the child's obligation. Non-payment for 2 weeks or more may result in loosing your spot in the program.



### BEFORE SCHOOL CARE 2023-2024

### **OVERVIEW**:

Before school care will allow parents to drop their student off on school grounds to be supervised before school opening and breakfast. This time allows for students to be under the care of a staff member for parents who are unable to supervise their child during this time. There will be options of reading, playing games, or doing other activities that encourage learning. There are a limited number of spots available.

ANY student who does not have appropriate paperwork or payment will not be able to attend.

### WHEN:

6:45 - 7:45

Drop off must be before 7:30.

Students would be sent to the cafeteria for breakfast when the cafeteria opens (most likely 7:45 am)

### WHERE:

Hillcrest cafeteria

#### PRICE:

\$3 a day/\$15 per week

### BEFORE SCHOOL CARE FAQs

#### What are the hours?

Students may be dropped off as early as 6:45 and as late as 7:30.

### What is the procedure when I drop my kid off each day?

You will park in the front parking lot and enter through the cafeteria door nearest the front gate. When you come in that door, you will sign your child in for the morning. Your signature, date and time verify when the child was left in the care of the Before School Care Staff.

### What if I only need it on certain days?

If you need more than 3 days of before school care services, you will need to pay for the whole week. If you need 3 days or less, you would be charged for the days your child is there.

#### What is the cost?

The fee for using before school care supervision at the school is \$3 per day (\$15 for the week).

### What day does payment need to be made?

Payment should be made the Friday before the Monday of services rendered.

### How do I make payment?

At this time payments must be cash, check, or money order and can be given to the director during check-in or paid in the front office during school hours. A receipt will be issued upon payment. Payment must be hand delivered by a parent to the school staff.

### Do I pay for days I do not use?

For questions related to times your child will not be at school to utilize services, please speak with the director. Absences could result in your child's spot being filled.

### Do I pay in advance or after services?

We request that you pay in advance. If services have been rendered for a week without payment, someone will be reaching out to ensure payment is made or your child's spot could be filled. If you get two weeks or more behind, you run the risk of losing your spot for the remainder of the year.

#### What will they be doing?

Before school care staff will have activities for them to do. These activities will vary. We recommend students bring a book to read as reading is always encouraged. Phones and other outside electronic devices will NOT be permitted.

### Does my child receive breakfast?

Students will be dismissed at 7:45 am to either eat breakfast in the school cafeteria or go to the PE court with their classmates. Breakfast is free of charge for any student on campus.
