Greetings from the Middle High School!

Lumberjack Families,

As the second quarter of school comes to a close, it is important to reflect on what has and has not been accomplished. Many high school students have taken the PSAT, or selected VLAC courses to earn credit in a course not offered at Lin-Wood. Our middle school students have been active exploring different specials, using machinery they may have not ever thought possible. It has been a year for rewriting plays and learning about the Emancipation Proclamation. What has not happened for many students, the formulation of a plan to navigate rough waters.

As the year floats along, we often are overwhelmed with life and school work. Students who get bogged down with classwork often do not know how to set the ship right, so to speak. They flounder and become adrift. Deadlines are not met, redos seem impossible and more and more work is given. Meanwhile, the ship keeps moving, seemingly never to slow down and students get caught in a current only to be swept out of control.

What can be done about this? It takes a team to slow the engine and make plans to steer clear of obstacles ahead. Students need to identify their team. Also, what is their function within the team? Parents, teachers and staff members are not the only people on the team. Students need to be more proactive, ask for help and guidance, formulate a plan and stick to it. Allowing them to steer clear of potential problems.



The biggest piece of advice the captain can give is to complete your work on time. If you cannot do that, are you communicating with teachers to formulate a plan to do so? Communication on any vessel is a skill the student needs to become familiar with. Parents should be encouraging constant communication with the teacher. This allows for teachers to also help your child build a plan for navigating a river of work. Failure to stay with the current can be devastating. Avoiding the rapids and learning to use the eddies is vital. Slow down, regroup and be aware of the rocks.

In short, to prevent from sinking, stay on top of your coursework and use your team to steer through the water hazards. If your child is faltering, do no't wait until the end of the quarter, they need help now. Make a plan and continue to check-on your child so they understand what their school priorities are. Reach out to teachers for assistance. Too many of our students get behind and think they can get caught up by themselves. Parents feel it is the teachers responsibility to get the student caught up. It is not, it is the student's responsibility, with the assistance of their team to get it done. Life is full of pressures, they never go away and are often self-inflicted. It doesn't have to be the case.




Middle School
