English IV is a course in communications, literature, and composition designed to prepare the student for college, vocational training, and/or the job market. Students will participate in a career research project, actively engage in class/group activities and discussions, deliver oral presentations, and prepare documents for college and the career world. Students will also read and analyze various works of British and/or World Literature. Composition and reading are strong elements in this course.

Syllabus for English IV British Literature/World Literature

I. Composition

Writing is aligned with Tennessee state standards. Students will write in the following modes: narrative, persuasive, literary analysis, compare/contrast, and cause and effect. The writing process will be taught and reviewed in the classroom. Students will write in response to a variety of modes: drama, poetry fiction, nonfiction, and media. The focus will be on identifying a specific purpose and audience for writing.

II. Literature

The following pieces of literature will be studied:

- Lord of the Flies- William Golding
- from *Beowulf* the Beowulf poet translated by Burton Raffel
- The Tragedy of Macbeth- William Shakespeare
- from Gulliver's Travels Jonathan Swift
- from Frankenstein Mary Shelley

Additional works will be added at the teacher's discretion as time permits.

III. Grammar

Grammar, usage, and mechanics lessons will be incorporated in daily lessons and essay writing.

IV. Vocabulary

Vocabulary is an important element in this course and will be taught with each literary selection. In addition, ACT preparation and content vocabulary will be emphasized.

V. College and Career Project

The college and career unit will be a main focus this semester. Students will complete applications (college and career), write college entrance essays, create resumes, and write cover letters. Students will be required to conduct research, take notes, write a 3-5 page research paper, and participate in a mock interview sponsored by the Winchester Chamber of Commerce. Participation in the mock interview is typically required to receive full credit for the project.

VI. Assessments

There is no TN Ready End of Course Exam for English IV. Students will, however, have a final exam.

VII. Homework (absences and late assignments) School-Wide Policy

It is the responsibility of the student to see that the requirements of the attendance policy are met, and all work missed is completed to the satisfaction of the teacher.

As a minimum, a student will be allowed an equal number of days to complete the make-up work as the number of days that were missed (Ex: A student who is absent three days should have all work turned in by the third day that the student has returned to school .) More time for make-up work may be granted in special circumstances by making arrangements with the teacher.
