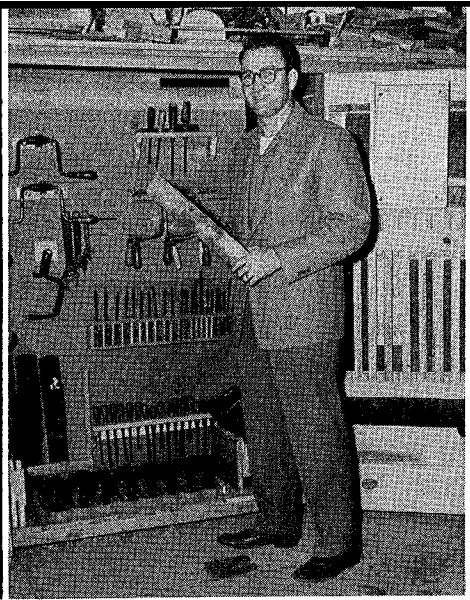


"Dear old golden rule days"

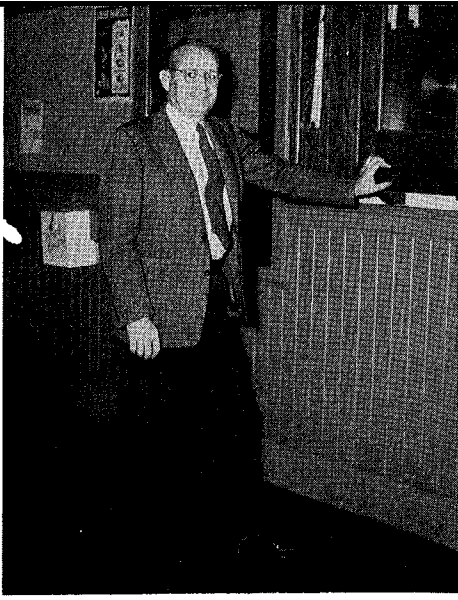

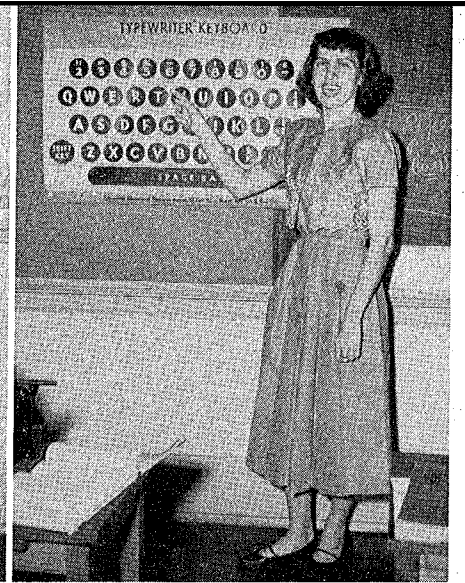

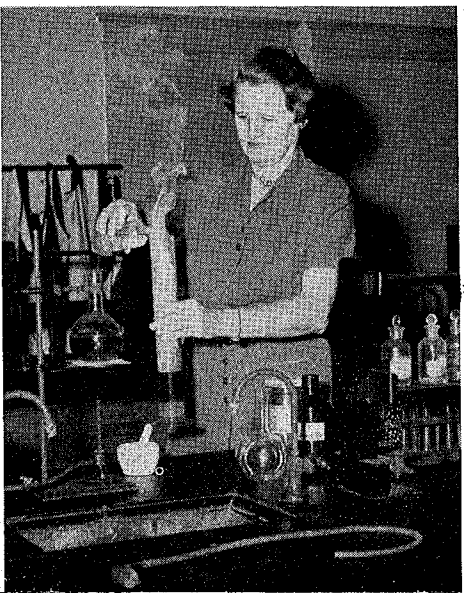
"Taught to the tune of the hickory stick"

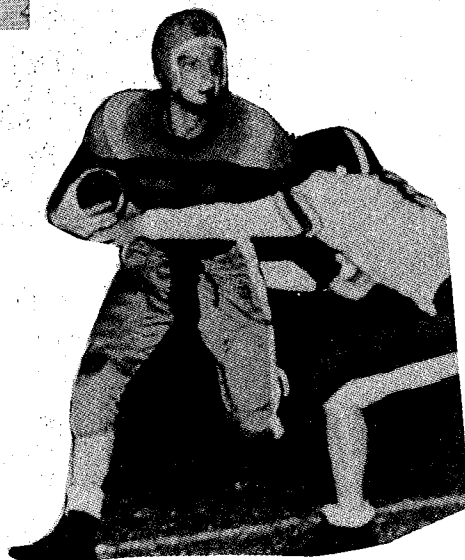




Highlanders converge on Brandonite.

