

National Honor Society- Carrie Lord and Angie Barajas

The National Honor Society (NHS) is the nation's premier organization established to recognize outstanding high school students. More than just an honor roll, NHS serves to honor those students who have demonstrated excellence in the areas of Scholarship, Leadership, Service, and Character. Chapter membership not only recognizes students for their accomplishments but challenges them to develop further through active involvement in school activities and community service. Four main purposes have guided chapters of NHS from the beginning: "To create enthusiasm for scholarship, to stimulate a desire to render service, to promote leadership, and to develop character in the students of secondary schools." Students who have a cumulative GPA of 92 are eligible to apply to show their dedication to community service, leadership, and qualities of character. A faculty committee will review and score the applications. Students will then be notified of their acceptance, if they meet the criteria set forth in our bylaws. Once accepted, members must maintain a cumulative GPA of 90 or better. In order to receive Senior honor cords, members must document a minimum of 30 service hours by April of their senior year, and meet the minimum attendance requirement of 4 meetings per year of membership. Financial Obligations/Dues-ONE-TIME membership dues: \$40 (collected only at time of induction—not every year).

Purpose- Membership in the National Honor Society is one of the highest honors that can be awarded to a high school student. It is more than an honor roll. The objective of the PHS chapter of NHS is to recognize and foster enthusiasm for **scholarship** (academic eligibility), to promote the development of strong **character**, to encourage positive **leadership**, and to cultivate responsible citizenship through **service** to the school and community. The National Honor Society strives to recognize the total student--one who excels in **all** of these areas, which is the basis for selection. These four principles shape the organization's activities and are reflected in the member's responsibilities.

Membership requirements- To be considered for membership, students must have demonstrated academic eligibility by earning a <u>cumulative GPA of 92</u> or better. Academically eligible students will complete an application that highlights their leadership and service activities. The application is reviewed by a faculty committee and selection is determined using a rubric. Members must maintain a cumulative GPA of 90 to remain in good standing. In order to receive honor cords, students must be members for 3 years and are required to attend meetings and complete a total of 10 service hours each year of membership for a total of 30 hours before graduation. Students are encouraged to participate in club service projects, as well as finding opportunities to serve in the community. For more information, please check the PHS website.

Financial Obligations- Annual Dues: \$40- paid only once (before induction).

PHS Frequently Asked Questions

What do I do if I...

1. AM LATE TO SCHOOL?

If you are late to school, you must report to the Attendance Office to get a check in slip for class. For your tardy or absence to be excused, you must bring a note from your parent, doctor, court, or other approved written documentation within 5 days of your tardy/absence.

2. HAVE BEEN ABSENT?

If you have been absent, you must bring a written excuse from your parent, doctor, court, or other approved entity stating the reason for your absence. This written note is to be turned in to the office and placed in the **EXCUSE BASKET** at the Attendance Office. This excuse must be provided to the attendance clerk within 5 days after the absence and must contain the following information:

Name of Student
Date of Note
Date of Absence
Reason for Absence
Parent/Doctor signature
Phone number of parent

Notes written after the 5th day grace period will remain unexcused and will be filed in the student's folder.

****All absences, both excused and unexcused, do count towards exemption. After 5 absences, exemption status is lost, even if those absences are all excused.****

The State Board of Education policy allows only the following circumstances as excused absences:

- *Personal illness
- *Death or serious illness in the immediate family
- *Recognized religious holidays
- *Absences mandated by a governmental agency
- *Conditions which render school attendance

impossible or hazardous to the students' safety and health.

3. AM GETTING A LICENSE OR LEARNER'S PERMIT?

Stop by the main office to fill out a <u>Certificate of Enrollment</u> form. The form will be ready for pick up at the end of the school day. The **ADAP** Certificate will be attached if the student is getting a license.

4. NEED TO LEAVE SCHOOL EARLY?

A written parental request must be made before permission will be given for a student to leave campus early for any reason. *The written request must be taken to the office prior to the beginning of the school day.* All notes requesting an early dismissal must contain the full name of the student and a telephone number where a parent may be reached for confirmation. At the time of the dismissal, the student must sign out in the office. Students must provide an excuse from their doctor/dentist or a written excuse from the parent in order for school time missed to be counted as excused.

*Once a student arrives to the school campus, he/she is subject to follow all school policies and procedures. Between the hours of 7:15am to 3:00pm, or from the time a student arrives on school property, that student must get prior permission and must check out through the front office before leaving campus.

5. NEED TO RIDE A DIFFERENT BUS?

Sorry, you cannot ride a different bus. A Student can only ride the bus assigned based on that student's address on infinite campus. If you move, you must provide proof of residency to central registration to have the address and bus changed.

6. NEED TO GO SOMEWHERE DURING CLASS TIME?

You must have permission from your teacher and get a written hall pass containing your name, the date, the location, and teacher's signature.

7. NEED TO USE THE PHONE?

The office phone is available for use with the permission of office personnel. Students will not be permitted to leave class to use the office phone.

Students are not permitted to use their cell phones during the school day except in specified areas during specified times. Students may use their devices from 7:15am to 7:50am only in the

Staples gym or cafeteria and during the student's lunch period-while in the cafeteria or patio area. This privilege may be revoked at any time with the discretion of the administration. Students may not use their cellular devices at any other time or location. Students cannot have their phones out in class, in the hallway, in the bathroom, or any other area without prior permission.

8. GET TO SCHOOL EARLY?

Students cannot be on campus until 7:15am. Students who walk, drive, or get dropped off, will go directly to the Staples gym. Students who ride a bus will go directly to the cafeteria. Any student assigned In School Suspension is required to go directly to the ISS room. (Breakfast is served in each area.)

9. NEED TO STAY AFTER SCHOOL?

When the bell rings at 3:00pm, students should exit the building or go directly to their assigned area. If involved in an extra-curricular or co-curricular activity, the student will report directly to that activity. Students staying for tutoring or academic priority time should go directly to the appropriate location. Students who drive should go directly to the student parking lot. Those who are picked up will report directly to the parent pickup ramp. Students who ride a 1st round bus report directly to the bus ramp. Students who ride all other buses should report directly to the cafeteria. All students who walk should exit the building and campus when the bell rings.

10. NEED TO TAKE MEDICINE AT

SCHOOL? As needed and prescription medications must be checked in at the office as

soon as the student arrives at school. **Students**

are prohibited from carrying medications with them during the

school day. All medications should be given to the medical technician or school nurse in the front office. A parent permission form to dispense medication to students is available in the front office.

11. HAVE LOST SOMETHING?

Students who lose, misplace, or feel that they have had something stolen, need to report the incident to school personnel immediately. A lost and found area is located in the front office. All misplaced textbooks that are turned in to the office will be returned to the teacher that issued the book. Students are responsible for all items issued to them by the school. Although school personnel will try to help locate items, the student, not the school, is responsible for all items.

12. HAVE FORGOTTEN SCHOOL RELATED MATERIALS/PROJECTS IN MY VEHICLE?

Students are not permitted in the parking lot during the school day for any reason. In situations where it is imperative for the student to get an assignment from the car, the student should get permission and a pass from an administrator.

13. WANT TO SEND/RECIEVE A DELIVERY?

DELIVERY OF FLOWERS AND BALLONS TO SCHOOL FOR STUDENTS BY PARENTS, FLORISTS, OR OTHER STUDENTS IS <u>NOT PERMITTED.</u>

ALL food deliveries are also prohibited.
NO Door Dash, Uber Eats, Grub Hub,
etc. are permitted.
