Inclement Weather Conditions



In the event of snow, ice or other inclement weather conditions it may be necessary to adjust school starting time or cancel classes. In these kinds of situations please listen to your local radio stations and News Channels. We try very hard to make decisions by

6:30a.m. Once the decision is made it is posted to the Flash Alert website and they send it out to all local TV and Radio Stations. You can also go onto flashalert.net and check for delays and closures there. If the alert states that we will be on snow routes, this means that there are roads the bus will not go down (Please see attached flier for our snow routes and info). If you DO NOT hear any information regarding Evaline School you must assume school will be in session as usual. In the case of unplanned early dismissals due to emergencies students will either be transported home on the bus or will need to be picked up by their parent/guardian right away. This would include instances of sudden loss of power, water, or accumulation of snow. In the event of a late start, these days will always be two hours late. Therefore school will start at 10:30am and the bus will be picking up students two hours later than the normally scheduled pick up time. There will be no breakfast served on late start days.

you might see during this time are working on reading comprehension, reading one on one, academic vocabulary practice, working with math manipulatives, and playing learning games.

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3rd Annual Evaline Holiday Food Drive



As we enter the month of November we are turning our focus from the character traits of Respect and Responsibility, to the character trait of Gratitude in SEL. While participating in our annual fall food drives, our classes have enjoyed applying the skills and knowledge learned regarding these first three character traits toward their own community. Each year we have set a goal for each class to donate a minimum of one item per student, and our students were subsequently excited each year to not only have every class make that goal, but to have several classes surpass it! After collecting our donations, 1-2 of our classes then delivered them to the local food bank, and had the opportunity to tour the food bank and learn more about the role a food bank plays in a community.



With students already asking this fall not "if" but "When" we were going to be having our annual food drive, we contacted the Winlock Vader food bank to see if we could partner with them once again this year to donate much needed items to members of our community this fall.

As a result, we are excited to announce that we will be holding our 3rd annual food drive beginning Monday, November 13 through Thursday November 30th. Donations will be delivered by our 3rd - 6th graders on Friday, December 1st, just in time to help refill the Food Bank shelves from having met the community needs related to one holiday, to helping meet the community needs related to the next one.

We will be accepting nonperishable food items in each classroom which are in their original labeled boxes/cans prior to their expiration dates. Though they will gladly accept all types of food, we are particularly wanting to provide some of the items that the food bank has shared they tend to run low on which includes the following: personal hygiene items such as shampoo, soap, toothpaste and deodorant, cat food, and "easy meal makers" such as hamburger helper kits, as well as canned meat. We have also challenged our students to help pick out some of their favorite meal items to include in their donation if possible, since these might appeal to other students just like them whose families may currently be relying on the food bank to help meet their added needs during the holiday season.

When each classroom reaches their goal, each student will earn a special prize as a thank you and a reminder for their hard work, generosity, and kindness. So, as we enter this season of being thankful, let us also consider how we can give back and lend a helping hand in our community.