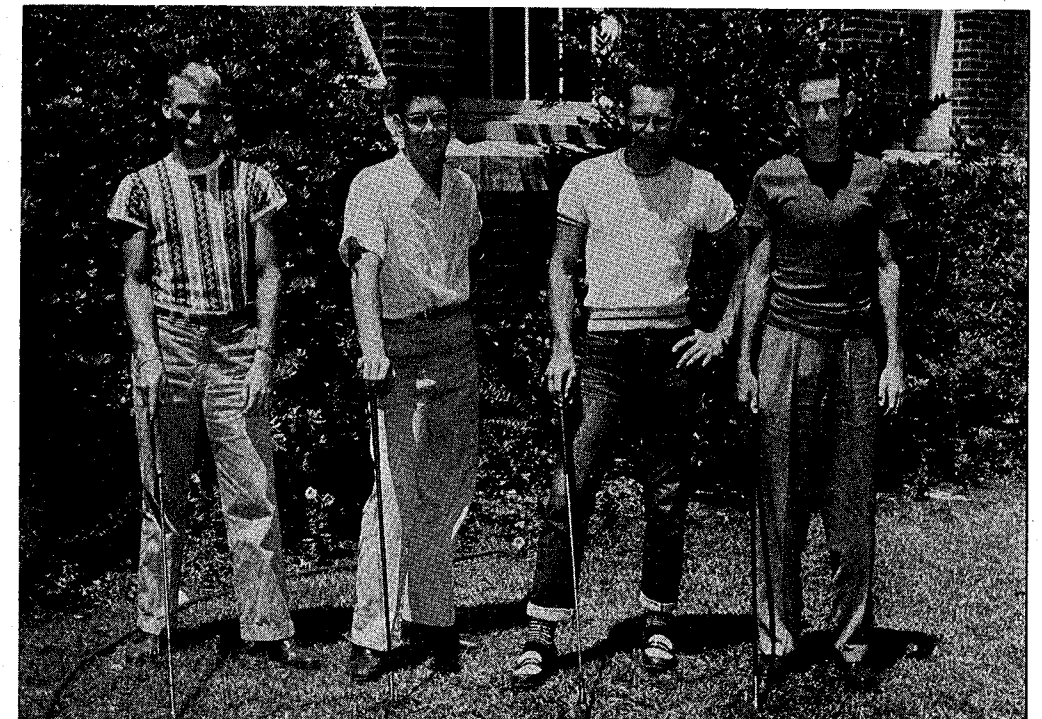
"Let's Do It Again"

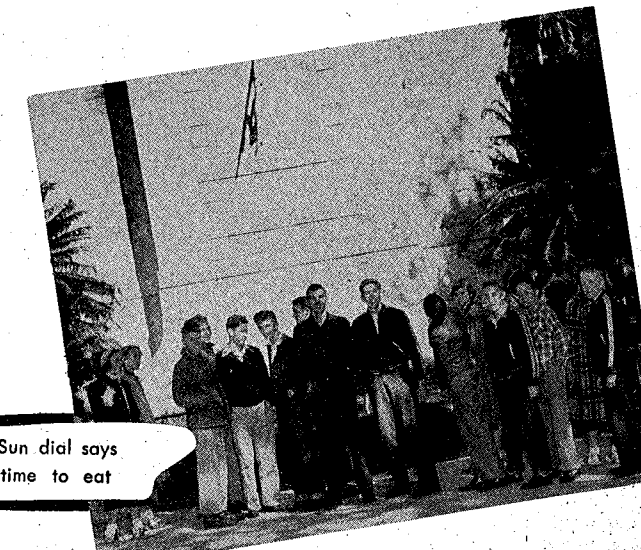
Tower Day
