Comfort And Conservation At Heart Of Weatherization Program

Often when Tim Finch tells people that he is the manager of Gateway's Weatherization program they are puzzled because the term Weatherization is unfamiliar. But once Tim explains that Weatherization might bring some additional comfort to their homes, curiosity kicks in. It is a program that - while sometimes misunderstood or unknown to the general population - fits in well with Gateway's mission to provide services that improve the quality of life and promote self-sufficiency. It is through Weatherization that our low-income residents can save money on their heating and cooling bills and conceivably have more money for the rest of their household budget. It also benefits the community at-large in helping to preserve energy resources that go toward heating and cooling.

“Clients have contacted us a year or so after we’ve weatherized their homes to tell us how much money they have saved on their energy bills over the past year,” Finch said. “They also tell us how much warmer and cozier they feel in their homes since we weatherized. Those calls are always incredibly satisfying.”

Low income individuals often face a disproportional burden of energy costs. In an article by the National Renewable Energy Laboratory (NREL), a low-income family was paying more than \$500 a month in utilities for inefficiencies that were out of their control. In fact, energy cost as a percentage of bills can be up to 3 times higher for low-income individuals (which make up 50 million people across the United States). Gateway and the Department of Energy are trying to improve this injustice and make energy more accessible and affordable for low-income individuals

Weatherization, or weatherproofing, is the process of auditing a home or building to reduce energy consumption and energy costs, as well as health hazards. Gateway’s Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) weatherizes approximately income-eligible 130 households per year, and most of their clients are either referred from the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) or are people who have contacted Gateway for the WAP specifically.

Once the applicant is approved, Finch and the weatherization team meets with them onsite to find out more about their specific energy use and costs before evaluating the home. The home evaluation includes diagnostic testing for the heater, water heater, exhaust and ventilation, lighting, insulation, appliances, and so on, and can take anywhere from a couple of hours to half-a-day to complete depending on the size and age of the home. Once the data is collected, it is analyzed in order to determine where improvements can be made. The team then goes back to the client’s home to install any necessary upgrades.

Weatherization can have multisectoral results. First, weatherizing a home can reduce the energy cost burden on homeowners by more than 20%. Secondly, weatherization aims to reduce household health risks with a series of tests, including checking for mold, pests, or gas leaks in the household, improving indoor air quality, installing carbon monoxide detectors, and so on. Additionally, improving energy efficiency can decrease the impact on the environment. Energy and electricity fuels are associated with pollution and greenhouse gas emissions, so reducing total energy use (improving “eco-efficiency”) can lower the total impact of these resources over time. This acts as an environmental benefit and a health benefit, as well as a financial benefit, as air quality can improve with these reductions as well.

Weatherization is one important step towards improving inequality in the energy sector and aligning Gateway’s mission of improving quality of life and self-sufficiency, while also combating negative environmental effects due to energy consumption and contributing to the shift to a more sustainable system moving forward.




**Gateway Receives A Generous "Socktober" Donation


"Happy Bottoms Diaper Drive" Exceeds Expectations With More Than 26,000 Diapers Collected
