How to get the most out of parent-teacher conferences (Elementary)

Some parents say that the parent-teacher conference is one of the most valuable things they attend all year. These one-on-one meetings are great for learning more about your child's strengths and weaknesses, and will give both you and the teacher a better idea about the year Parent-teacher conferences are often brief in ahead.

To get the most from your meeting:

- · Talk to your child. Ask her to tell you what she thinks are her easiest and most difficult subjects—and why. Does she have any questions she'd like you to ask the teacher?
- · Make a list of things to tell the teacher. You know your child better than anyone else. Sharing some of this information will make it easier for the teacher to meet your child's needs.
- · Write down your questions. Ask things such as:
- o Is my child in different groups for different subjects?

- o Does my child participate in class discussions and activities?
- o How well does my child get along with others?
- · Arrive on time. Teachers usually have many conferences scheduled during a single day. Arriving on time will allow you to take full advantage of the time the teacher has available.
- · Create an action plan. Ask the teacher what you can do at home to reinforce what your child is learning at school. Try to get at least one or two specific suggestions.

Make the most of parent-teacher conferences (Junior High)

middle school. But they are worth attending! To make the most of the time you spend with your child's teachers:

- · Chat with your child before the conference. Does she have any concerns about a teacher or a class?
- · Make a list. Don't assume you'll remember everything you want to talk about with her teachers. Write down your questions and a few notes about the topics you'd like to cover.
- · Start on a high note. Begin the conference by saying something positive. "My child loves the novel she's reading for your class." An upbeat start may make the meeting go more smoothly.
- · Keep an open mind. If a teacher has concerns about your child, don't get defensive. Instead,

ask for specific examples of the problem.

· Develop a plan. If one of your child's teachers mentions a problem, ask for ideas on solving it. The plan should include things your child can do in class and you can do at home.

Support your teen's ability to think critically in high school (High School)

As your teen gets older, she is learning to think in a more complex way. Your teenager has begun to develop:


- · Advanced reasoning skills. She is able to think about multiple possibilities and hypothetical situations.
- · Abstract thinking skills. She can think about intangible concepts, such as spirituality.
- The ability to think about thinking. This allows your teen to consider how she is processing what she is learning and feeling.

Changes in thought processes are often displayed in "typical" teen behavior, such as the belief that "no one" understands what's going on. Teens also tend to become more concerned with the world around them. They may start supporting a cause, or begin to notice differences between adults' words and actions.

To support your teen's thinking skills:

- · Listen to her concerns. Try not to be offended if she says you don't understand. Instead, enlist the help of an older sibling or family friend, and suggest that your teen turn to her for advice.
- · Listen to her ideas. Let her give her opinion on your rules and their consequences.
- · Discuss her views of the world—and talk about your own. Ask about her political ideas and spiritual beliefs. Withhold any judgement.
- · Encourage her to get involved in causes she feels strongly about.



Title 1 Annual Review Meeting

May 4, 2022

1:30 p.m.

Persons present: Superintendent Derr, Principal Fluhrer, Mr. Uhrich (Title 1 teacher), Mrs. Grigsby (Title 1 Para), Kristy Folstad (parent), Jess Arnold (parent), Ross Reubin (parent)

Title 1 Budget: The projected budget for the 2022-2023 school year is \$94,174. This amount is approximately \$19,655 less than the 2021-2022 school year. Classroom reduction and student transportation needs are also paid for with Title 1 funds.

Student Selection Process:

Math Assessments—MAP, STAR, DIBELS

The Department of Public Instruction requires a minimum of two criteria for the student selection process. In the event a student scores at Teachers and Title 1 Communication: An exthe 25th percentile or lower on the MAP test, the STAR test is reviewed and, if necessary, the DIBELS test is administered. Students exhibiting the highest need are selected, with 45 students as a suggested maximum number allowed for services by one Title 1 teacher. Our school has been awarded a literacy grant in the

amount of \$500,000 that will require utilizing the DIBELS measure for all students. Discussion was held, and the Title 1 Department will be replacing the DIBELS assessment with teacher referral as a third criteria. All meeting attendees agreed.

Method of Services: pullout and inclusion

Curriculum: The Title 1 Curriculum consists of Reading Milestones and the Exact Path Computer Program. Supplemental hands-on materials, such as phonics cards, manipulatives, and Osmo reading and math are also used. Mr. Uhrich stated that Exact Path is a marvelous program and he would like our students to continue utilizing it. Mr. Derr was informed by DPI that the cost of the program will once again be funded by the state for the 2022-2023 school year.

Title 1 Program effectiveness: Mr. Fluhrer stated that in the spring, students in upper grades take all of their assessments over a short period of time. He suggested students could possibly take the Star tests before taking the state tests. Discussion was held regarding testing environments and identified students retesting, when results indicate the student didn't score at, or Reading Assessments—MAP, STAR, DIBELS near, his or her ability level. Mr. Fluhrer also stated that the choice for the new reading curriculum will be either Amplify or Superkids.

> planation of Title 1 Services is sent to the teachers at the beginning of the school year. Communication throughout the school year is conveyed through email, hard copies, and person-to-person visitation.

Parent Communication/Involvement: Commu-

nication with parents is conveyed through the Title 1 Open House, Title 1 Tidbits, Class Dojo, the Glenburn Elementary Facebook page, the monthly newsletter, and student progress reports.

Parent Surveys: There were 39 surveys sent home, and 33 were returned. Nearly all were positive, with common responses such as, extra help in reading and math, the one-on-one support, gaining confidence, etc. Parent recommendations included more updates on progress, and less computer time. Parents are interested in a variety of trainings and programs, including health awareness, ELS, parenting skills, GED, CPR, and additional resources. 1% of the Title 1 budget can be used for parental trainings and programs.

There are a few kinks to work out as far as scheduling, but that will come with time. There are many things to work around like: music, physical education, recess, computer lab, lunch times, and reading/math blocks of time in the general education class-


room.

I am very excited to work with new and past Title 1 scholars. Their parents have been wonderful to talk to in person, or on the phone, as we get connected to the Dojo app for Title 1 communication. The 2022-2023 school year looks to be fun and challenging, as we are implementing a new elementary reading curriculum, and diving into data to learn what our scholars' strengths and weaknesses are in order to build on those. All elementary teachers are either trained, or being trained in the "Science of Reading". Last year we started a new math curriculum and are becoming more and more trusting of it.


Hensen moved to adjourn the meeting, Hansen seconded; the meeting was adjourned at 6:34 p.m.




